Board of Health Meeting Minutes
September 18, 2025

President Valerie Moore called the September 18, 2025, Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

Board members present: Dr. Sherry Robinette, Dala DeWitt, Scott Griffith, and Dr. Valerie Moore. Dr. Bernadette deGuzman, Dala DeWitt, Mike Adamson and Scott Griffith.

Board members absent: Mike Adamson, Dr. Bernadette deGuzman.

Staff present: Chris Cook, Health Commissioner; Gracie Hemphill, Deputy Health Commissioner; Elizabeth “Zibby” DeWitt, Environmental Health Director; Lori Lambert, Early Childhood Director; Cheyenne Taylor, Director of Nursing; Emily Shaffer, WIC Director; Shannon Hackathorne, Administration & HR Supervisor and Jeff Hoerner, Director of Finance.

Guests: Diana Daniels and Trisha Lucero.

Mr. Griffith motioned to adopt the September 18, 2025, agenda and Ms. DeWitt seconded. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Mr. DeWitt motioned to accept the August 22, 2025, meeting minutes, and Mr. Griffith seconded. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Public Comment

Dr. Moore introduced Diana Daniels. Diana started by saying that she was there to represent the most underserved population in Springfield. She asked who was responsible for scheduling the medical bus that was in Springfield last fall. Chris answered that the health district was responsible for selecting the locations served. Diana asked how many times the bus served the warming center that was located at South Fountain and Pleasant Street. Cheyenne answered that the bus was not at the warming center location and when Diana asked why she responded that the bus served as a mobile location for flu vaccines and that we tried to serve locations that historically showed high population demand. Cheyenne said that a lot of determining location was finding locations that would allow us access to bring the mobile health clinic. Diana said that the bus showed up at Catholic Social Services and St. Vincent de Paul but the most underserved population that needed the flu shots and needed some health screenings, which was about 175 homeless served through the warming center were missed and that was a great disservice. She said that many of the homeless were sick and the volunteers serving them were sick for weeks and she is admonishing the health district for that. She said that this is an opportunity for the health district to think more critically about the actual needs of the actual citizens of Springfield and not “just the people living here”. Cheyenne thanked Diana for sharing the information and said that some of the problem was the lack of knowledge on her part. She said that she was not aware of the warming center until she saw it on Facebook. Diana said that she got the run around from the city and county commission, so she brought this straight to the health district to get with Barron if the bus is still available as he knows where the pockets are with people who desperately need health screenings or vaccines. Cheyenne explained that the mobile health clinic is no longer in Clark County, however, she would reach out to see if there is anything they can do to help. Dr. Robinette added that she is willing to serve as a liaison with the shelters to make efforts to keep up with the basic needs of the community such as showering and hygiene, which is a public health issue.

Old Business

Second Reading & Public Hearing of Proposed 2026 Environmental Health Fees:

Dr. Moore called for a motion to open the public hearing for the 2026 proposed Environmental Health fees. Dr. Robinette motioned to open the public hearing at 6:15 am and Ms. DeWitt seconded, with all in favor, by a voice vote.

Zibby noted that they did not receive any written comments. She said that the proposed fees are also accessible on the health district's website. Dr. Robinette asked why there was such a significant increase in the spa/pool fees. Zibby explained that the documentation of fees is based on the amount of time the Environmental Health Specialists spend in the program. She said that we revised our approach last year. Previously, we had a single fee for a pool or spa and special use pools, however, we had to break it out based on the amount of time spent on each. She said that multiple follow-up inspections were conducted last year. She said that they inspect pools and spas monthly and aim to inspect all open facilities. She added that the data indicates that we could have charged \$900, however, we considered it unreasonable and attempted to make it more reasonable. She said that if we experience the same situation next year with multiple visits, we may need to revisit the fees.

Hearing no further comment from the audience, Dr. Moore asked for a motion to close the public hearing. Mr. Griffith motioned to close the public hearing at 6:18 pm and Ms. DeWitt seconded, with all in favor, by a voice vote.

New Business

Sewage Variance Request – 2170 Ashbrook Drive, Springfield: Zibby said that the homeowner of 2170 Ashbrook Drive has requested a variance from rule for a garage within five (5) feet of the septic system outlet line. She said that minimum horizontal isolation distance requirement is ten (10) feet as stated in the Ohio Administrative Code. She said that if approved, the garage would be constructed five (5) feet from the septic system, which is closer than the required 10 feet with the concern being the risk of damaging the septic system during construction. She referred to photographs shown on the screen for a visual of the property and proposed garage. Chris added that if approved it should be contingent on the contractor's agreement to take extra precautions during construction and on the need for a final site visit to ensure the septic system is functioning properly.

R 88-25 A resolution approving a household sewage treatment system rules variance at 2170 Ashbrook Drive in Springfield (Parcel # 1800600020106008) allowing a garage with an open porch to be installed in a location that is 5 feet from the household sewage treatment system according to the applicant's variance request with the responsible party signing a Hold Harmless Agreement.

Possible Solid Waste Nuisance – 12664 Huntington Road, Springfield: Zibby said that unfortunately the owner of the property passed away and the niece who she has been communicating with is no longer residing in the area and lacks authority over the property due to not being listed in the will. She said that we are asking the board to declare the property a public health nuisance and referred to photographs of the property. Dr. Robinette asked if there is anyone living in the home. Zibby said that the home does appear to b inhabited with water delivery services still active, yet there is no apparent occupant present. She added that a neighbor has reported picking up mail, and a water line has been compromised, resulting in water contamination on the property.

Possible Solid Waste Nuisance – 2011 East Blee Road, Springfield: Zibby referred to photographs included in the board packet and said that the home caught fire but was full of solid waste at the time of the fire and now the solid waste that was inside is exposed. She added that the home is no longer inhabitable and that we have attempted to work with the property owner to clean it up without success. Chris added that unfortunately this has also become an attractive place for others to dump solid waste. Dr. Robinette asked when the home caught fire and Zibby responded that it was in April of this year. Cheyenne asked what the options for the homeowner at this point are. Zibby explained that the homeowner has the option to rent a dumpster or bring in a bobcat or excavator to remove the solid waste. She added that the homeowner did mention earlier that with more time he could get help from friends but there has been no movement to clean up the property. Dr. Moore asked when we last talked with the homeowner, and Zibby said that we delivered 3 sets of orders to clean up the property and last talked with the homeowner in late July, early August. She said that they were just out there last week as well.

Policy Review: Chris referred to the updated Professional Development Policy included in the board packet. He said that this is not a new policy and typically we do not bring updates to policies to the board, however, this policy has a financial component and implications for our budgetary allocations. He said the policy was revised to provide clarity on what is eligible for reimbursement and highlighted the introduction of reimbursement tiers. He said that the tiered system consists of three (3) categories: Tier 1, 2, and 3 with each tier designed to cater to different employee groups, including leadership, credentialed employees and non-credentialed employees. The associated reimbursement amounts reflect the respective roles and responsibilities within our organization. He said that this revised policy will provide equal access to professional development opportunities for all employees, regardless of their position or credentials.

Monthly Fund Report: Jeff shared the monthly fund report. He noted that the environmental health fund 8240 caught his attention and comparing the two (2) periods revealed a significant decline in income, as well as a corresponding decrease in expenses. He referred to the footnotes accompanying the figures which provide critical context. He said that last year's numbers included transfers, which are not accounted for in this year's data, which significantly impacted the comparison. He added that prior to his involvement, a six (6) month study was conducted on wages. This analysis enabled a more accurate wage allocation, which in turn affected the environmental health fund and as a result the associated wage expense has been reduced. He said that while the initial appearance suggests significant reductions in payroll and employment, that is not the case. Rather, the realignment of expenses has improved our allocation, leading to a more accurate representation of our financial situation.

PUBLIC HEALTH TEAM REPORTS

Environmental Health: Zibby said that fall is a busy season with various inspections, festivals and septic installations and thanked the environmental health team for their hard work and dedication. She said that World Environmental Health Day is September 26, 2025, and highlighted the critical work the team does every day to address pressing environmental health issues including food safety, security, water quality, and the prevention of vector-borne diseases. She said that Chagas disease has garnered recent attention which is caused by a parasite transmitted through the bite of an infected kissing bug. She noted that it is important to understand the risks associated with this disease which is typically spread through the feces of infected kissing bugs and not through its bite. Therefore, avoiding contact with infected feces and taking preventative measures can significantly reduce the risk of infection. She said that this includes sealing cracks and gaps in homes, using screens on doors and windows, and maintaining proper hygiene. If caught in early stages, treatment is available, however, many individuals may not exhibit symptoms, making awareness and prevention crucial. She said that there are medications available to treat the disease in its early stages, but treatment should be sought promptly if symptoms persist or worsen. She again thanked the environmental health team for their tireless efforts in keeping our community safe and stressed the importance of taking necessary precautions to prevent the spread of diseases such as Chagas.

Nursing and Clinics: Cheyenne said that the nursing division is experiencing a surge in the clinic as they approach the peak of back to school and flu season. She said that the immunization rates are higher this year than the past 3-year average and recently they began distributing flu vaccines. She acknowledged and thanked the communicable disease for their hard work and efforts. She said that managing cases of tuberculosis and other communicable diseases has been particularly challenging, with four active tuberculosis cases in Clark County, however, they are committed to providing essential services and

support to the community. She noted that they have 2 upcoming flu clinics, with 1 at Wittenberg and another at the health expo. She said that the health expo is a fantastic resource, providing access to a vast array of information, services, and support and encouraged everyone to attend and take advantage of the resources available. She said that they will be focusing outreach efforts in targeted areas with high concentrations of homeless populations including libraries and public spaces as well as working with local partners to disseminate information and provide support.

Early Childhood: Lori said that the safe sleep initiative is part of the Cribs for Kids grant program distributed 33 units this month, which is slightly above the usual allocation. She said that this was in part due to their participation in the WIC BAM event, which featured a presentation. She said that they consistently run out of Pack n Plays units by the end of the year, however, she was informed of an opportunity to increase their supply to ensure they meet the full year's demand so she will be researching this possibility and will report back any developments.

Women, Infants & Children: Emily shared a photograph included in the board packet of WIC staff at the BAM event. She said that the BAM event was a success with a good turnout and positive response from the attendees. She said that the event was designed as a resource fair, which allowed attendees to navigate a layout that showcased various community programs and services available to families. In addition to our WIC breastfeeding education and promotion materials, 7 local community organizations participated, providing additional resources and information for expecting mothers and new parents. She said that guests received program information, promotional items, diapers, and an opportunity to participate in a raffle for one of 3 prizes. She said that there were 61 total attendees, with 34 of those individuals identifying as mothers. She thanked the WIC team and the vendors who participated for helping make this a successful event. She said that their contract dietitian, Ashley, reported a busy period with her highest number of hospital days and appointments completed this month. According to Ashley, the positive reception from participants and the perceived impact of our agency's presence in the hospital are clear indicators of the value they bring to these settings. She said that Ashley's contract has been officially extended for an additional year, ensuring that our hospital visitation program will continue uninterrupted. She thanked Ashley for her hard work and dedication to this important initiative.

Health Planning: Gracie said that she is happy to report that they received notice of awards for 2 of our outstanding health planning grants, the Adolescent Health Resilience grant which will provide training for adults who interact with youth on how to be trauma informed and trustworthy, and the Creating Healthy Communities grant which will support our efforts in building healthy communities. She said that they are excited about the opportunities these grants will bring and are committed to making a positive impact on the community. She highlighted the recent Overdose Awareness Day event, which took place on August 29th. The event was organized by our Overdose Prevention Coordinator, Jacob Clark, and was a great success. She said that despite some unforeseen weather conditions, the event attracted many attendees and provided valuable resources and information on overdose prevention and treatment. She said that they are proud to have played a role in helping individuals connect with treatment services and are grateful for the support of their partners including Project Dawn and McKinley Hall. She referred to a new resource that was provided to the board members, a keychain that contains a one-dose naloxone kit. She said that this keychain is designed to be easily accessible and discreet, and we will be providing them to promote harm reduction and overdose prevention. She said that we believe that this resource will make a significant difference in our community and we are committed to making it widely available. Chris added that we are proud of what we have achieved and are committed to continuing our work in this critical

area. He acknowledged and thanked the team, including Gracie, who have worked tirelessly to make these events a success.

Special Report: Safe Sleep Presentation by Lori Lambert

Lori shared the following presentation: Sleep-Related Deaths in Infants: A Growing Concern

The topic of sleep related deaths in infants is a critical issue that affects families and communities worldwide. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) emphasizes the importance of safe sleep practices to minimize the risk of such deaths. The presentation highlighted the complexities of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), accidental suffocation or strangulation, and other sleep-related causes of infant mortality. The AAP recommends following the ABCs of safe sleep to minimize the risk of sleep-related deaths which include: A, Alone, ensure the infant sleeps alone, without bed-sharing or co-sleeping, B, Bed, ensure the sleep environment is safe and free from hazards, and C, Crib, ensure the crib meets the current safety standards and is used correctly. Research has identified several risk factors that contribute to sleep-related deaths including premature birth, congenital anomalies, unknown or undetermined causes, secondhand smoke exposure, bed-sharing with someone who uses illicit alcohol or drugs, overheating, bed-sharing with a child or pet, and placing infants on soft surfaces. The critical development period for infants is between 4 months and 1 year. During this period, infants are at a higher risk of developing immature cardiorespiratory and arousal systems, making them more vulnerable to stressors. Leading researchers have developed the triple risk model to explain the complex pathophysiology of SIDS. The model identifies 3 critical factors including critical development period which is when infants are at a higher risk due to immature systems, vulnerable infant when an infant with dysfunction or immature systems are more susceptible to stressors and exogenous stressors when external stressors, such as the sleep environment, can contribute to SIDS. Child fatality review data indicate that most sleep-related deaths are preventable. The most common risk factors include unsafe sleep environments, unscathed sleep environments in white and black families, swaddling, overheating, and bed-sharing with a child or pet. Safe sleep practices are crucial in preventing sleep-related deaths. The AAP emphasizes the importance of using a firm, flat and safety-approved sleep space, breastfeeding, room-sharing for at least 6 months, using a firm, flat mattress and tight-fitting sheets, avoiding smoking, overheating, and swaddling safely, keeping infants up to date with medical visits and vaccines, researching baby products before purchase, and encouraging tummy time. The consequences of not following safe sleep practices are severe. The AAP emphasizes the importance of working together to prevent such deaths.

Legislative Update & Health Commissioner's Comments: Chris said bills that have gained significant attention are House Bills 96, 220, 230, and the Taxpayers' Freedom Trilogy (Bills 420, 421, and 422). He shared the following about these House Bills: HB96 is a \$3.9 million request to fund the state department of health laboratory that was approved, which will enhance our capacity to respond to public health threats such as avian influenza and other emerging issues. This funding will also support the testing and treatment of diseases such as West Nile Virus and group A strep. SB20 aims to establish community paramedicine programs as a reimbursable service under Medicaid. He said that he has had discussions with the representatives sponsoring this bill and has expressed concerns that the current language is narrow, only covering ambulatory and fire/EMS services. He said that he urged them to revise the bill to include hospital-based services, as our hospital would greatly benefit from this reimbursement. SB230 authorizes pharmacists to screen, test, and provide treatment for certain respiratory illnesses. He said that as a public health professional he views this as a positive development, as it will increase access to

healthcare services and alleviate the burden on healthcare providers. However, he does have concerns about the role of pharmacists in prescribing medications based on screenings and tests. He said that there is ongoing discussion about creating a study group to examine the impact of adverse childhood experiences on health outcomes. The AOHC has expressed support for this initiative, and he will continue to monitor its progress. The Taxpayers' Freedom Trilogy (Bills 420, 421, and 422) aims to reform property taxes and local government financing. He said that while he does not have a strong opinion on these proposals, he wants to caution everyone that any changes to property taxes could have unintended consequences on our local levy and continuing levy. He said for those unfamiliar, community paramedicine is another term for street medicine, which involves delivering medical services to people in their communities. He emphasized that our agency has partnered with a community paramedicine program and has seen the positive impact it can have on individuals in need.

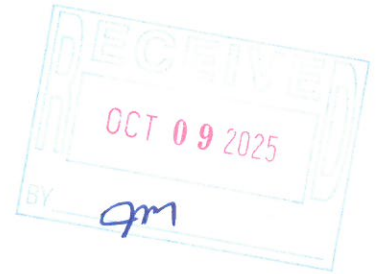

This property is a mini farm, purchased intentionally in the fall of 2024 due to its agricultural zoning. It is noted that the 1890s farmhouse and the slope of the land limit septic system options. The current tank/leach field cannot be upgraded, making an experimental septic spray system the recommended option. This sole option is not conducive to the farm for two main reasons: 1) the safety and wellbeing of the myotonic goat herd. Goats require dry pastures to forage, full of vegetation and free from pathogens and metals. Spray systems, according to the OAC, should be situated in "areas without vegetation" and cannot be in "areas in active production of food for human consumption." 2) the excessive cost of the system (\$35,000), given the current economic conditions including rising utility bills, property taxes and home insurance. For these reasons, the owners request a variance, allowing an aerobic discharge system instead of a spray system.

By signing this application, I, the grantee, agree to abide by any and all state laws and regulations and by the regulations set forth by the Clark County Combined Health District.

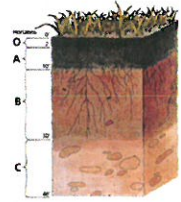

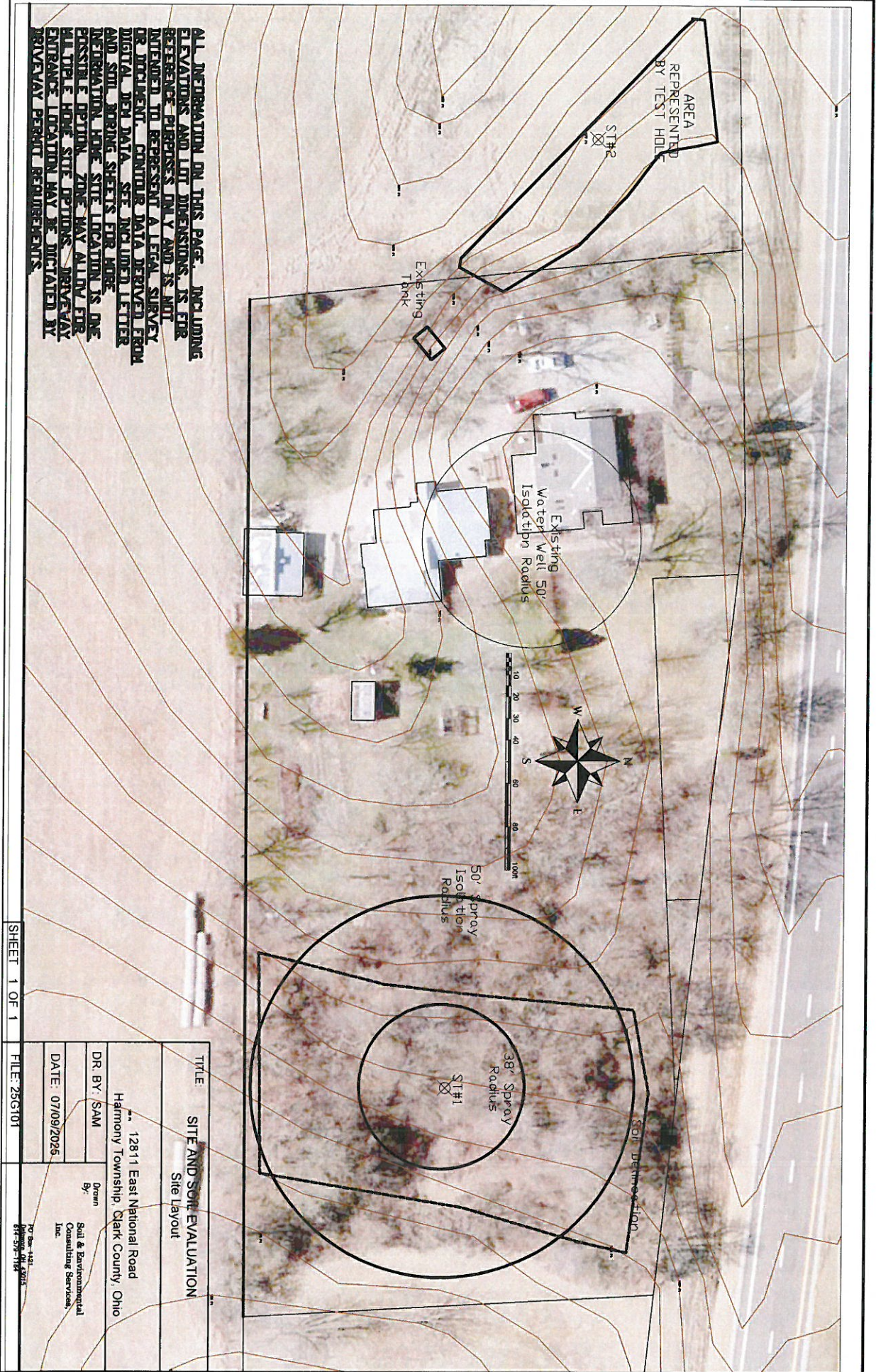

This Agreement is made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 20__ by and between the Clark County Combined Health District (the "CCCHD") and the Board of County Commissioners, Clark County, Ohio (the "Board"), on behalf of the Clark County Solid Waste District (the "SW District").

Whereas, the SW District is a solid waste management district established by the Board in accordance with Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") Section 343.01 for the purposes of solid waste management planning and providing for the safe and sanitary management of solid wastes within all of the incorporated and unincorporated territory of the SW District; and

Whereas, Section 3734.57 (G)(3) of the ORC authorizes the Board to provide financial assistance to the CCCHD, for the SW District, for the enforcement of Sections 3734.01 through 3734.13 of the ORC and all rules, orders, terms and conditions of permits, licenses, and variances adopted or issued under those sections; and

Whereas, the CCCHD is authorized by Section 3734.04 of the ORC to provide for the inspection, licensing, and enforcement of the sanitary standards for solid waste facilities in conformity with Chapter 3734 of the ORC; and

Whereas, the Board and the CCCHD wish to provide further by this Agreement the terms and conditions upon which moneys will be disbursed to the CCCHD to provide financial assistance for the performance of Budgeted Activities.

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the promises and mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

"Budgeted Activities" shall include only those activities authorized and agreed upon by the Board and the CCCHD, as described in Exhibit A. Budgeted Activities for any given year shall specifically refer to those activities supported by the Approved Budget attached as Exhibit B.

"Contract Year 2026" shall mean the period beginning January 1, 2026, and ending on December 31, 2026.

"Equipment" is defined as equipment having a value of \$500 or more and at least a one-year life.

"Solid Waste Fund" shall be a separate and distinct account established for funds received from the SW District. These moneys shall not be commingled with moneys from any other source. Funds related to solid waste matters that are received from sources other than the SW District, i.e. landfill license fees, infectious fees, C & D license fees, clean-up assessments, etc., shall not be commingled with funds from the SW

District.

ARTICLE II - CLARK COUNTY COMBINED HEALTH DISTRICT SERVICES

2.1 Generally

The CCCHD agrees to perform the services described in the Attached Exhibit A.

ARTICLE III - COMPENSATION

3.1 Disbursement Schedule

For the year of **2026**, the Approved Budget for the CCCHD shall be **\$132,000.00**. The amount of **\$132,000.00** shall be paid to the CCCHD in four (4) installments of **\$33,000.00** each (in accordance with the standard procedures of the Board).

Installments shall be paid within the first two weeks of each quarter, provided that payment may be delayed if the quarterly reports discussed in Article IV, Section 4.2, are not submitted on time.

Quarters shall be defined as:

- (1) January 1-March 31
- (2) April 1-June 30
- (3) July 1- September 30
- (4) October 1-December 31

3.2 Equipment and Water Sampling Disbursements

Allocations for the Budgeted Activity of "Water Sampling" will remain in the SW District account and will be disbursed by the SW District Office directly as requested by the Health Commissioner of Clark County.

Reserve requests for water sampling disbursements or equipment must be made at least two weeks prior to any expenditure or work order request. EXCEPTION: In situations where said Health Commissioner reasonably believes that an emergency exists and action must be taken immediately to protect the public health, said Health Commissioner can take necessary action and expend funds without the prior approval of the SW District. Said funds shall be paid for out of the Solid Waste Fund and shall be reimbursed upon request.

If the amount needed to perform these activities is known ahead of time, and it is also known to whom this amount will be paid to, the reserve request can include up to the total amount allocated for the entire contract year.

3.3 Use of Disbursements

The CCCHD agrees that it will not expend any funds disbursed to it under this Agreement for any purpose other than a Budgeted Activity and the aggregate amount expended by the CCCHD from funds disbursed under this Agreement for any Budgeted Activity will not exceed the Budgeted Amount for that Budgeted

Activity. The CCCHD agrees to seek written consent from the Board and the SW District for any significant expenditures that deviate from the Approved Budget. This written consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. A significant expenditure shall be defined as any expenditure, the amount of which exceeds five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

3.4 Submission of Preliminary Budget

The CCCHD shall submit its preliminary budget request for funding for **2027** to the SW District by **June 1, 2026**. The request shall provide a short explanation for each line item and the amount requested.

3.5 Carryover Balance

The balance of moneys disbursed to the CCCHD under this Agreement that have not been expended or encumbered for expenditure as of **December 31, 2026**, under this Agreement, shall be remitted back to the SW District by **February 28, 2027**.

ARTICLE IV - RECORD KEEPING, REPORTS AND MEETINGS

4.1 Record Keeping

For the purposes outlined in this Agreement the CCCHD shall establish the Solid Waste Fund and shall maintain detailed records itemizing specifically the purpose for which all moneys in that account are expended. The records pertaining to this account are public records unless otherwise provided by law.

4.2 Reports

- a. The CCCHD shall submit to the SW District, Quarterly Reports and a Year End Summary Report on all services performed and expenditures made from the Solid Waste Fund as outlined in Exhibit A, Article B (2).
- b. Exhibit A, Article B outlines records that the CCCHD shall provide upon request of the SW District.
- c. The quarterly reports shall be submitted to the SW District within 30 days of the end of each quarter. The quarters shall be as designated in Article III, 3.1 Disbursement Schedule.
- d. The Year End Summary Report shall be submitted to the SW District within thirty (30) days of the end of the contract year.
- e. Quarterly expense reports shall also be submitted within 30 days after the end of each quarter. The expense reports shall detail how District funds were spent on personnel, vehicles, and equipment and supplies.

4.3 Meetings

The CCCHD agrees to meet, on an as needed basis and at mutually agreeable times, for the purpose of communication and planning. The Board of County Commissioners, Solid Waste Management District Coordinator, Clark County Combined Health Board, or the CCCHD Contract Agent may call these meetings.

ARTICLE V- PERSONNEL AND CONTRACT AGENT

5.1 Personnel

As provided in Section 3734.02 (L) (1) - (6) of the ORC and as approved by the Ohio EPA in accordance with Chapter 4736 of the ORC, the CCCHD shall employ, at a minimum, one full-time Registered Sanitarian 1, 2 or 3, and one half time Secretary (or equivalents) who shall primarily devote their efforts to the administration and enforcement of this contract and the state and federal laws and regulations applicable to solid waste.

5.2 Contract Agent

The CCCHD hereby appoints the Health Commissioner of Clark County as the designated CCCHD Contract Agent.

ARTICLE VI – INSURANCE AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS

6.1 NON-DISCRIMINATION PROVISION:

CCCHD agrees:

- a. That, in the hiring of employees for the performance of work under the contract or any subcontract, no contractor or subcontractor, by reason of race, color, religion, sex, age, disability or military status as defined in section 4112.01 of the Ohio Revised Codes, national origin, or ancestry, shall discriminate against any citizen of this state in the employment of a person qualified and able to perform the work to which the contract relates; and
- b. That no contractor, subcontractor, or person acting on behalf of any contractor or subcontractor, in any manner, shall discriminate against, intimidate, or retaliate against any employee hired for the performance of work under the contract on account of race, color, religion, sex, age, disability or military status as defined in section 4112.01 of the Ohio Revised Code, national origin, or ancestry.

6.2 BONDING AND INSURANCE:

CCCHD shall present current certificates prior to commencement of this contract, and shall maintain during the term of this contract, the insurance and bonds specified below:

- a. Worker's Compensation Insurance as required by Ohio law and any other state in which work will be performed.
- b. Commercial General Liability insurance for a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence with

an annual aggregate of at least \$2,000,000, including coverage for subcontractors, if any are used.

- c. Umbrella or Excess Liability insurance (over and above Commercial General Liability) with a limit of at least \$2,000,000.
- d. Auto Liability Insurance covering all owned, anon-owned and hired vehicles used in connection with the work of Clark County, or its departments, with limits of at least \$1,000,000 (Combined Single Limit).

The Board of Clark County Commissioners must be named as “Additional Insured” on the policies listed in paragraphs b, c, and d above.

The failure to maintain current insurance certificates at any time during the duration of the contract shall be deemed a breach of the contract. In the event of such breach, the Board shall have the right to withhold any further payment(s) due to CCCHD and to terminate the contract immediately without liability for any such payment(s).

In lieu of termination, the Board may, at its option, choose to withhold any further payment(s) due to the CCCHD until the CCCHD presents current certificates. In the event that the CCCHD fails to present current certificates to the Board’s satisfaction, the Board may exercise its right to terminate the contract in accordance with the above paragraph.

ARTICLE VII - EQUIPMENT

7.1 Notice to Purchase

The CCCHD shall seek written approval from the Board and the SW District before purchasing any major equipment that deviates from the Approved Budget. This written consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Significant expenditures shall be defined as an amount exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00). The request for written approval shall include:

- (i) A description of the equipment (including the cost and any identifying product numbers);
- (ii) The name and address of the proposed seller or supplier; and
- (iii) Identification of the Budgeted Activity to which the purchase will be chargeable.

7.2 Ownership

Any equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be the property of the Board for the use of the SW District.

7.3 Disposition

No equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be sold or otherwise transferred without the approval of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII - TERMINATION OF CONTRACT

8.1 Termination of the Contract

- a. The obligation to continue services under this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days advanced written notice in the event of failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the terms hereof. In the event of such termination, neither party to this Agreement shall be liable to the other for any services or obligations arising under this Agreement following such termination.
- b. Should the SW District be unable to continue funding, through no fault of the SW District, the SW District and the CCCHD shall negotiate in good faith for the purpose of terminating this Agreement without liability to either party.

EXHIBIT A

ARTICLE A: SCOPE OF SERVICES

A.1. The CCCHD shall provide listed services and personnel for the administration and enforcement of Sections 3734.01 to 3734.13 of the ORC and the SW District's Solid Waste Management Plan. Such services shall include at a minimum:

- a. The enforcement of regulations, inspection, and control of all active licensed solid waste disposal, transfer, materials recovery, scrap tire and composting facilities within the SW District (time intervals to be determined by the OEPA).
- b. The enforcement of regulations, inspection and control of all active licensed construction and demolition ("C & D") disposal facilities within the SW District (time intervals to be determined by the OEPA).
- c. The enforcement of regulations, inspection, and control of all active infectious waste generators, disposal facilities and transporters operating within the SW District (time intervals to be determined by the OEPA). These inspections shall include the review of EPA-provided lists on transporters and generators of solid waste, and if necessary, shall include additional tracking of such operators.
- d. The annual inspection of all EPA certified recycling facilities within the SW District.
- e. An annual recommendation concerning the continued operation and licensing of all active solid waste and C & D disposal facilities to the CCCHD.
- f. An annual inspection of all inactive solid waste disposal and C & D disposal facilities within the SW District's jurisdiction. A copy of the inspection report shall be placed in the permanent file of each facility.
- g. An annual inspection and licensing of all solid waste collection vehicles operating within the SW District for compliance with all state and local laws and regulations pertaining to solid waste.
- h. Assistance to the SW District in enforcing the rules and regulations governing all private and public haulers of solid waste operating within the SW District, consistent with the Approved or Revised Plan (before offering such assistance, said rules and regulations must first be adopted by the CCCHD).
- i. The investigation and inspection of reported open dumping on both public and private property within the SW District.
- j. The investigation of reported illegal scrap tire collection and disposal sites. The CCCHD shall assist the SW District in the development of a Scrap Tire Management Program pursuant to the Ohio Administrative Code and the State Solid Waste Management Plan.

- k. The sampling and investigation of solid waste-related contamination of private water, public water and/or soil on lands adjacent to active or inactive solid waste facilities, if other testing is not available.
- l. The sampling and investigation of all solid waste-related contamination of surface water, if other testing is not available.
- m. The sampling and investigation of possible ground water contamination in and around all active and inactive solid waste disposal or processing facilities, or C & D disposal facilities, if other testing is not available.
- n. The annual monitoring of methane gas at all active and inactive solid waste disposal sites within the SW District that are required to have explosive gas monitoring plans.
- o. Assistance to the SW District in planning for the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program, and other recycling events.
- p. Assistance to the SW District in development of annual updates of the Approved Plan with any applicable information as it relates to the responsibilities of the CCCHD including, but not limited to, listing all known solid waste disposal facilities, illegal and open dumping sites.
- q. Assistance to the SW District in providing educational programs for: recycling, waste reduction and minimization programs and the use of post consumer recycled products, presented to schools, civic groups and other interested parties.

ARTICLE B: REPORTS TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE SW DISTRICT

- B.1. The CCCHD shall provide to the SW District **UPON REQUEST**, copies of the following:
 - (a) License applications of solid waste disposal facilities, composting sites, transfer stations and C & D disposal sites.
 - (b) Records of specific complaints concerning licensed and unlicensed solid waste disposal and C & D facilities, including open dumps, waste tire dumps and other matters related to solid waste.
 - (c) Specific inspection records and enforcement actions relating to inspections of active and inactive solid waste and C & D facilities and water analysis reports.
 - (d) Copies of the daily disposal logs of all active solid waste and C & D facilities received by the CCCHD.
- B.2. In accordance with Article IV, paragraph 4.2 of this contract, the CCCHD shall provide Quarterly and Year End Summary Reports on all Budgeted Activities performed with moneys from the Solid Waste Fund within the SW District monitoring and enforcement program.

Quarterly Reports shall include:

- A. Detailed Expenditure Reports with totals spent in each budgeted line item.
- B. Summary information on the following:
 - 1) Number of inspections of all active and inactive solid waste and C & D facilities, including any major violations reported;
 - 2) List of all water sampling done that includes the name of each property owner and address;
 - 3) Brief summary of special investigations such as large or long standing problems or releases of significance;
 - 4) Summary of new permits/licenses issued or applications for new permits/licenses;
 - 5) Total number of complaints received and orders issued.

Annual Reports, to be in addition to the four quarterly reports, shall include:

- A) Inventory of all equipment purchased with SW District funds under this or any prior Agreements;
- B) Summary of results of annual methane monitoring of all active and inactive disposal sites;
- C) List of haulers licensed;
- D) Summary of results of annual inspection of all inactive solid waste and C & D disposal facilities.

ARTICLE C: ADDITIONAL SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CCCHD

The CCCHD may from time to time provide additional services for the SW District as authorized by related statutes, upon request by the SW District and notification of the SW District's intent to provide sufficient funding.

CONTRACT

Between the Board of County Commissioners, Clark County, Ohio and the Clark County Combined Health District This Subgrant Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into this 16th day of October, 2025, by and between the Board of County Commissioners, Clark County, Ohio ("County") and the Clark County Combined Health District ("Health District").

1. Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to subgrant to the Health District funds received by the County from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) under the ODH Tuberculosis (TB) Program Funding Agreement (the "ODH Agreement") for TB case management and related public health activities.

2. Subgrant Award

The County agrees to provide the Health District with the funds received from ODH under the ODH Agreement in the total amount of \$3,331.14. The Health District shall use these funds solely for the purposes authorized under the ODH Agreement and in compliance with its terms and conditions. That agreement is attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A.

3. Compliance

The Health District agrees to comply with all applicable requirements, conditions, and obligations contained in the ODH Agreement as though it were the direct recipient of funds from ODH. The Health District further agrees to cooperate fully in providing any information or documentation requested by the County or ODH to ensure compliance.

4. Repayment of Funds

If ODH determines that funds must be repaid due to noncompliance, ineligible expenditures, or any other cause attributable to the Health District, the Health District shall reimburse the County for all funds the County is required to repay to ODH.

5. Term

This Agreement shall commence upon execution and remain in effect through the termination or expiration of the ODH Agreement unless earlier terminated by either party with thirty (30) days' written notice.

6. Other Terms

Neither party shall assign this Agreement or subcontract its obligations without written consent of the other party. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to this funding and supersedes all prior agreements or understandings, whether written or oral.

For the purpose of this Agreement, the term "Party" or "Parties" may be used to refer to either ODH and/or Recipient/County Commissioner individually or collectively. This Agreement must be signed by Recipient and returned along with required attachments to ODH, at Procurement@odh.ohio.gov and Shelby Hale (Shelby.Hale@odh.ohio.gov) within fourteen (14) days. A copy of the fully executed Agreement will be returned to Recipient.

1. **PURPOSE & OBJECTIVE.** All Ohio counties will be eligible to receive funds to offset the cost of public health activities associated with tuberculosis ("TB") cases that complete an approved course of treatment. The provision of such funds and services will benefit the citizens of Ohio in a manner consistent with the overall mission of the Ohio Department of Health to protect and improve the health of all Ohioans. Eligibility criteria are based upon standards of care set forth in the American Thoracic Society ("ATS"), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") and Infectious Disease Society of America ("IDSA") guidance documents, and are referenced in Ohio Revised Code ("O.R.C.") 339.71 through 339.89 and Ohio Administrative Code ("O.A.C.") 3701-15-01 through 3701-15-03. CDC considers this project to be (1) increasing Human Resource Development ("HRD") for the prevention and control of TB through education and training activities, and; (2) increasing the capacity for appropriate medical evaluation and management of persons with TB disease and infection through medical consultation, for which disclosure of protected health information by covered entities is authorized by section 164.512(b) of Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA").
2. **REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS.** Recipient must be an office of an Ohio County Commissioner.

8. AGREEMENT TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

- 8.1. Mutual Promises & Covenants. In consideration of the mutual promises expressed in this Agreement and intending to be legally bound, Recipient agrees to perform, and ODH agrees to pay Recipient, in accordance with §7 and the terms of this Agreement.
- 8.2. Purpose of Agreement. Recipient will provide ODH goods or services in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- 8.3. Scope of Activities, Deliverables, and Subsidy. Recipient shall provide work, services, products and deliverables in the time and manner and for the Subsidy specified in §7 and any attachment specified or incorporated into this Agreement. In consideration, ODH agrees to pay the Subsidy as set forth in §7. If at any time during the term of this Agreement, ODH determines that Recipient is not using the funds allocated in accordance with the terms of this Agreement or if data, including reports, are not entered in a timely manner, ODH may withhold future payments.
 - 8.3.1. Total Agreement Amount. The Total Agreement Amount, as indicated in §7, includes the cost for all services, travel, or any other expenses that Recipient may incur as a result of Recipient's performance of this Agreement. Recipient shall not submit claims for expenses.
 - 8.3.2. Recipient waives the interest provisions of O.R.C. 126.30.
 - 8.3.3. Funds Availability. Pursuant to O.R.C. 126.07, Recipient understands and agrees that this Agreement is contingent upon the availability of lawful appropriations by the Ohio General Assembly and/or if applicable another Agreement Funding Source. The Funding Source will subsidize multiple Recipients under this program. Invoices will be paid out on a first-come-first-served basis. If the Funding Source is depleted or the Ohio General Assembly discontinues funding ODH for the activity specified in this Agreement, this Agreement is terminated as of the date funding expires without further obligation of ODH, State of Ohio, or any other Agreement Funding Source. If ODH has knowledge of insufficient funds to make future payments under this Agreement, ODH will notify Recipient.
 - 8.3.4. Recipient shall furnish its own support staff and services as necessary for the satisfactory performance of this Agreement. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, ODH will not provide any staff, services, or material to Recipient for the purpose of assisting Recipient's performance.
 - 8.3.5. ODH may, from time to time as it deems appropriate, communicate specific instructions and requests to Recipient concerning the performance of the work described in this Agreement. Upon such notice and within ten (10) days after receipt of instructions, Recipient shall comply with such instructions and fulfill such requests to the satisfaction of ODH. It is expressly understood by the Parties that these instructions and requests are for the sole purpose of ensuring satisfactory completion of the work described in this Agreement and are not intended to amend or alter this Agreement or any part thereof. The Agreement Manager will communicate all such instructions and requests to Recipient.
 - 8.3.6. Pursuant to O.R.C. 3701.034, If the Agreement Funding Source identified in §4.1. of this Agreement is one of the following listed funding sources, Recipient certifies that Recipient does not perform nontherapeutic abortions; promote nontherapeutic abortions; contract with any entity that performs or promotes nontherapeutic abortions; is or will become affiliated with any entity that performs or promotes nontherapeutic abortions as defined in O.R.C. §9.04:
 - 8.3.6.1. Violence Against Women Act;
 - 8.3.6.2. Breast and Cervical Cancer Mortality Prevention Act;
 - 8.3.6.3. Infertility prevention project;
 - 8.3.6.4. Minority HIV/AIDS initiative; and/or
 - 8.3.6.5. State of Ohio funds, including infant mortality reduction or infant vitality initiatives.

Any failure by Recipient to comply with this section shall be treated as a material breach of this Agreement.

Time of Performance & Amendments.

- 8.3.7. Agreement Period; Extension. This Agreement shall be effective on the Agreement Beginning Date and shall remain in effect until the Agreement Ending Date. Upon written mutual consent of both parties, this Agreement may be renewed or extended past the Agreement Ending Date, subject to the same terms and conditions of this Agreement and subject to any federal and state directives, regulations, laws, Request for Quote or Request for Proposals relating to the subject matter of this Agreement.

- 8.3.8. Amendments. This writing constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to all matters herein. This Agreement may be amended only by a writing signed by both Parties. However, it is agreed by the Parties that any amendments to laws or regulations cited herein will result in the correlative modification of this Agreement, without the necessity for executing written amendments. Any written amendments to this Agreement shall be prospective in nature. When a new or different term or condition is added, additional consideration is not necessary to bind the Parties.
- 8.4. Suspension and Termination. Either Party may terminate this Agreement sixty (60) days after delivery of written notice. ODH may suspend or terminate this Agreement immediately after delivery of written notice to Recipient if ODH (i) discovers any illegal conduct on the part of Recipient; (ii) discovers any violation of Conflict of Interest and Ethics Laws; (iii) discovers any violation of Drug Free Workplace; (iv) is subject to a loss of funding as specified in §8.3.3; (v) discovers any violation of the funding restriction specified in §8.3.6; (vi) discovers that Recipient or any of its subcontractors has performed any activities under this Agreement in violation of §8.13 regarding Prohibition of the Expenditure of Public Funds for Offshore Services; or (vii) discovers or is notified that a petition in bankruptcy or similar proceeding has been filed by or against Recipient. If at any time during the contractual period a bankruptcy or similar proceeding has been filed by or against Recipient, Recipient shall immediately notify ODH of the filing. When notifying ODH, Recipient shall reference this Agreement.
- 8.4.1. Recipient to Cease Work and Other Agreement Activities. Upon the effective date of termination (immediate or 60-day notice), Recipient shall cease work on the suspended or terminated activities under this Agreement, suspend or terminate any subcontracts relating to such suspended or terminated activities, take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs, and furnish a report, as of the date of receipt of notice of suspension or termination describing the status of all work under this Agreement, including without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and such other matters as ODH may require. Any unused subsidies must be returned to ODH upon termination.
- 8.4.2. Determining Subsidy after Agreement Suspension or Termination. With the exception of a material breach as indicated in §6, §8.3.6 and §8.13, in the event of suspension or termination under this Agreement, Recipient shall be entitled to Subsidy for the work performed prior to the effective date of termination or suspension, which shall be calculated by ODH based on the Subsidy set forth in §7. In the case of services for which Recipient's Subsidy is based upon a fixed fee per deliverable, Subsidy shall be based on a reasonable percentage of the total services performed, as determined by ODH, less any funds previously paid by or on behalf of ODH. ODH shall not be liable for any further claims, and the claims submitted by Recipient shall not exceed the total amount of Subsidy allowed by this Agreement.
- 8.5. Breach or Default.
- 8.5.1. Material Breach. Upon a Material Breach of the Agreement, as designated in §8.2.10 and §8.12, ODH may unilaterally terminate this Agreement without payment of the Subsidy to Recipient as a material breach is understood by the Parties to be so significant that it has destroyed the value of the Agreement and, due to the nature of the services that Recipient offers the State of Ohio, a Material Breach would undermine the sole purpose of the Agreement.
- 8.5.2. Upon breach or default by Recipient of any of the provisions, obligations or duties provided for in this Agreement, ODH may exercise all administrative, contractual, equitable or legal remedies available, without limitation. The waiver of any occurrence of breach or default is not a waiver of subsequent occurrences, and ODH retains the right to exercise all remedies provided for in this Agreement.
- 8.5.3. If ODH or Recipient fail to perform an obligation or obligations under this Agreement and thereafter such failure is waived by the other party; such waiver shall be limited to the particular failure so waived and shall not be deemed to waive other failures hereunder. Waiver by ODH shall not be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the Director of Health or his or her designee, except that Agreement Manager may agree in writing to non-substantial changes to §7, such as changes in form, format, deadlines, or other minimal changes that do not diminish the value of the specified work or deliverable.
- 8.5.4. A breach or default based upon Recipient's failure to comply with §8.13 Offshore Outsourcing is subject to that section with regard to Agreement termination, sanctions, and damages.
- 8.6. Independent Contractor. Recipient acknowledges and agrees any individual providing personal services under this agreement is not an ODH employee (for purposes of O.R.C. Chapter 145) solely on the basis of this Agreement. No agency, employment, joint venture or partnership has been or will be created between the Parties hereto pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Inasmuch as ODH is interested in Recipient's end product, ODH does not control the manner in which Recipient performs this Agreement. ODH is not liable for the workers' Subsidy or unemployment Subsidy payments required by O.R.C. Chapters 4123 and 4141, respectively. In addition, Recipient assumes responsibility for tax liabilities that result from Subsidy

paid to Recipient by ODH. ODH will report any payment made under this Agreement to the Internal Revenue Service on Form 1099. Additionally, no provision contained in this Agreement shall be construed as entitling Recipient to participate in hospital plans, medical plans, sick leave benefits, vacation, and other benefits available to employees of ODH or to become a member of the Public Employees Retirement System (O.R.C. Chapter 145).

8.7. Conflict of Interest and Ethics Laws.

- 8.7.1. Neither Recipient nor any officer, member or employee of Recipient shall, prior to the completion of such work and payment for such work, acquire any interest, personal or otherwise, direct or indirect, which is incompatible or in conflict with or would compromise in any manner or degree with the discharge and fulfillment of his or her functions and responsibilities with respect to the carrying out of such work.
- 8.7.2. Recipient hereby covenants that neither Recipient, nor any officer, member, or employee of Recipient, have any interest, personal or otherwise, direct or indirect, which is incompatible or in conflict with or would compromise in any manner or degree with the discharge and fulfillment of his or her functions and responsibilities under this Agreement.
- 8.7.3. Recipient shall not promise or give to any ODH employee anything of value that is of such a character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon the employee with respect to his or her duties. Recipient shall not solicit an ODH employee to violate any ODH rule or policy relating to the conduct of contracting Parties or to violate O.R.C. 102.03 to 102.04 or O.R.C. 2921.42.
- 8.7.4. Recipient hereby covenants that Recipient and any officer, member or employee of Recipient are in compliance with O.R.C. 102.04 and that if Recipient is required to file a statement pursuant to O.R.C. 102.04(D)(2), such statement has been filed with the ODH General Counsel in addition to any other required filings.
- 8.7.5. Recipient hereby certifies compliance with the executive agency lobbying requirements of O.R.C. 121.60 to 121.69.
- 8.7.6. Recipient hereby certifies and affirms that, as applicable to Recipient, no party listed in Division (I) or (J) of O.R.C. 3517.13 or spouse of such party has made, as an individual, within the two previous calendar years, one or more contributions in excess of \$1,000.00 (One Thousand Dollars) to the Governor or to his campaign committees. If it is determined that Recipient's certification of this requirement is false or misleading, notwithstanding any criminal or civil liabilities imposed by law, Recipient shall return to ODH all monies paid to Recipient under this Agreement. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

8.8. Nondiscrimination and Equal Employment Opportunity.

- 8.8.1. In carrying out this Agreement, Recipient will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, gender, age, disability or military status as defined in section 4112.01 of the Revised Code, national origin or ancestry. Recipient shall comply with all applicable State of Ohio and Federal laws relating to nondiscrimination and equal employment opportunity as those laws may be amended from time to time, including but not limited to the following:
 - 8.8.1.1. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color or national origin;
 - 8.8.1.2. Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1991 (P.L. 102-166) which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color or religion, national origin and sexual orientation in employment;
 - 8.8.1.3. Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency ("LEP"), which requires reasonable steps to ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to programs (see www.lep.gov), and Health and Human Services ("HHS") implementing regulations at 45 CFR part 80;
 - 8.8.1.4. Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended (20 U.S.C. §§ 1681-1683, and 1685-1686), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex, and HHS implementing regulations at 45 CFR part 86;
 - 8.8.1.5. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. § 794), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicaps in the provision of benefits or services as well as employment, and the HHS implementing regulations are codified at 45 CFR parts 84 and 85;
 - 8.8.1.6. The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. §§ 6101-6107), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age and the HHS implementing regulations codified at 45 CFR part 91;

- 8.8.1.7. If grant funding is from the U.S. Department of Justice ("DOJ"), subcontractors must also comply with the following laws and regulations which prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, or disability in the provision of services and employment practices:
- 8.8.1.7.1. The nondiscrimination provision of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 13925(b)(13));
 - 8.8.1.7.2. 28 C.F.R. pt. 42, subpt. C (the DOJ regulations implementing Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964);
 - 8.8.1.7.3. 28 C.F.R. pt. 54 (the DOJ regulations implementing Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972);
 - 8.8.1.7.4. 28 C.F.R. pt. 42, subpt. G (the DOJ regulations implementing Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973); 28 C.F.R. pt. 42, subpt. I (the DOJ regulations implementing the Age Discrimination Act of 1975);
 - 8.8.1.7.5. 28 C.F.R. pt. 38 (the DOJ regulations on the Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations);
 - 8.8.1.7.6. Ex. Order No. 13279 (Equal Protection of the Laws for Faith-Based and Community Organizations); and
 - 8.8.1.7.7. Ex. Order No. 13559 (Fundamental Principles and Policymaking Criteria for Partnerships with Faith-Based and Other Neighborhood Organizations).
- 8.8.1.8. Prohibitions against retaliation against individuals for taking action or participating in an action to secure rights provided in State and Federal laws relating to nondiscrimination.
- 8.9. "Sweatshop Free" Certification. Recipient hereby certifies that all facilities used for the production of supplies or performance of services offered in this Agreement is in compliance with applicable domestic labor, employment, health and safety, environmental and building laws. This certification applies to any and all suppliers and/or subcontractors used by Recipient in furnishing the supplies or services pursuant to this Agreement. If it is determined that Recipient's certification of this requirement is false or misleading, then Recipient understands that it shall be grounds for the termination of this Agreement and may result in the loss of other contracts or grants with the State of Ohio.
- 8.10. Records, Documents and Information. All records, documents, writings or other information produced or used by Recipient in the performance of this Agreement shall be treated according to the following terms:
- 8.10.1. All ODH information which, under the laws of the State of Ohio, is classified as public or private will be treated as such by Recipient. Where there is a question as to whether information is public or private, ODH shall make the final determination. Recipient shall not use any information, systems, or records made available to it for any purpose other than to fulfill the contractual duties specified herein. Recipient agrees to be bound by the same standards of confidentiality that apply to the employees of ODH and the State of Ohio. If at any time during the Agreement period a proceeding has been filed by or against Recipient which would compel disclosure of private information under this Agreement, Recipient shall immediately notify ODH of the filing. The terms of this section shall be included in any subcontracts executed by Recipient for work under this Agreement.
 - 8.10.2. All records relating to work performed and supporting documentation for subsidy submitted to ODH by Recipient shall be retained and made available by Recipient for audit by the State of Ohio (including, but not limited to, ODH, the Auditor of the State of Ohio, the Ohio Inspector General or duly authorized law enforcement officials) and agencies of the United States government for a minimum of three years after Agreement Ending Date. If an audit, litigation, or other action is initiated during this time period, Recipient shall retain such records until the action is concluded and all issues resolved or the three years end, whichever is later.
- 8.11. Disclosure of Personal Health Information. Recipient hereby agrees that the information provided or made available by ODH shall not be used or disclosed other than as permitted or required by this Agreement or as required by law.
- 8.11.1. Recipient will establish and maintain appropriate safeguards to prevent any use or disclosure of the information, other than as provided for by this Agreement. Recipient shall comply with 45 C.F.R.164.504(e)(2)(ii).
 - 8.11.2. Recipient shall immediately report to ODH any discovery of use or disclosure of information not provided for or allowed by the Agreement.

- 8.11.3. Recipient hereby agrees that anytime information is provided or made available to any subcontractor or agent, Recipient must enter into a subcontract with the subcontractor or agent that contains the same terms, conditions, and restrictions on the use and disclosure of information as contained in this Agreement. Recipient must obtain ODH approval prior to entering into such agreements.
- 8.11.4. Recipient agrees to make available and provide right of access to an individual of their protected health information when that protected health information is obtained in the performance of Recipient's obligations under this Agreement.
- 8.12. Prohibition of the Expenditure of Public Funds for Offshore Services. No State of Ohio Cabinet, Agency, Board or Commission will enter into any contract to purchase services provided outside the United States or that allows State of Ohio data to be sent, taken, accessed, tested, maintained, backed-up, stored, or made available remotely outside (located) of the United States, unless a duly signed waiver from the State has been attained. Notwithstanding any other terms of this Agreement, the State reserves the right to recover any funds paid for services the Recipient performs outside of the United States for which it did not receive a waiver. The State does not waive any other rights and remedies provided to the State in the Agreement. Further, no State agency, board, commission, State educational institution, or pension fund will make any purchase from or investment in any Russian institution or company. Notwithstanding any other terms of this Agreement, the State reserves the right to recover any funds paid to Recipient for purchases or investments in a Russian institution or company in violation of this paragraph. The provisions of this paragraph will expire when the applicable Executive Order is no longer effective. The Recipient must complete the Contractor/Subcontractor Affirmation and Disclosure Form affirming the Recipient understands and will meet the requirements of the above prohibition. The Affirmation and Disclosure Form is attached hereto as Attachment A. During the performance of this Agreement, if the Recipient changes the locations(s) disclosed on the Affirmation and Disclosure Form, Recipient must complete and submit a revised Affirmation and Disclosure Form reflecting such changes.
- 8.12.1. Termination, Sanction, Damages. If Recipient or any of its subcontractors perform services under this Agreement outside of the United States or State of Ohio data is sent, taken, accessed, tested, maintained, backed-up, stored, or made available remotely outside the United States, the performance of such services shall be treated as a material breach of the Agreement. ODH is not obligated to pay and shall not pay for such services. If Recipient or any of its subcontractors perform any such services, Recipient shall immediately return to ODH all funds paid for those services. ODH may also recover from Recipient all costs associated with any corrective action ODH may undertake, including but not limited to an audit or a risk analysis, as a result of Recipient performing services outside the United States.
- 8.12.2. ODH may, at any time after the breach, terminate the Agreement, upon written notice to Recipient. ODH may recover all accounting, administrative, legal and other expenses reasonably necessary for the preparation of the termination of the Agreement and costs associated with the acquisition of substitute services from a third party.
- 8.12.3. If ODH determines that actual and direct damages are uncertain or difficult to ascertain, ODH in its sole discretion may recover a payment of liquidated damages in the amount of 1% of the value of the Agreement.
- 8.12.4. ODH, in its sole discretion, may provide written notice to Recipient of a breach and permit Recipient to cure the breach. Such cure period shall be no longer than fourteen (14) calendar days. During the cure period, ODH may buy substitute services from a third party and recover from Recipient any costs associated with acquiring those substitute services.
- 8.12.5. Notwithstanding ODH permitting a period of time to cure the breach or Recipient's cure of the breach, ODH does not waive any of its rights and remedies provided ODH in this Agreement, including but not limited to recovery of funds paid for services Recipient performed outside of the United States, costs associated with corrective action, or liquidated damages.
- 8.13. Assignment. Recipient will not assign any of its rights nor delegate any of its duties and responsibilities under this Agreement without prior written consent of ODH. Any assignment or delegation not consented to may be deemed void by the ODH.
- 8.14. Drug Free Workplace. Recipient shall comply with all applicable state and federal rules, regulations and statutes pertaining to a drug free workplace. Recipient shall make a good faith effort to ensure that all employees of Recipient do not purchase, transfer, use or possess illegal drugs or alcohol or abuse prescription drugs in any way while working on state, county, or municipal property.
- 8.15. Security & Safety Rules. When using or possessing ODH data or accessing State of Ohio networks and systems, the Contractor, its employees, subcontractors and agents must comply with all applicable state rules, policies, and regulations regarding state-provided IT resources, data security and integrity, including the "Supplier" security terms and conditions set forth by the Ohio Department of Administrative Services found at:

When on any property owned or controlled by the State of Ohio, the Contractor must comply with all security and safety rules, regulations, and policies applicable to people on those premises.

- 8.16. Trafficking Victims Act. In carrying out this Agreement, Recipient, its employees, subcontractors and their employees shall comply with Section 106 (g) of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, as amended (22 USC 7104); and is now located at 2 CFR Part 175 during the term of this Agreement. Recipient must include this provision in its contracts and subcontracts under this Agreement. Recipient must inform ODH immediately of any information regarding violation of the foregoing. Recipient understands that its failure to comply with this provision may subject ODH to loss of federal funds. Recipient agrees to compensate ODH for any such funds lost due to its failure to comply with this condition, or the failure of its subcontractors to comply with this condition.
- 8.17. Compliance.
- 8.17.1. Recipient affirmatively represents and warrants to ODH that it is not subject to a finding for recovery under O.R.C. 9.24 or that it has taken the appropriate remedial steps required under O.R.C. 9.24 or otherwise qualifies under that section. Recipient further affirmatively represents and warrants to ODH that it is not debarred or suspended from entering into state of Ohio contracts pursuant to O.R.C. 125.25 and is not subject to exclusion, disqualification or ineligibility as defined in 2 C.F.R. 180.110. Recipient agrees that if this representation and warranty is deemed false, the Agreement will be void *ab initio* as between the Parties to this Agreement, and any funds paid by ODH hereunder shall be immediately repaid to ODH, or an action for recovery may be immediately commenced by ODH for the recovery of said funds.
- 8.17.2. Recipient certifies that Recipient is not federally debarred from participating in government contracts funded by federal money as described in 2 C.F.R. 180.220. If at any time during the contractual period Recipient is federally debarred from participating in government contracts funded by federal money, for whatever reason, Recipient shall immediately notify ODH of the debarment.
- 8.17.3. Recipient certifies that all approvals, licenses, registrations or other qualifications necessary to conduct business where the services are performed have been obtained and are operative. If at any time during the contractual period Recipient becomes disqualified from conducting business in Ohio, for whatever reason, Recipient shall immediately notify ODH of the disqualification.
- 8.17.4. Recipient certifies that it is in compliance and will remain in compliance throughout the duration of this Agreement with all other applicable federal and state laws, regulations, rules and Executive Orders and will require the same certification from its subgrantees or subcontractors.
- 6.13. Limitation of Liability. Recipient agrees to accept and be responsible for the actions or omissions of its agents, officers, and employees arising out of this Agreement, and nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted or construed to place any responsibility for professional acts or omissions onto ODH; and ODH agrees to accept and be responsible for the actions or omissions of its agents, officers, and employees arising out of this Agreement, and nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted or construed to place any such responsibility on the Recipient. ODH's liability for damages, whether in contract or in tort, shall not exceed the Total Agreement Amount or the amount of direct damages incurred by Recipient, whichever is less, and is the Recipient's sole and exclusive remedy for ODH's failure to perform its obligations under this Agreement. In no event shall ODH be liable for any indirect or consequential damages, including loss of profit, even if ODH knew or should have known of the possibility of such damages. Neither party is responsible to the other party for nonperformance or delay in performance of the terms of this Agreement due to acts of God, wars, riots, strikes, or other causes beyond the control of the Parties.
- 6.14. Insurance. Until all obligations under this Contract are satisfied, and without limiting Contractor's indemnification obligations herein, Contractor shall procure and maintain, for the duration of the Contract, the insurance policies set forth below. Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the services hereunder by the Contractor, its agents, representatives, or employees. Contractor shall also procure and maintain insurance for claims arising out of their services including, but not limited to, loss, damage, theft or other misuse of data, infringement of intellectual property, invasion of privacy and breach of data. All commercial insurance required shall be provided by insurers with a rating of not less than A-VII from A.M. Best or a comparable rating agency. Coverage shall be at least as broad as:
- 6.14.1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): written on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit. The defense costs shall be outside the policy limit. The State of Ohio, its officers, officials and employees are to be covered as additional insureds on the

commercial general liability policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.

- 6.14.2. Automobile Liability insurance covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Contractor has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with a limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
 - 6.14.3. Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of Ohio, or the state in which the work will be performed, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. If Contractor is a sole proprietor, partnership or has no statutory requirement for workers' compensation, Contractor must provide a letter stating that it is exempt and agreeing to hold State of Ohio harmless from loss or liability for such.
 - 6.14.4. In lieu of providing the policies of insurance in the amounts specified in this section, Recipient instead may elect to self-insure such risk in accordance with the laws of this state, based upon a good-faith analysis of the potential liability as it relates to the work to be performed under this Agreement, provided that Recipient is one of the following: A "state institution of higher education" as defined in O.R.C. 3345.12(A)(1), a community college established under O.R.C. Chapter 3354, a state community college established under O.R.C. Chapter 3358, a university branch established under O.R.C. Chapter 3355, or technical college established under O.R.C. Chapter 3357; a "state agency", which means a department, bureau, board, commission, office, agency, institution or other organized body or instrumentality established by the constitution and laws of the state of Ohio for the exercise of any function of state government; or a "political subdivision" of this state, which means a municipal corporation, township, county, school district, or other body corporate and politic responsible for governmental activities only in geographical areas smaller than that of the state.
- 8.18. Rights in Deliverables, Data and Copyrights. Any intellectual property or copyrightable materials produced specifically for and as a deliverable under the terms of this Agreement, including any documents, data, photographs and negatives, electronic reports, records, software, source code, or other media, shall become the property of ODH, which shall have an unrestricted right to reproduce, distribute, modify, maintain, and use the Deliverables. This section does not apply to any preexisting materials owned by Recipient. Recipient shall not obtain copyright, patent, or other proprietary protection for the Work or Deliverables under this Agreement. ODH grants Recipient an unlimited license to use work and materials produced by Recipient under this Agreement, including the right to publish the results of any work performed under this Agreement. In the event that the Agreement Funding Source is federal funding, in whole or in part, such license is subject to the royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to such material retained by the United States government. Further, the work must state: "This publication was made possible by Grant or Cooperative Agreement Number funded by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Its contents are solely the responsibility of the authors and do not necessarily represent the official views of Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or the Ohio Department of Health." Recipient shall not include in any Deliverable or Work any copyrighted matter, unless the copyright owner gives prior written approval to use such copyrighted matter.
- 8.19. Attachments. Attachments and documents referenced in this Agreement are made a part hereof, and are incorporated as terms and conditions of this Agreement. In the event of a conflict of terms, the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall take precedence over any conflicting terms.
- 8.20. Construction. This Agreement is governed, construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio. Further, the Ohio courts shall have jurisdiction over the subject matter and the Parties hereto in connection with disputes concerning validity and enforcement of this Agreement. In the event that any terms of this Agreement or applicable statutes conflict, then statutes and regulations take precedence.
- 8.21. Severability. If any portion of this Agreement is found to be unenforceable by operation of statute or by administrative or judicial decision, the enforceability of the balance of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby, provided that the absence of the unenforceable provision does not render impossible the performance of the remainder of this Agreement.
- 8.22. Amendments. This writing constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to all matters herein. This Agreement may be amended only by a writing signed by both Parties. However, it is agreed by the Parties that any amendments to laws or regulations cited herein will result in the correlative modification of this Agreement, without the necessity for executing written amendments. Any written amendments to this Agreement shall be prospective in nature. When a new or different term or condition is added, additional consideration is not necessary to bind the Parties.

- 8.23. Headings. The headings in this Contract are for convenience only and will not affect the interpretation of any of the Agreement terms and conditions.
- 8.24. Survival. All sections herein relating to payment, confidentiality, liability, record retention, audit, conflicts of interest and ethics, publicity, warranties and limitations on damages shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- 8.25. Notices.
- 8.25.1. Form of Notice. All notices, requests, claims, demands and other communications between the Parties shall be in writing.
- 8.25.2. Method of Notice. All notices shall be given (i) by delivery in person (ii) by a nationally recognized next day courier service, (iii) by first class, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, or (iv) by electronic mail to the address of the Party specified in this Agreement as "ODH Agreement Manager" or "Recipient's Authorized Representative" or such other address as either Party may specify in writing. The Parties acknowledge that change in authorized representatives and their addresses are not substantive and a change shall be recognized with proper Notice.
- 8.25.3. Receipt of Notice. All notices shall be effective upon (i) receipt by the party to which notice is given, or (ii) on the fifth (5th) day following mailing, whichever occurs first.

October 16, 2025: Adoption of Bylaws

ARTICLE I: MISSION AND FUNCTION

The mission of the Board shall be to support the overall mission of the Clark County Combined Health District: protect and improve the health of the community through the prevention of disease, the promotion of wellness, and the protection from injury.

The Board's support of the Health District's functions includes but are not limited to:

1. Set policy
2. Appoint and review the work of the Health Commissioner
3. Approve the hiring of staff
4. Review operational data
5. Approve Public Health programs
6. Approve Strategic Plans
7. Approve financial actions including the annual budget
8. Advocate for Public Health with community leaders and citizens
9. Support Public Health fundraising activities

ARTICLE II: ROLE OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The role of the Board of Health is to ensure essential public health services are being provided to the community by adopting policies and making orders and regulations as necessary for the promotion of health and prevention of disease and the abatement or suppression of nuisances. In addition, the Board shall make such orders and approve such policies as are needed for the administration of the health department in meeting the stated mission goals, standards of the Ohio Department of Health and requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and the Ohio Administrative Code. Power and authority to perform such quasi-legislative, executive, and administration functions is specified or implied in appropriate sections of the Ohio Revised Code. The Board may also hear appeals to public health orders issued by the staff for extenuating circumstances with a view to either affirm, grant extensions of time, provide waivers where allowable, or refer to the local legal authority for appropriate legal action.

ARTICLE III: MANDATED PROGRAMS

Ohio's local health districts throughout the state share the statutory obligation to assure the preservation and improvement of public health in Ohio. This authority is shared primarily with three state agencies: the Ohio Department of Health, the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. The Ohio Revised Code and the Ohio Administrative Code delineate where local health districts are responsible for day-to-day oversight and enforcement on behalf of state agencies.

ARTICLE IV: MEETINGS

Section 1: Meeting Schedule and Format

- A. The regular meeting of the Board of Health shall be held on the third Thursday of each month at 6:00pm at the administrative offices of the Clark County Combined Health District at 529 East Home Road, Springfield, Ohio, 45503. If the meeting day is a holiday or there is not a quorum, said meeting shall be held at the discretion of the President and Board, but in no event shall the Board meet less than once in each calendar month.
- B. Notice about the monthly meeting shall be delivered by email to each Board member not less than three days before each meeting. Any necessary supporting documents will be provided along with an agenda and minutes of the previous meeting.
- C. Special meetings may be called either by the President, or in the case of his/her absence the President Pro-Tempore, or by any four members of the Board of Health. All special meetings shall be held at the administrative offices of the Clark County Combined Health District or at a location determined by the President of the Board. At least 72 hours prior notice shall be provided for each special meeting to the Board and to the public unless an emergency condition warrants meeting with shorter notification.
- D. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Members, whose position is vacant due to death, resignation, or failure to appoint will not count for the purpose of determining a quorum for that meeting.
- E. All meetings of the Board and committee meetings are open public meetings. Executive Sessions may be held which meet the requirements of the Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 provided the requisite motion with statement of purpose is passed by a roll call vote in open session.
- F. Meeting minutes shall be written by the Board Secretary (the Health Commissioner) or his designee and shall be an accurate summary of the proceedings and intent of discussions and decisions; minutes are not intended to be a word-for-word transcription of the meeting.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS AND ATTENDANCE

Section 1: Structure and Composition

- A. In both general and combined health districts, the chairperson of each township trustees, the president of the board of county commissioners, and the chief executive of each village serve as a District Advisory Council (DAC). This council appoints board of health members, who in turn appoint the Health Commissioner.
- B. The Board of Health shall consist of no less than seven members. The DAC holds the responsibility of appointing three members to the Board of Health, the City of Springfield appoints three members to the Board, and the Board selects and appoints one member.
- C. Members of the Board of Health shall serve a term of five years. Terms shall commence on April 1 and expire on March 31. New members replacing a member who has not completed his or her term will serve the remainder of that term.
- D. The Health Commissioner shall serve as Secretary to the Board of Health as required by the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 2: Election

- A. The elective offices of the Board of Health shall be the President and President Pro-Tempore. These offices shall be elected at the January meeting of the Board of Health.
- B. Terms of elected offices of the Board of Health shall be for one year and shall accordingly commence/expire at the end of the January Board of Health meeting.
- C. No officer shall hold an office for more than five consecutive years.
- D. In the event that an officer of the Board vacates his/her seat on the Board, the Board shall elect another member to fill their seat at the next regular meeting.

Section 3: Orientation

- A. Each new member of the Board of Health shall participate in board member orientation. Orientation includes an in-person meeting with the Health Commissioner.
- B. Board members will be oriented to the current Health District structure, current and future public health programs, and how public health impacts the health of our communities. New Board members will receive orientation materials that include information and obligations needed to perform their duties.

Section 4: Duties

- A. The President shall conduct all meetings of the Board, sign records thereof, and perform generally all the duties performed by presidents of like bodies or commissions. He/she shall have a vote on all issues and shall be a member of all committees with the right to vote. The President has the discretion to appoint the Health Commissioner to conduct the board meetings.
- B. The President Pro-Tempore shall perform the duties of the President in his/her absence and provide the President any assistance required.
- C. The Board of Health shall follow guidelines established by the Ohio Association of Boards of Health.

Section 5: Authority

- A. The legal authority for boards of health and local health departments is found in the Ohio Revised Code. Implementation guidelines are found in the Ohio Administrative Code. Chapter 37 of the Ohio Revised Code of interest to Health Districts include 3701 (creation of the Ohio Department of Health), 3707 (description of local boards of health) and 3709 (description of local health districts, city, general and combined).
- B. An individual Board of Health member has no authority to order or direct Health District staff. The Board's authority comes by a majority vote of the Board at a meeting of the Board.

Section 6: Vacancies

- A. If a Board member vacates his/her seat on the Board, the President of the Board shall request the Secretary to notify the appointing authority of the vacancy in order for the vacancy to be filled.
- B. When a vacancy occurs in a position filled by the district advisory council, the current Board of Health members may, by majority vote during a regular or special meeting, temporarily appoint a new Board member to fulfill the vacated member's position and term until the district advisory council can make an appointment to the Board for the unexpired vacated term.

Section 7: Attendance

- A. If a Board member misses more than fifty percent of the regular board meetings in a rolling twelve-month period, the Board may request the appointing authority to declare the position vacant and appoint a replacement member. At the direction of the Board, the Secretary or designee shall contact any board member who has had six unexcused absences from the board of health meetings in a one-year period. If no response is received in thirty days or if the member states that he/she does not wish to remain a member, the new vacancy may be brought before the appointing authority to appoint a replacement. If the board member states that he/she wishes to remain on the Board of Health, he/she shall be considered a member in good standing, provided the member does not miss seventh Board of Health meeting in a one-year period.

Section 8: Removal

- A. A Board of Health member may be removed from office by the Director of Health of the Ohio Department of Health if the Board Member is guilty of misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance or has failed to perform any or all duties required in the Ohio Revised Code. Removal of a Board member shall follow the Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3709.35.

Section 9: Term of Office

- A. A member of the Board of Health may serve as many terms, consecutive or non-consecutive, as deemed appropriate by the appointing authority.

ARTICLE VI: COMMITTEES

Committees may be established as deemed appropriate by the Board of Health to focus on a single topic. The President of the Board shall appoint members to committees. Committees established for the purpose of personnel or finance and shall consist of the President of the Board, two board members, and the Health Commissioner.

ARTICLE VII: PROCEDURE

The Board may adopt its own rules of procedure but shall rely on Robert's Rules of Order for questions of parliamentary procedure, except where they are inconsistent with the standing rules of the Board or are contrary to existing laws of the State of Ohio.

ARTICLE VIII: CLASSIFICATION, COMPENSATION, AND EXPENSES

Section 1: Classification

- A. Board members are not public employees as defined in the Ohio Revised Code Chapter 145.012 (A) (7). Work of Board members is considered self-employment under IRC 1402 (c) (2) (E) and these individuals are not employees with respect to this work.
- B. Board members are not regarded as employees of the Clark County Combined Health District. Board members are appointed to their position by an appointing authority and do not follow the usual path of employment according to the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Section 2: Compensation

- A. Board members are paid as fee-basis officials. A fee-basis public official receives and retains remuneration directly from the public; in Clark County, this is through the public health levy. Work of Board members is considered self-employment under IRC 1402 (c) (2) (E). Fee-basis public officials are subject to self-employment tax.
- B. Each member of the Board shall be paid a sum not to exceed eighty dollars a day for the member's attendance at each meeting of the Board in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Chapter 3709.02 (B). No member shall receive compensation for attendance at more than eighteen meetings in any year. The ORC further states that each member of the Board may elect to receive travel expenses at rates established by the Director of Budget and Management pursuant to Section 126.31 of the ORC to cover the actual and necessary travel expenses incurred for travel to and from meetings that take place outside the county in which the member resides. Board members may waive all or part of the aforementioned compensation or reimbursement. Board members elect their compensation amount at the beginning of the term they are being appointed for and are not able to make changes to these options until reappointment. Board members are compensated in a similar manner to independent contractors.
- C. Fee-basis per meeting payments made to Board members are not considered earnable salary in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code Chapter 145-1-26 (G) (9).

Article IX: RECORDS

All records of the Board of Health shall be kept at the Clark County Combined Health District and follow the agency Records Retention Policy.

Article X: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

When any matter comes before the Board in which a member has a personal or financial interest, said member shall, prior to the vote being taken, announce a conflict of interest and shall abstain from voting. The abstaining member shall be counted for quorum purposes.

Article XI: EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Board of Health may, by motion, roll call vote, and statement of purpose, enter into Executive Session in accordance with the Ohio Revised Code Chapter 121.22 for the following purposes:

- 1. To consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion, or compensation of a public employee or official, or the investigation of charges or complaints against a public employee, official, licensee, or regulated individual, unless the public employee, official, licensee, or regulated individual requests a public hearing.
- 2. To consider the purchase of property for public purposes, or for the sale of property at competitive bidding, if premature disclosure of information would give an unfair competitive or bargaining advantage to a person whose personal, private interest is averse to the general public interest.
- 3. Conferences with an attorney for the public body concerning disputes involving the public body that are the subject of pending or imminent court action.
- 4. Preparing for, conducting, or reviewing negotiations or bargaining sessions with public employees concerning their compensation or other terms and conditions of their employment.

5. Matters required to be kept confidential by federal law or rules or state statutes.
6. Specialized details of security arrangements where disclosure of the matters discussed might reveal information that could be used for the purpose of committing, or avoiding prosecution for, a violation of the law.

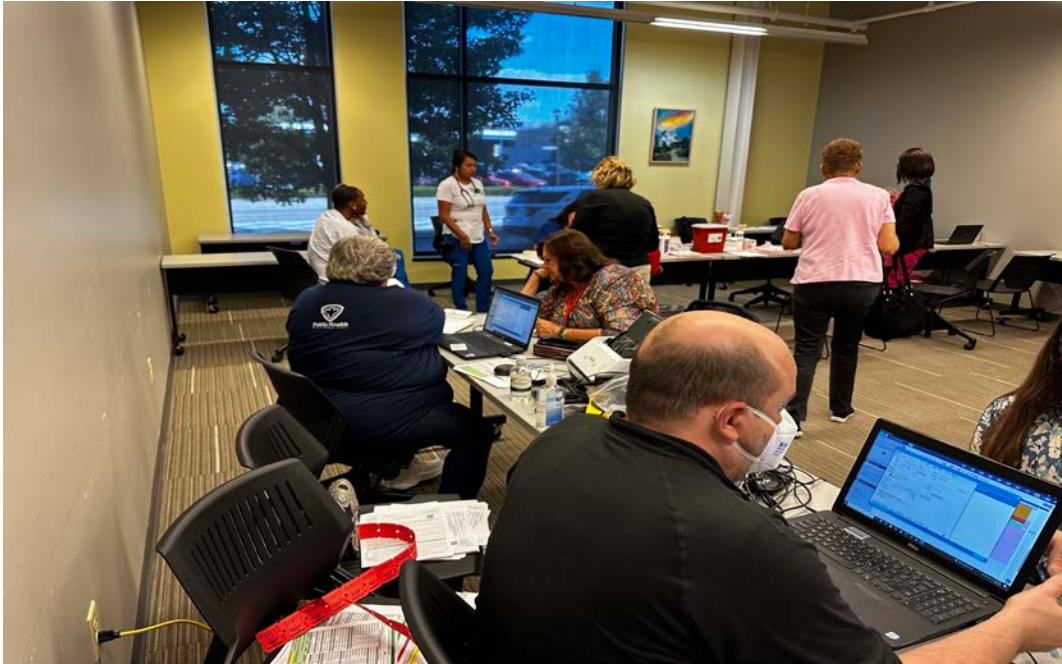

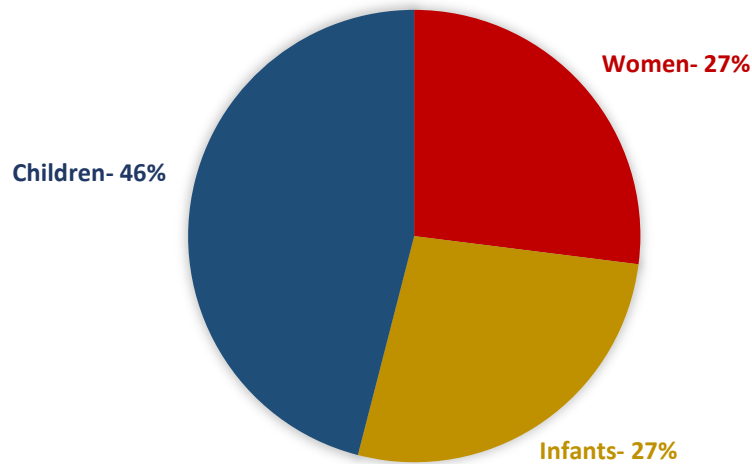

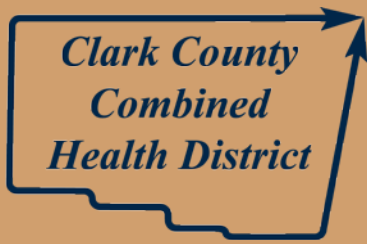

Drug Overdose Prevention

- **One2One**

- o Second Harvest Food Bank (SHFB) Partnership: over the month of September, we provided food to 311 clients.
- o Sheltered Inc. Partnership: over the month of September, we completed 0 housing referrals.
- o Department of Job and Family Services Clark County Partnership: over the month of September, we assisted 2 clients in completing applications for Medicaid and SNAP benefits.
 - Harm Reduction Program stats from August 2025 (this data is always 1 month behind):
 - Client Visits: 232
 - Syringes Exchanged: 8,035
 - Narcan Kits Distributed: 17*
 - Treatment Referrals: 3

*Number is low due to directing clients to access Narcan kits via naloxone box that is outside of the Southern Village office location.

- **Substance Abuse/DOP**

- o The new grant year has officially started. Our partnership with Montgomery, Butler, and Greene counties place community navigators will continue into year 3.
- o Program staff and Substance Abuse Coalition members held a GROW (Get Recovery Options Working) Blitz on September 19th.
 - Addresses Visited: 25
 - Resource Bags: 25
 - Narcan Distributed: 16
 - We recently partnered with Trinity Missionary Church to put together snack bags that we can distribute on our GROW Blitzes.
- o Program staff is working with ODH to place a Narcan Vending Machine in Clark County. They are meeting with partners to see who might be interested in this opportunity. More information will be shared when it becomes available.

Adolescent Health

- The program has continued to develop relationships with youth serving organizations and other community stakeholders to serve on the grant's advisory committee.
- During the FY25 grant year, program staff partnered with 4 youth serving organizations and trained a total of 83 adults on trauma informed care. Staff will continue to offer training throughout the FY26 grant year that began on October 1st.

Safe Communities

- The FY26 grant cycle began on October 1, 2025.
- Program Staff will be attending several community Halloween and High School Homecoming events to spread awareness and messaging on the dangers of distracted and impaired driving.

Motorcycle Ohio

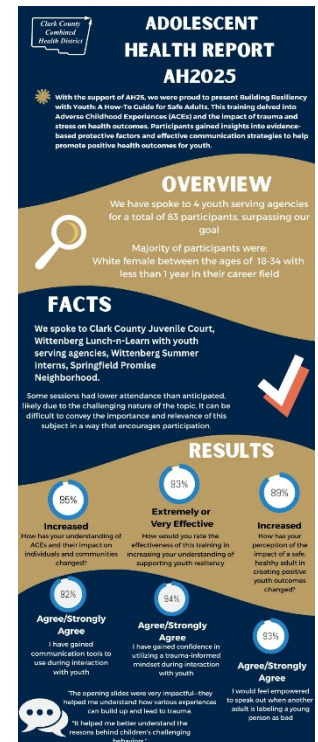
- Classes are over for the season.

Tobacco

- Throughout the past month, program staff have continued to foster new partnerships throughout the community.
- Program staff have continued to advocate and plan for Tobacco retailer license policy enhancements.
- Program staff is working in collaboration with the Mercy Health Cancer Center to plan outreach activities promoting lung cancer screenings and tobacco education/cessation resources.

Creating Healthy Communities

- CHC continues to be an active member of several local coalitions and taskforces, such as the Clark County Local Foods Council and the Chronic Disease Taskforce.
- The FY26 grant year started on October 1, 2025. The strategies for this year include partnering with the park district to upgrade and install addition bike fix-it stations throughout the county to encourage active commuting, partnering with Second Harvest Food Bank to invest and support their mobile food distribution infrastructure, and collaborating with the Clark County Local Foods Council to supply mini grants to community gardens to help support infrastructure.

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Q3 SUMMARY:

In the 3rd quarter of 2025, there were 386 reported deaths, slightly up from 373 in Q3 2024. The leading causes were heart disease, cancer, and chronic respiratory issues. Notable increases were seen in deaths from hypertension and kidney disease compared to Q3 2024.
