

Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health Meeting Minutes October 16, 2025

President Valerie Moore called the October 16, 2025, Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health meeting to order at 6:01 pm.

Board members present: Dr. Sherry Robinette, Dala DeWitt, Scott Griffith, Dr. Valerie Moore. Dr. Bernadette deGuzman, and Mike Adamson.

No Board members absent

Mr. Griffith motioned to adopt the October 16, 2025, agenda and Mr. Adamson seconded. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

<u>Proposed 2026 Environmental Health Fees</u>: Zibby said that this is the final reading for the proposed 2026 environmental health fees.

New Business

2026 Environmental Health Fees: Zibby explained that we are requesting consideration for adopting the 2026 environmental health fees as proposed at the August 21, 2025, board of health meeting. She noted that if adopted the fees will be publicly posted in the local newspaper and will become effective December 1, 2025.

<u>Possible Sewage Nuisance – 4492 Willowdale Road</u>: Zibby advised that the nuisance has been abated and the item was therefore removed from the agenda.

Sewage Variance Request - 12811 East National Road: Zibby explained that the homeowners have requested a sewage variance from the administrative code for a replacement septic system. She said that the request is based on the requirement to use soil absorption as the final treatment method, which cannot be met due to the property spray irrigation system. Zibby turned the floor over to the homeowners, Trisha and Adrian Lucero and their daughter, Jyra. Trisha said that their family relocated to Ohio in August of 2023 and extensively searched for property with land suitable for their daughters dream of owning goats. She said that since purchasing their home on the historic National Road it has become a mini farm, with a small flock of chickens and a herd of goats. She said that they discovered an issue with their septic leech filed in July. Further investigation reveled that the leech field was insufficient for a family of 5 or a home that size, which led to the process of finding a soil scientist, designer and septic system installers familiar with their situation. She said that finding a suitable replacement area has been challenging and only one area has been determined to meet the soil requirements, located in the wooded portion of their land. She further explained that the soil scientist and designer informed them that there were no other options except a spray system and the proposed spray system would limit the grazing areas for their goats, leading to decreased food quality and quantity. She added that the goats cannot be on wet soil due to the risk of rotting, hoof problems, and other health issues. She said that given the concerns with the proposed spray system, they are proposing an alternative solution, which is an aerobic discharging system in the same areas as the current system, following the natural water path. She said that they have the support of the neighboring farmer, Mr. Mullins, and the Harmony Township Trustees, who have also been in contact with Zibby. Adrian said that they understand that they are confident that the proposed aerobic discharging system will not pose any risks to humans, animals or crops. Jyra thanked the board for the opportunity to speak on behalf of her beloved goats, Biscuits, Gravy and Honey. She said that as a responsible pet owner she is committed to providing the best possible quality of life for her animals and their well-being will be at risk due to the potential health issues with the spray system. The board discussed the variance request and requested written documentation from the neighboring farmer to confirm his agreement to the proposed alternative discharging system. Ms. DeWitt motioned to table the agenda item to allow the homeowner time to provide the requested documentation. Dr. deGuzman seconded the motion.

2026 Solid Waste District Contract: Chris said that the 2026 Solid Waste District Contract is valued at \$132,000.00, which represents a marginal decrease from the previous year's figure. He said that starting from 2027, the contract will undergo a significant reduction in value due to reallocated funds to other agencies. The exact rate and magnitude of this decrease are yet to be determined, but the current proposal enables us to continue our regular solid waste investigations and remedial actions, which are mandated by law. He said that the funding for these activities is not provided by local or state authorities, but rather through the district's revenue generated from tipping fees at our local facilities and their own budgets.

County Commissioners/ODH TB Contract: Chris said that this contact has a value of approximately \$3,300.00. The contract is structured as a deliverable based agreement, where our agency will provide services to tuberculosis patients, the county commissioners receive funding directly from the Ohio Department of Health, which then reimburses us for the services rendered. He said that there is a provision in the ORC that county commissioners are responsible for ownership and management of the tuberculosis program, as well as the creation and distribution of TB control units and most designate the local health department as the responsible authority.

He said that currently, the nursing program is not isolated within a designated fund, which can lead to complexities in tracking financial transactions. He said that the creation of a donations fund will enable us to receive and manage grants and other forms of donations in a more efficient and compliant manner. This fund will serve as a distinct entity, allowing us to track income and expenses separately from the general fund.

She said that her commitment and excellence have been evident in her voluntary service as one of the Southwest Region's nutrition representatives for the State WIC Nutrition and Breastfeeding Advisory Council, as well as her recent completion of the Certified Lactation Specialist course from special grant funding through the state WIC program. She said that Nicole has demonstrated a clear ambition and strong work ethic, which are evident in her daily performance which she believes justifies the position upgrade.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

BOH Bills (Expenses & Vouchers): Jeff presented the expenses and vouchers for approval.

Monthly Fund Report: Jeff shared the monthly fund report. He referred to fund 8220, which is the WIC fund, and said that unfortunately, the revenue figures for this line are currently overstated, resulting in an incorrect representation of our financial performance. He said that we received additional payment, which resulted in an inflated appearance on our financial results. Chris said that as we approach the end of the year, he would like to provide some context for our year-over-year performance. He said that compared to this time last year, our income is down 16% due to the loss of certain grants, however, our expenses have decreased by approximately 30% because of cost containment measures that we have implemented, and he thanked the team for understanding and cooperation in these efforts.

PUBLIC HEALTH TEAM REPORTS

Environmental Health: Zibby said that she would like to take a moment to address a pressing concern that has been affecting our community. Over the past month, we have seen a notable rise in reported incidents involving rabies, resulting in encounters with wildlife. She said that this trend is not unique to our area, as it has been observed throughout the state over the past few years. Notably, the species most commonly associated with rabies in our region is the racoon variant, which has been a focus of the state's vaccination efforts through a springtime baiting program. She said that though these efforts have shown promise in keeping the racoon variant at bay, we cannot rule out the possibility of individual animals, including skunks, entering our area through various means. She said that it is essential to recognize the threat of rabies in our region is relatively low, but the risks associated with not taking preventative measures can be severe. Prompt post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) is the only effective means of preventing rabies-related fatalities. She shared two crucial measures to mitigate the risk: 1. ensuring that all pets are up to date on their rabies vaccinations and 2. practicing responsible wildlife interaction and observation, adhering to the following guidelines: avoid feeding or approaching wildlife, refrain from attempting to rescue or pet wild animals and observe from a safe distance and do not attempt to handle

or touch wildlife. She said that by taking these precautions, we can minimize the risk of rabies transmission and promote public health.

Nursing and Clinics: Cheyenne said that they attended the health expo last week and distributed 30 vaccines, aligning with their typical outreach efforts. She highlighted two personnel additions to their team: Tony Runyan, is their new Complex Medical Help (CMH) nurse and Madisen Werts will join us in two weeks as a public health nurse focusing on communicable disease. She referred to the communicable disease report for the 3rd quarter and noted that there have been changes in reporting protocols regarding COVID-19. Historically, any diagnosis of a reportable disease was documented immediately, however, the new guidelines now only make hospitalizations reportable, like influenza. She said that this change is intended to improve the accuracy of our data, as home testing has long been an issue. She said that they are optimistic that this adjustment will lead to more reliable numbers, particularly as we move into the end of the quarter.

Early Childhood: Lori said that Mickie DeWitt will retire at the end of the year and thanked her for her dedication to the role, spanning approximately 9 years. She said that we did post early for the position with the intention of attracting a suitable candidate to work alongside Mickie. She said that she is pleased to announce that Toni Perez, an existing home visitor has been selected to assume the supervisor position, effective November 10, 2025. She said that this will enable Toni to leverage existing experience and expertise to drive positive outcomes in our program. She said that we will post to fill Toni's current position as home visitor in the coming weeks.

Women, Infants & Children: Emily said that they recently hired Brianna Rutter for the WIC Support clerk position and Madison Jones for the Certifying Health Professional position. She said that they saw a significant increase in their caseload for September, which has been their second highest to date. She said that surge in activity is a testament to the dedication and hard work of the team, particularly Ashley, whose caseload reached a record high due to the arrival of new hospitalizations. She thanked every member of the team for their tireless efforts in supporting their participants.

Health Planning: Gracie said that October marks the commencement of various grant years for health planning initiatives, one of which focuses on Creating Healthy Communities. She said that in the context of health planning grants, there are specific objectives that Ashley focuses on for the CHC grant throughout the year. One of these focuses is building upon the momentum of the bike share program initiated by the library, in partnership with the parks district, to install and repair bike-fix-it stations across the county. She said that this initiative aims to provide accessible bike repair services, especially along bile trails, enabling individuals to efficiently address minor issues and continue their rides without interruption. She said that they plan to partner with Second Harvest Food Bank to invest in and support the infrastructure of their mobile food distribution and mobile sites. Additionally, they will collaborate with the Clark County Foods Local Council to supply mini grants to community gardens, with the goal of enhancing their infrastructure and supporting the valuable work they conduct. She invited the board to our upcoming Fall Festival, taking place on October 30th, and said that the event will be held in the courtyard at the Home Road building and that we have some exciting things planned for the event.

No Special Report

<u>Legislative Update & Health Commissioner's Comments</u>: Chris said that we will have a new board member next month. He said that the District Advisory Council appointed Jessica Johnson to fulfill the remainder of Dr. Gulledge's term which runs through March of 2028. He said that Jessica is a resident of

Springfield Township and is a full-time professor at Wittenberg University in the nursing program. He thanked the board for allowing us to close for our bi-annual workforce development day on October 10th. He said that we had a packed agenda and learned a lot which he believes that we will see in the feedback evaluation. He provided a brief update on the strategic plan highlighting that he and Gracie are meeting to combine all the internal and external data and hope to be able to present that to the board by the end of the year. He said that we are starting to see a little bit of flu activity in our region. He said that based on the little bit of activity that we are seeing as far as flu hospitalizations already, I think this season's going to start ramping up soon. He noted that COVD numbers across the nation are continuing to remain low. He said that something we have not heard about in a while is H5N1, avian influenza, and it is starting to rear its ugly head again. If you look across the nation, in terms of the number of flocks, both commercial and backyard flocks, we are starting to see some increases which is always a concern because as we know, this doesn't move from person to person, but we have had a handful of cases moving from chicken to person. He said that there is a lot of work behind the scenes to protect the public. He said that Governor DeWine issued an executive order to ban the sale and storage and supplying of intoxicating hemp products here in Ohio. He said that there are 4 House and Senate bills trying to do the same thing and we will be watching that closely. He references HB309 which is the proposal to address the property tax issue. He said that this bill would give our county budget commissions some power around levies in their first 5 years. If they are new levies, it will allow the county budget commission to reduce property taxes if they feel the entity receiving it doesn't need it after a review of their budget. It also allows them to adjust the total value. He mentioned the government shutdown and the people impacted by it including those at the CDC, noting that there have been 50% budget cuts across the CDC and HHS in areas that are critical to our health.

Dr. Valerie Moore, President Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health Below is a quick description of the many different types of septic systems in Ohio. A traditional leach trench septic system, the most common type in Ohio, treats household wastewater using a two-stage process involving a septic tank and a leach field (or soil absorption field). The system uses natural physical and biological processes to treat the wastewater before it returns to the groundwater.

A spray irrigation septic system uses advanced pretreatment to treat wastewater to a high degree before spraying it on the surface for final treatment by soil absorption. These systems are used in situations unsuitable for conventional septic systems, such as on wooded lots, steep slopes, and require more maintenance due to the higher risk of human contact with the treated wastewater. Components include an aeration treatment unit (ATU), a disinfection unit, a pump tank, and spray heads.

A mound septic system is an above-ground, pressurized system designed for sites with shallow bedrock, high water tables, or limited soil depth. It consists of a septic tank, a dosing (pump) chamber, and the mound itself, which is a mound of sand filled with a gravel bed and pipes. Septic effluent is pumped in controlled doses from the dosing chamber into the pipes in the mound, where it is treated by the sand fill before being absorbed into the natural soil.

Anua septic systems are advanced wastewater treatment systems that use technologies like the <u>Puraflo Peat Fiber Biofilter</u> or <u>AeroCell</u> to provide high-performance, eco-friendly treatment. These systems often include a septic tank for primary treatment, followed by an advanced treatment unit like a biofilter or synthetic media pod to achieve high-level, secondary or advanced treatment before the water is dispersed often through a pressurized drain field. https://www.anuainternational.com/market/residential-wastewater-solutions/

A drip septic system uses a pump to send pretreated wastewater through a network of small tubes buried shallowly in the soil, which disperses small, controlled amounts of effluent through emitters. These systems require an advanced treatment unit, a pump, and a control panel, and are suitable for various sites, including those with poor drainage. https://odh.ohio.gov/know-our-programs/sewage-treatment-systems/drip-distribution

The Infiltrator ATL (Advanced Treatment Leachfield) system is an approved septic system for use in Ohio, which treats wastewater to a higher quality than traditional systems, allowing for a more compact drain field. It is approved by the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) and is designed for tight spaces or heavier soils.

Thanks for the clarification. The variance would defeat the spirit and intent of the rule and may not be granted. If soil absorption is feasible, leaching, drip, LPP, spray, etc., would need to be sited.

There is an approved soil area but is in a wooded area of their property, which is why the designer designed a spray, rather than a mound/ATL/etc. The designer explained that the spray would be the least expensive of the options.

They are requesting a variance from -06(F) to not use soil absorption as the means for final treatment.

Hi Zibby,

Apologies on the delay! The SDA states:

(1) Spray irrigation and dispersal areas shall be sited at least fifty feet from adjoining parcels, dwelling(s), hardscapes, areas in active production of food for human consumption, areas without vegetation, and twenty-five feet from utility easements. Increased horizontal isolation distances may be required by the board of health.

Are the goats market or dairy goats?

A variance to what rule?

Are they able to fit leaching or other soil absorption?

Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

As described in Note 1 of the financial statements, the financial statements are prepared by the District on the basis of the financial reporting provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 117.38 and Ohio Administrative Code Section 117-2-03(C), which is an accounting basis other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP), to satisfy these requirements. The effects on the financial statements of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material and pervasive.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the financial reporting provisions Ohio Revised Code Section 117.38 and Ohio Administrative Code Section 117-2-03(C) permit. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and the financial audit standards in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In our opinion, this schedule is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards



- Second Harvest Food Bank (SHFB) Partnership: over the month of October, we provided food to 307 clients.

Substance Abuse/DOP

- The new grant year has officially started. Our partnership with Montgomery, Butler, and Greene counties place community navigators will continue into year 3.
- o Program staff are finalizing an awareness campaign that will be distributed throughout the region.
 - The campaign will focus on individuals who use substances and family and friends of individuals who use substances. The campaign will provide education on the signs of overdose, how to use naloxone, and how to use test strips.
- Program staff is working with ODH to place a Narcan Vending Machine in Clark County.
 They are meeting with partners to see who might be interested in this opportunity. More information will be shared when it becomes available.

Adolescent Health

- The program has continued to develop relationships with youth serving organizations and other community stakeholders to serve on the grant's advisory committee.
- Program staff and the Youth Empowerment Taskforce (YET) will be hosting a networking event called Net with YET on November 20th. The goal of the event is to learn about youth serving organizations and the resources they provide to families.



Safe Communities

 Program Staff will be attending several community holiday events and high school basketball games to spread awareness and messaging on the dangers of distracted and impaired driving.

Motorcycle Ohio

• The 2026 schedule has been completed, and we are currently recruiting instructors.

Tobacco

- Program staff will be hosting their monthly tobacco support group on November 19th.
- ThinkFast presentation focused on the dangers of vaping will be held at Roosvelt Middle School on November 19th.
- Program staff have continued to advocate and plan for Tobacco retailer license policy enhancements.
- Program staff is working in collaboration with the Mercy Health Cancer Center to plan outreach activities promoting lung cancer screenings and tobacco education/cessation resources.

Creating Healthy Communities

- CHC continues to be an active member of several local coalitions and taskforces, such as the Clark County Local Foods Council and the Chronic Disease Taskforce.
- The strategies for this year include partnering with the park district to upgrade and install addition bike fix-it stations throughout the county to encourage active commuting, partnering with Second Harvest Food Bank to invest and support their mobile food distribution infrastructure, and collaborating with the Clark County Local Foods Council to supply mini grants to community gardens to help support infrastructure.
- Employee Quarterly Wellness activity will take place during the first week of December and will be a group wellness walks.
