Board of Health Minutes
June 21, 2022

President Dala DeWitt called the June 21, 2022, Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

Minutes: The minutes of the Board of Health meeting held on May 19, 2022, were approved as submitted.

Activity Reports

Nursing: Ms. Conover said that the Center for Disease Control (CDC) approved COVID-19 vaccines for children ages 6 months to four (4) years and we received the Moderna version for that vaccine, which we will offer during our normal clinics on Thursday and Friday.

Ms. Conover said the vaccine plan we submitted in December as a purchase plan had to be shifted as we decided to make a local option for persons who received a first dose of the rabies vaccine at the hospital and need the remaining regimen. She said that the individuals receiving the first dose were provided the option of going to Montgomery County for the remaining regimen, however, we noticed through records that many did not follow up. She said now that we have a local option for follow up it is being heavily used. She explained that this is for the times when the animal cannot be captured and monitored for the quarantine period or tested. She said the vaccine purchase plan will change, but the overall amount of the purchases will not. She said that we have had 13 clients with 26 doses of the rabies vaccine so far this year and if we do not calculate an administrative fee, we are recouping close to the actual vaccine cost. She said that this has been for post exposure so far, but we are about to venture into pre-exposure as well.

Ms. Conover said that Ms. Mary Shaw, our nurse practitioner working full-time in the reproductive health program is exceedingly popular with being requested as a preceptor particularly from Cedarville and has been awarded preceptor of the year, which is a big honor, and we are pleased to celebrate that with her.

Ms. Conover said the condom distribution program has extended to other locations which is part of the community health improvement plan.

Ms. Conover said that we were awarded \$50,000.00 for recruiting and equipping Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) volunteers and shared the MRC newsletter that Ms. Sandy Miller prepared. Ms. DeWitt said that she was pleased to see spotlight on Dr. Dobson in the newsletter as he was an immense help during the vaccination phase of the COVID-19 response.

Environmental Health: Mr. Shaffer said as a follow up to the rabies vaccines he wanted to share that we are vaccinating people who could not be cleared through observing the animal. He said when a rabid animal bites a human or another animal they are infected with the virus, and it takes some time for the virus to reach the brain. He said the further away the bite is from the brain the longer it takes and can be a couple of weeks to a month or more. He said when we get a bite report we issue a letter of quarantine. He said the owner must quarantine the animal for ten (10) days and we check on the animal after the ten (10) days to see if it is still alive. He said when an animal is rabid it is dead within a day and that is the only time when rabies can be transmitted. He said that we clear most of the 300-400 bites per year through observation and we are vaccinating those that cannot be cleared, which is an important thing for our community.

Mr. Shaffer said that we started summer inspections including monthly pool inspections. He shared that we have 20 bodies of water that we inspect all year with another 20 in the summer. He said that we have completed five (5) of the seven (7) campgrounds and all 30 of the manufactured home parks. He said that we contract with the Ohio Department of Commerce for the manufactured home park inspections so we will invoice them for \$5,250.00.

Mr. Shaffer said that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) has awarded us approximately \$150,000.00 for the past five (5) years and we work with homeowners with failed septic systems to loan them money to replace, repair or connect to sewer. He said that we help about 9-10 homeowners each year. He said that last year the state of Ohio gave us \$150,000.00 in H2O Ohio funding and we just finished spending that and will start on the 2021 fund. He said that we still have the 2022 fund as well which gives us about \$297,000.00. He advised that one of the biggest hold ups is finding contractors to do the work. He said that we worried about the delay with spending the funding, but we called the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) and they said that they felt we were doing well and on track with the program.

Early Childhood: Ms. Lambert said that the Moms Quit for 2 grant funds the Baby Me Tobacco Free program, which unfortunately has not rebounded as much as the other programs post COVID-19. She said that we had about 30-40 moms enrolled prior to COVID-19 and now have only 12 moms enrolled. She said that this is not just Clark County, it is the trend across the state. She said that we are cross training our tobacco treatment specialist to be a Help Me Grow Home Visitor, so she can make effective use of her time as we wait for that program to come back. She said that unfortunately this is a deliverable grant so if we do not see the pregnant moms that smoke, we cannot pull the money down for personnel and other costs. She said the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) has confidence that this will come back strong as we received the Notice of Award (NOA) for this grant next year which is \$63,672.00 in funding.

WIC: Ms. Thomas said the WIC project continues to stay above the assigned state caseload. She said of the 74 Ohio WIC projects, only eight (8) were above the assigned caseload and we came in as the second highest of those counties. She said that the formula shortage is still a concern with ever changing information and available options. She said the state office received approval to supply added flexibility for families on the program through temporary formula waivers. She said that alternate can sizes, contract and non-contract formula options started last week. She said that our WIC staff have done an excellent job helping participants on the temporary additions, educating parents of the flexibility and updated formula packages as needed. She said that our WIC support staff have been on the front line of receiving calls from frustrated and angry parents, however, they continue to make every effort to aid our families by recommending tips from the state, contacting stores for stock, checking store shelves for availability and reporting participant complaints to the state office for investigation. She said the nutrition staff have

been fluid to make proper recommendations on potential formula options and issuance depending on what families are able to find week to week or day by day. She said that adapting to the new guidelines and conditions have been a challenge to staff and we thank them for their hard work to serve our families in these uncertain times. She said many of our staff go beyond every day to help our community families in need and we commend them for that.

Ms. DeWitt asked if there has been any improvement within the last month. Ms. Thomas said that there does not seem to be any improvement in the last month, however, we have not heard of many issues since the opening of the added flexibilities, and we hope that will alleviate some of the problems families were experiencing when tied into specific formulas.

Health Planning: Mr. Cook started by sharing that he was at the WIC office today and had the opportunity to see the interaction between participants and the WIC staff and thanked them again for their hard work. He said that we sent a couple grant applications for serious dollars which are continuation applications so we are hopeful that we will be awarded that funding. He said that several of our health planners took part in the first annual Haitian flag day on May 21, 2022, and this past week at the Juneteenth celebration and the first New Carlisle Farmers Market of the year. He said that we are currently hiring for one (1) Health Planner and recently hired Ms. Caroline Quelette for our lead program. He said that Ms. Garrison resigned her position as Health Equity Coordinator so we will be posting for that position as well.

Mr. Cook referred to the pre-trial diversion program referenced in the board packet. He said that this is a significant program that is looking to make some added treatment options available for first time drug offenders and there was a meeting this week with county judges and experts in this area. He said that this is part of integrated program in prevention to give people a chance to get the treatment they need, and we are hopeful that this is the first of many meetings to continue in the right direction.

Mr. Cook said that our first annual report for accreditation is two (2) sections this year. He said the first section allows us to put a flag up and show something that might jeopardize our continued accreditation. He advised that there is nothing to show in that section, making it an easy first part of the report. He said that the second section allows us to highlight some areas of improvement, continuing processes and emerging innovations and resources that we have made available. He said that one of the things we will report is the data first project talking about using real time data as a pilot county allowing us to look for places to insert ourselves to make gains in vaccination rates in the county. He said that section 2 will be due 30 days after section 1 is approved. He said that we were recommended to submit section 1 on the last day to give you the full 30 days and the last day to send section 1 is June 30, 2022. He said that this report is easy when compared to the full accreditation process.

Vital Statistics: Ms. Hackathorne said that there is nothing new or unusual to report this month.

Financial Report: Mr. Patterson presented the financial report.

Legislative Update: Mr. Patterson said that we are still watching HB463 which is the elimination of the District Advisory Council. He said that they are in ongoing discussions, and we expect that after the elections there will be a lame duck legislature. He said that we would not be surprised if the bill does not pass. He said that we have been working with the sponsor of the bill, but it has gained some added life and even the original sponsor wants to move away from the bill we are not sure what will happen in a lame duck session. He said the County Commissioners Association of Ohio (CCAO) has not taken a position on the bill positive or negative. He said that some of the county commissioners in Ohio want nothing to do

with the bill and others like the idea to gain control over the health departments as they did not like what happened the past couple of years.

Declaration of Tax for Nuisance Abatement - 517 Neosha: Mr. Shaffer said that the board declared the property at 517 Neosha a public health nuisance due to the accumulation of solid waste. He said that we were unable to find a contractor to abate the nuisance, so he performed the job in May. He said the cost of the cleanup came to \$300.00 for the dumpster and we are asking for permission to assess the cost to the tax bill for the property.

Ms. Moore asked including the cost of Mr. Shaffer's time with the cost of the cleanup. Mr. Patterson said that it has been our practice in the past not to include the time as someone may question that we were already going to pay Mr. Shaffer or other staff their salary. He said that we felt it cleaner to move forward with only the added cost. Mr. Shaffer said that we do not want to risk someone questioning the nuisances declared to cover the salary of staff. Ms. Moore said that it may call for some further discussion in the future as these cleanups do take staff away from their regular duties.

Sewage Variance Request (isolation distance) – 2842 Evergreen: Mr. Shaffer said referred to the overhead of the property at 2842 Evergreen Drive in the board packet. He said the property is in the housing subdivision along Upper Valley Pike with several small lots. He said the homeowner bought the home earlier this year and as the result of an inspection that was completed by a septic pumper found that the septic needs to be replaced. He said the backyard of the property falls off sharply which is where the septic is located. He said they had to find a place for the new septic tank and due to limited space, they are asking for a variance for isolation distance.

Mr. Griffith asked our recommendation on where to put the septic tank. Mr. Shaffer said that there is an existing septic tank, so the installer is going to try to dig next to the existing tank to install it there as close as possible.

Ms. DeWitt asked if we inspect after the new septic system is installed. Mr. Shaffer confirmed that we will go out after installation to complete an inspection. He said that we do not anticipate the rule variance having any effect on the new system or the house.

Possible Nuisance – 851 Corvette: Mr. Shaffer said that the property at 851 Corvette has not had water or electricity service for the past couple of years and the woman living in the home has been dumping waste in the storm sewer out front. He said that we did file charges for unsafe and unsanitary conditions and the warrant was served. He said that she did not show up in court and has another warrant for an unrelated matter. He said the woman living in the home has been removing solid waste from the home and putting all over the yard and street. He said that we are asking the board to declare the property a public health nuisance so we can order it to be abated. He said that the home is up for tax sale, but the sale is not scheduled yet. He said that there is a full list of tax sale homes that are waiting for court approval. He said once the court has approved the home will go up for tax sale in late August. He shared the photographs included in the board packet only show half of the home, but the other half of the home looks the same.

Dr. Crompton said that she looked this property up on google maps and noticed that there was a small amount of solid waste accumulation in the photographs and seems the problem has continued to grow overtime.

If the owner/occupant/heirs do not comply, the Board further orders a citation be issued to him, describing the cause of the complaint against him and requiring him to appear before the Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health at its July 21, 2022 meeting at 6:00 p.m. at 529 East Home Road, Springfield, Ohio to show cause why the Board of Health should not proceed and furnish materials and labor necessary to remove the nuisance and certify the costs and expense thereof to the County Auditor to be assessed against the property located at 851 Corvette Avenue, New Carlisle, Ohio (Parcel #0100500025332017) and thereby made a lien upon it and collected as other taxes.

He said that we do not typically react with fluctuating gas prices, however, this ongoing high price of gas is something we need to react to and are asking the board to consider revising the mileage reimbursement policy to \$0.56 per mile beginning July 1, 2022. He said we are not sure what the state is going to do and may need to come back but want to start with \$0.56 for now to help pick up a small amount of the increased cost.

Out of State Travel: Mr. Patterson said that we have the opportunity to attend the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) next month in Atlanta, GA. He said that there are seven (7) different tracks such as governance, public health law, public health equity, data, epidemiology, public information, etc. and we are asking for permission to send up to six (6) of our employees to conference with the costs being covered by varying grants.

Ms. Moore asked if employees are staying in individual rooms or will they double up in rooms. Mr. Patterson said that in the past we required employees to double up in rooms, however, with things ever changing we book individual rooms.

IT Purchases-UPS's: Mr. Cook said that this purchase is overdue, but the recent power outages that we had bubbled these to the top of our list. He said that we are asking for permission to purchase a total of 11 of uninterrupted power supplies (UPS's) for various equipment. He said that we have a full building generator, but we must bridge the gap for about eight (8) to ten (10) seconds until the automatic transfer switch can switch everything to generator power. He said the recent power outage caused a few things to surge and fail such as batteries and critical infrastructure. He said that we completed a detailed inventory with our IT consultant and feel this is a reasonable amount to spend with much of the cost being for our server.

Health Commissioner's Comments: Mr. Patterson said that we appreciate the trust of the board to negotiate and execute the contracts for our new health insurance. He said that the board authorized up to \$1.5 million in expenses and the solution that we produced is innovative, but the staff were able to

choose from three (3) options which include the PPO plan, which is like the coverage they have today, the HDHP which is also like the coverage they have today or a third option which is to a non-participation benefit with proof of other coverage. He said with a declination of coverage they will receive a monetary benefit. He said a traditional PPO would cost us approximately \$40,000.00 a year with our new carrier. He said we put together a plan where employees who are not covered by our plan will receive \$500.00 per month which equals \$6,000.00 per year versus the \$40,000.00. He said we understand that this may increase the cost for the health insurance next year with having some greater risks still in the pool and removing some of the lower risks. He said we went from seven (7) declinations of coverage to eighteen (18) declinations of coverage which saves a significant amount of money bringing our total healthcare bill to approximately \$1.1 million with the same or better coverage. He said that we offered a Health Reimbursement (HRA (Health Reimbursement Arrangement)) account with the PPO plan choice giving employees \$1,000.00 for single coverage and \$1,500.00 for employee plus coverage to help cover the added costs of co-payments and deductibles. He thanked Ms. Hackathorne for her hard work and extra hours to get this done.

Ms. DeWitt asked if this will be reevaluated per year. Mr. Patterson confirmed that we will reevaluate the insurance packages each plan year.

Ms. Moore asked what the rationale was for offering the non-participation benefit. Mr. Patterson said the rationale behind that benefit was to give employees the option to go to another plan or stay on another plan which saves the health district approximately \$20,000.00 per employee while supplying the employees who do not receive healthcare benefits with a small benefit. Ms. Moore said she sees this as a great incentive for the employees but asked how cost-effective it is for the organization and the rationale when producing that amount. Mr. Patterson said that it had to be a large enough figure to attract employees to look at it and something that was enough to pay, in most cases, the difference in the other coverage plan. He said we feel it is cost effective as we are also trying to use this as a recruitment and retention tool. Mr. Shaffer asked to add to that saying that many come to us stay on a parent's plan or on their spouses plan not caring much about the insurance benefit, but that non-participation benefit helps keep up the difference in the wages offered in other counties for those not in need of the benefits. Ms. Moore asked why would not just increase the salaries for those individuals. Mr. Patterson said because there is a finite amount of money, and we would need to offer healthcare or another form of compensation in lieu of healthcare which saves us money and puts more money in our employee's pocket. He said worker with the broker we learned that companies are beginning to offer this incentive and we are just ahead of the curve. Ms. DeWitt said that the hospital did offer this benefit in the past one year and then pulled back. Mr. Griffith said that this is a novel idea and may have been around for a while, but he heard about it recently and applauds the investigation of ways to look at savings. He said you may save significantly one year, and the next year is a completely different story. Mr. Patterson said that we expect the 6% decrease in the cost this year provided by Anthem will change next year and that is something we will look at year by year. Ms. Moore asked if we will investigate increasing costs next year due to the rising premiums. Mr. Patterson said that we anticipate that some of the increased premium will have to be passed to the employees, however, we will continue to try to take on some of that as well to help with recruitment and retention.

The next meeting will be a special Board of Health meeting on Monday July 11, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. to discuss the retirement and rehire of an employee and sewage variances and the next regular Board of Health meeting will be held on Thursday July 21, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at 529 East Home Road, Springfield, Ohio.

With no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 6:58 p.m.

President, Ms. Dala DeWitt called the meeting to order at 5:58 p.m. and opened the public hearing at 5:59 p.m.

Mr. Patterson said that Ms. Tina Fisher wishes to retire on July 31, 2022 and return on August 1, 2022. He said that she will return at the mid-point of the pay scale for a secretary 2 which is savings for the board, and we retain a trained employee. He said that she will return to 2 weeks of vacation per year which is also a benefit to the health district. He said that Ms. Fisher has asked to take some additional time for vacation, however, that will be approved unpaid leave. He said that per board policy we would not bring this for consideration if there were any pending or disciplinary actions in the last year. He said that we believe that this is an advantage to the taxpayers of Clark County, the board and Ms. Fisher and ask that the board consider that in the public hearing.

Hearing no comments Ms. DeWitt closed the hearing at 6:01 p.m.

Sewage Treatment System Variances: Mr. Shaffer said that we have had many individuals come to us asking for a variance because they did not want to hook up to public sewer and wanted to provide some background regarding those variances. He said this starts with Ohio Revised Code that sets forth the requirements for the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) to have rules for the administration of household sewage treatment systems. He explained that Ohio Administrative Code is rules that comes from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). He said they meet with the public, interested parties and committees to put forth these rules which are approved through joint committee agency rule review (JCARR) which is comprised of five (5) members of the house and

five (5) members of the senate. He said the legislature does see the rules before they are handed down to the local health departments. He said that prior to 2015 every local health department in Ohio had their own rules with regards to household sewage treatment systems unlike the other programs such as the food program that had the Ohio Uniform Food Code that was handed down to all health departments by the state of Ohio. He said that in 2015 they came up with Ohio Administrative Code 3701.29 for household sewage treatment systems. He said prior to 2015 there were similar rules from health departments but some differences such as permitting. He said the Clark County Combined Health District only issued operation permits for septic systems that were more complicated such as mounds or aerators. He said that we did not issue operation permits for traditional leaching systems which is sewage going from the house to the septic tank where it collects the solids with the liquids going out to trenches that leach into the soil. He said these rules require us to issue operation permits for all septic systems and one of the challenges with that is that we do not know how many are out there. He said that we have done guestimates by going to census data and looking at housing units, how many are connected to sewer and subtracting all of those out and roughly we believe there are more than 20,000 septic systems in the county. He said that eventually we will need to locate all these systems to issue operation permits. He said that we are not able to go door to door looking for the systems as the rules only require that we have a plan, which we have. He explained that our plan has been that as we are called to homes with septic systems such as a complaint or room addition a site review is completed and when homeowners ask for inspections for real estate transactions a site review is completed, and the homeowner is notified that they need to purchase an operation permit. He said the problem comes when we cannot issue an operation permit when the home is accessible to sanitary sewer. He said that we find that we have been more rigid than other counties with the rule.

Ms. DeWitt asked for clarification on distances requiring connection to sanitary sewer. Mr. Shaffer said that we have been using 200 feet. He explained that when the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) declares that an area shall be sewered because multiple homes are leaking sewage to the surface the county commissioners are responsible for running sanitary sewer out and in the Ohio Administrative Code it says that homes greater than 200 feet to the right-of-way containing proposed sewer shall be exempt. He said that he reached out by e-mail to every health department in the state of Ohio and received a little less than 25% response. He said some are using 400 feet because the EPA commonly uses 400 feet for commercial systems. He said that we have been using 200 feet which we believe is conservative. He said if the septic is less than 200 feet to sanitary sewer, we do not issue an operations permit. Ms. DeWitt that it seems that some other health departments are still issuing permits if the sewer was functioning even when closer than 200 feet and accessible to sewer. Mr. Shaffer confirmed that to be correct which is different than our current plan. He said when the ODH came to us in 2015 they were rigid about these rules, but we believe it has been seven (7) years of reality and they have backed down some and have recently advised us that there is some flexibility in the rules. He referred to an e-mail indicating this included in the board packet. He said that with this flexibility we are bringing some options to the board tonight.

Mr. Griffith asked if the 200 feet is from the right of away of sanitary sewer or the nearest point of the dwelling structure. Mr. Shaffer said the 200 feet is from the foundation of the dwelling to the right of way containing sewer. Ms. DeWitt asked for an example. Ms. Moore said if an individual lives where the county or state has access or easement this is where the county may put the sewage and asked if this is where the 200 feet is used. Mr. Shaffer confirmed that is correct, the 200 feet is used from the edge of that point. Mr. Patterson said that we have found that this is a very complicated subject as there are places where the right of way is 10 feet, 20 feet or even 40 feet wide and sometimes the right of way goes to the center of the road or the entire road and the pieces on both side of the road go 10 to 20 feet off the road. He said it is possible that you have 200 feet to the right of way and that extends across the road another 10 feet putting the dwelling 250 feet from the actual sewer line which comes with having to bore under the road. He said the follow up e-mail was not nearly as verbose stating the rules were flexible. He said that it seems the state is saying if the board sets a policy on

accessibility, then the local health district just follows the policy. He asked Mr. Shaffer for some of the different scenarios that we are seeing from other county health department. Mr. Shaffer said some counties are to the letter of the rule as we were to some that do not follow the rule, which will catch up to them in the survey from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). He said that it varies all over the place. Mr. Patterson said that we asked what happens to the counties that have been surveyed and put on probation for not issuing permits and were advised that the program may be given to a neighboring county.

Ms. Moore asked the cost of an operations permit. Mr. Shaffer advised the cost is \$10.00 for an operations permit and it is good for ten (10) years. Dr. Crompton asked how often the system is inspected in that ten (10) year timeframe. Mr. Shaffer said that we are required to do one inspection in that period for the traditional leaching system. He said that we will be coming to the next meeting with a list of individuals who have operation permits for aerators that have not paid their fee to us or contracted with a company to have the regular inspection which is required annually. He said that some counties were doing inspections more frequently than once in the ten (10) year period. Ms. Moore asked if she had an aerator would she require a yearly inspection. Mr. Shaffer that is correct. Mr. Patterson said that those have been happening for many years as they are mechanical systems that are more likely to fail. Ms. Moore asked if those with an aerator gets an operations permit. Mr. Shaffer confirmed that this correct. Ms. DeWitt said that she read that one gave a five (5) year permit instead of ten (10) for those closer than 200 feet. Mr. Shaffer said that he believes Union County issues five (5) year permits. Mr. Patterson the idea behind the inspections of the traditional septic tank and leach field was to put boots on the ground every ten (10) years to see if it was surfacing. She asked if there is an annexation agreement to get your sanitary sewer in Clark County. Mr. Shaffer said the city of Springfield requires a signed agreement that they will annex when they are contiguous or that they will annex if they are already continuous. He said that we do not have any authority over that. He referenced a court case about this included in the board packet. Mr. Patterson said that the case also said that annexation or a development incentive agreement (DIA) in lieu of annexation is not a barrier to hooking up so if the health department says you must connect you must do it even though you might have to annex or sign a DIA. Mr. Shaffer said that Springfield Township residents have to sign an agreement if they are not contiguous that they will annex and until they do they have to pay double the sewer rate and a \$250.00 convenience fee to the city, which he doesn't understand. Mr. Patterson said this is the southern interceptor that runs through Springfield Township. He said that it runs throughout the southern part of the city, near Ramar Estates, West Possum Road, East Possum Road, down the hill at Craig Road and picks up Prime Ohio which is why that line was put there. He said that it was also put there because they assumed that at some point Ramar Estates, Shawnee Acres and other places that want to develop out there can just connect to the sewer. He said that we are in favor of building housing developments on sewer because we know that it is the best available technology to treat the sewage and we know that we are not going to eat up farmland with the five (5) acre tracks to have room for their own sewage and well. He said that many need the smaller lots that they can maintain which is why we need the sewer available. Mr. Shaffer said the county is considering going from minimum one (1) acre lots to two (2) acre lots. He said that this is all about permitting and the consequences of not being able to permit is to connect to sewer. He said that this is not a bad thing because sewer is a good thing as it is the best available technology where the sewage is taken away from the home to a central area where there are people paid to make sure the sewage is treated properly. He said on a private septic system people sometimes struggle to keep up with a pumping schedule.

Ms. DeWitt said that she does not understand the rationale for not giving a permit because that would give you the opportunity to inspect it at least once every ten (10) years. Mr. Shaffer said that section 6, paragraph I says a sewage treatment system shall not be sited, permitted, or installed where a sanitary sewage system is accessible unless otherwise accepted by law. He said that it doesn't say 200 feet, it just says accessible, and the 200 feet is defining accessible and what the health district adopted from other regulations. He said that we are asking the board tonight to consider some options for developing a policy we can follow. Mr. Patterson said the idea behind the rule was to get people to connect to sanitary sewer. He said in our conversations with the state

health department they said the policy says where sewer is accessible, but the rules are flexible, and the board can set rules to define the term accessible. He said that we had previously defined accessible based on other existing regulations, but at this point the board could do nothing or define accessible. He said that once the board defines accessible, we believe 90-95% of the variances previously before the board will no longer have to come to the board as the staff will be able to implement the rule set by the board defining accessible. He said the board will still have variance requests for many other rules and some where the sewage system is within the accessible distance defined by the board but they homeowner still wants a permit versus hooking up. He said that we are bringing these options to the board for discussion because the state has opened the door with this flexibility. He said that we believe that we have been putting the law and rules in front of the board in an appropriate manner, but this gives the board the opportunity to give the citizens a little more flexibility if the system appears to be working. He said in most cases we have not looked at the system because we do not do the work if there is sewer.

Mr. Griffith asked how this compares to the most recent case with the variance request by Mr. Soloman that was denied as it did not meet hardship requirements. Mr. Patterson said that Mr. Soloman supposedly had a working system in front of the house which must have been a drywell based on the slope. Mr. Shaffer explained that traditional leaching system uses trenches no more than 24 inches deep. He said they dig the trenches, lay perforated pipe in them, fill them full of gravel and cover them up so you cannot see them, but they are shallow, and the idea is that the water from the septic goes into the trenches and leaches into the soil. He said a drywell is not shallow and usually 10-12 or more feet deep. He said the difference is that when you put wastewater into a drywell you have risk of that water going directly into ground water that people drink without being treated. He said shallow trenches use the soil that have microbes near the surface to digest the sewage, treat it and leach it down to make it safe. He said the Ohio Revised Code says that it is not a nuisance unless the sewage is surfacing. He said that we have been permitting drywells that are still functioning even though we can no longer install them because the law says the system shall remain in place unless it cannot be permitted because it is accessible to sewer, or it is creating a public health nuisance. Mr. Patterson said to focus on this one is that what is being proposed tonight would have allowed Mr. Soloman to sell the home for someone to move in and continue to use the system until it failed at which point, they would have had to connect. He said that was the perfect situation when it should have been connected. He said it was \$5,500.00 or less to connect, already in the city of Springfield, the sewer line ran right in front of the house, downhill and on the same side of the house. He said it was probably the most straight forward connection we have seen in some time so this proposal would have stayed that, but professionally we believe that the home should have been connected and the city should have been pursuing it to be connected. He said with what we are talking about here it gives us the opportunity to put the buyers on notice that says we will issue the permit with wording that the home is accessible to sewer and must be hooked up when the system fails. He said it would be in the buyer's paperwork. Ms. Moore if that would be an issue because the rule says if it is accessible, it is a moot point. Mr. Patterson said if accessibility is defined, and the system is not working versus saying accessible and whether it is working opens different doors. Mr. Shaffer said it was not just defining accessibility; it says you can issue permits and come back later to see if the system is failing or not. He said it gives all kinds of flexibility and what we gathered from other health departments, some are rigid, and some are not. He said that he has put together a draft resolution that has some options, with one option being to do nothing.

Mr. Shaffer reviewed the proposed resolution with options for the number of feet from the nearest point of the dwelling or structure of the right of way, the number of years an operations permit is issued for a existing non-discharging sewage treatment system and a discharging sewage treatment system, the number of days the owner or responsible management entity has to connect the dwelling or structure to public sewer if accessible and properly abandon the non-compliant sewage treatment system, or replace the sewage treatment system and properly abandon the non-compliant sewage treatment system if public sewer is not available.

Dr. deGuzman asked if 90 days is a reasonable amount of time to connect for failing systems. Mr. Shaffer said that this is a reasonable amount of time and occasionally it takes more time, but we will work with them if they are doing everything that needs to be done. He said this is a starting point in most cases.

Mr. Walters asked if board can still issue variances based on these options. Mr. Shaffer confirmed that there will still be variance requests the board can grant for other rules. Mr. Walters said that it seems the board needs to set a policy that can be fairly and evenly applied for the community.

Mr. Griffith asked what section of the code states that you do not have to replace a system that is older technology. Mr. Patterson said that section 3718.012 says that a sewage treatment system that was in operation prior to the effective date of this section shall not be required to be replaced with a new sewage treatment system under this chapter of rules adopted under it and shall be deemed approved if the system does not cause a public health nuisance or if the system is causing a public health nuisance as provided in section 3718.011 of the revised code repairs are made to the system that eliminate the public health nuisance as determined by the applicable court of health. He said that it says if the older technology is not causing a nuisance or can be repaired it is good.

Ms. Moore said that the frustrating part is that someone will end up paying and, in most cases, it falls on the new buyer, who just took on a significant mortgage.

Dr. deGuzman asked how you consider a sewage treatment system to be failing. Mr. Shaffer said each system has its own criteria of what is considering working versus not working or getting ready to fail.

Mr. Griffith said that he would want to set a proper follow up if a permit is issued to strengthen our ability to ensure the system is compliant through the ten (10) year period. Ms. Moore asked if you could write language that says the system will be inspected more than once in the ten (10) year period. Mr. Shaffer said that in this case it would be best to issue a five (5) year permit versus a ten (10) year permit. Ms. DeWitt said if it becomes a nuisance at any point during the permit period it is dealt with. Mr. Patterson said that the one advantage to the five (5) year permit is that it is another touch point and if a real estate transaction takes place, it is not as many years if there was something not properly disclosed.

Mr. Walters asked if we know how many homes accessible to public sewer are connected. Mr. Shaffer said his best guess would be as many as 500. Mr. Patterson said that there are houses in the city that are not connected to public sewer. Mr. Griffith asked how many are not connected within the city. Mr. Shaffer said that there are probably 10-15 not connected within the city.

R 66-22 WHEREAS, per Ohio Revised Code 3718.02, the Ohio director of health has prescribed criteria and procedures under which boards of health shall issue installation permits, operation permits, and alteration permits for sewage treatment systems (STS); and,

WHEREAS the Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health desires to apply these rules to promote public health in a manner which is fair and consistent.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the following policy for the issuance of installation permits, operation permits, and alteration permits is adopted by the Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health:

The Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health as authorized by Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29-09, specifies no person shall install a new or replacement STS or alter an existing STS without an installation or alteration permit issued by the board of health. Installation and

operation permits may only be issued per the rules specified in Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29. The owner or a responsible management entity when applicable, shall comply with the terms and condition of the permit.

The Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health as authorized by Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29-09, specifies no person shall operate a STS or a type 2, 3 or 4 gray water recycling system without an approved and valid operation permit from the board of health. The owner or a responsible management entity when applicable, shall comply with the terms and condition of the permit.

The Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health, as authorized by Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29-06, specifies that dwelling or structures are accessible to a sanitary sewer when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- The Board of Health has consulted with the appropriate public sewer entity and other agency personnel as necessary to determine sanitary sewerage accessibility.
- The sanitary sewer is capable of accepting flow as determined by the sanitary sewer authority.
- The nearest point of the right-of-way containing the sanitary sewer is less than or equal to 200 feet from the nearest point of the dwelling or structure; and
- The sanitary sewer is not limited for use because of a legal barrier, physical barrier or other technical feature as determined by the Health District.

The Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health, as authorized by Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29-06, specifies that, without exception specified in this policy, no person is eligible to receive an installation permit or alteration for an STS that serves a dwelling or structure that is accessible to public sewer, and that the person shall connect the dwelling or structure to sanitary sewer.

The Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health, as authorized by Ohio Administrative Code 3701-29-06, specifies the issuance of operation permits for existing STS as follows:

- The owner or responsible management entity of an existing STS that is non-discharging, compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, and not accessible to public sewer shall be issued a 10-year operation permit as long as the STS is compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements. When the STS fails to be compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, the owner or responsible management entity shall replace the STS or connect the dwelling or structure to public sewer if found to be accessible and properly abandon the STS. At the conclusion of the permit period, if the STS continues to be compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, the owner or responsible management entity may receive another operation permit.

- The owner or responsible management entity of an existing STS that is non-discharging, compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, and accessible to public sewer shall be issued a 5-year operation permit as long as the STS is compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements. When the STS fails to be compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, the owner or responsible management entity shall connect the dwelling or structure to public sewer. At the conclusion of the permit period, if the STS continues to be compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, the owner or responsible management entity may receive another operation permit.
- The owner or responsible management entity of an existing STS that is discharging, compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements, and accessible to public sewer shall be issued two consecutive 1 year operation permits. The owner or responsible management entity shall connect the dwelling or structure to public sewer and properly abandon the STS if the STS fails to be compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements during the permit period, or at the conclusion of the second permit period, whichever occurs first.
- The owner or responsible management entity of an existing STS that is not compliant with all operation permit inspection requirements or that is within an area that has been declared a health hazard shall have 90 days to connect the dwelling or structure to public sewer if accessible and properly abandon the non-compliant STS or replace the STS and properly abandon the non-compliant STS if public sewer is not available. The owner or responsible management entity shall make all reasonable attempts to limit the amount of sewage directed to a non-compliant STS to limit the threat to public health.

The conditions and schedule for connection to a sanitary sewer which may be established by the board of health shall not conflict with findings and orders by the Ohio EPA or orders from the county commissioners or other local authority.

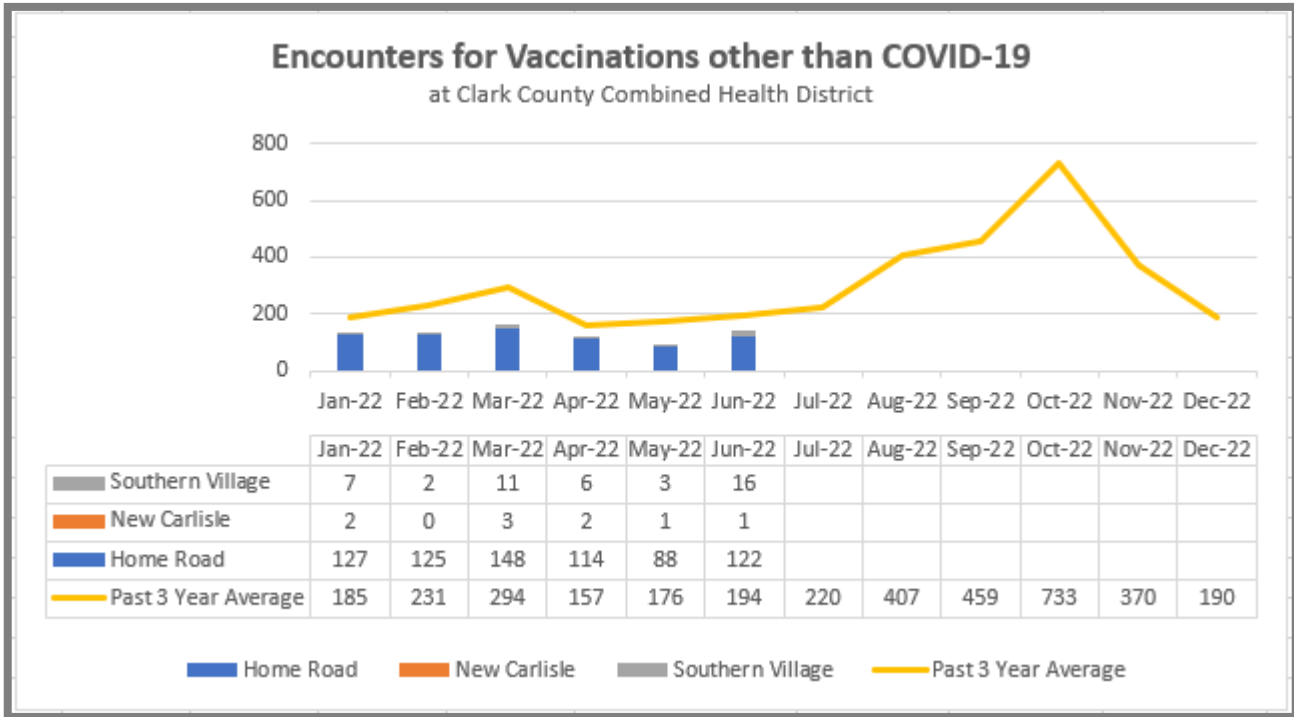

Notes for BOH:

There were 2 unusual items seen in this quarters CD Report and 1 item to note.

1. **Haemophilus Influenzae (HIB)** has already surpassed the totals from 2018-2021 and is the same amount as the total of all of the cases in 2017. There is already a suspected case in July 2022. HIB is a vaccine preventable disease that is given to children under the age of 5. The vaccine prevents *Haemophilus influenzae* type b.

a. Of the four cases, only one case was under the age of 5, was vaccinated but it was subtyped to type A *Haemophilus influenzae*.

b. HIB has been seen increasing in many other countries and not just in Clark County, Ohio. One study found that the pandemic has had an effect on individuals increasing their vaccine hesitancy in many different vaccines that can prevent diseases.

c. HIB has also been seen increasing in adults and was associated with a higher mortality rate in individuals 65+ years. One of the 4 cases in Clark County in 2022 was 60+ years of age and did pass away right after being diagnosed with HIB.

2. **Streptococcal - Group A - Invasive disease** is increasing once again this year. This is something we have been aware of and the infection control and the infectious disease doctor at Mercy is also aware of and has brought it to our attention as well.

a. There are many new cases worldwide and many studies are being done to try and determine what is causing the increase of these cases. As of right now the cause is unknown.

b. A Hypothesis of the case increases could be because there is more testing being done due to covid since covid symptoms vary and then the doctors are finding Strptococcal group A - Invasive cases more. This is only a hypothesis as to why we have seen an increase in the most recent years.

3. **Perinatal Hep B**

a. There was one suspected case of Perinatal Hep B in April of 2022.

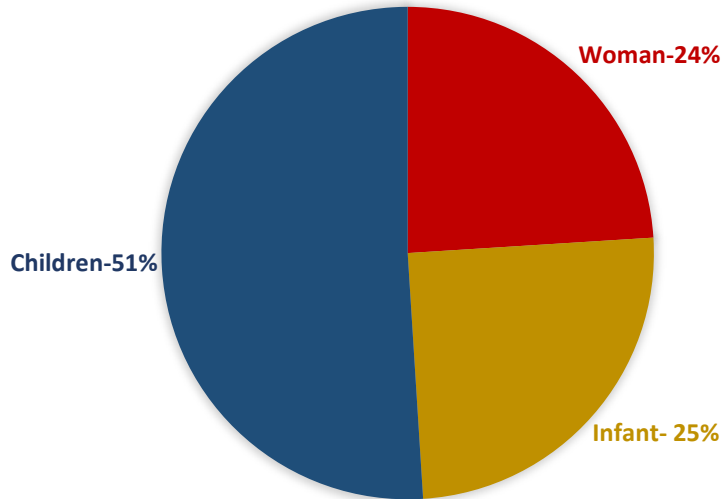

Drug Overdose Prevention Program:

One2One Update:

- **Second Harvest Food Bank (SHFB) Partnership:** Over the month of June, we gave out 40 food boxes to our clients.
- **Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) Partnership:** Over the month of June, we completed 4 housing referrals.
- **Department of Job and Family Services - Clark County (DJFS-CCO Partnership):** Over the month of June, we assisted 5 clients in completing applications for Medicaid and SNAP benefits.
- Exchange Stats from May 2022 (June 2022 Stats were not available at the time of this report):
 - 150 Client visits
 - 9,133 Syringes exchanged
 - 100 Narcan kits distributed
 - 2 Treatment referrals
 - 8 Hepatitis C Screens
 - 14 Syphilis Screens

Substance Abuse/DOP:

- In partnership with the Substance Abuse Coalition and the Partners in Prevention Coalition, we are planning a Chalk the Walk event to recognize Overdose Awareness Day. The event will take place on August 31st, from 4:30 -6:30pm at City Hall Plaza. The event is an opportunity to share messages of hope and strength to those in the community that have been affected by overdose. Local resources and Narcan will also be available at the event.

Health Planning Team: July 2022 Update

Maternal Child Health Program (MP):

Objective 2: Preconception Health/ Start Strong

- One goal of Start Strong Clark County (SSCC) is to increase awareness of local resources for expecting mother's and families with babies. One strategy to accomplish this to create a local website that houses resources, contact information, and educational material. Start Strong leadership has worked with a web designer to create and launch the website. The website is now live and a roll out has begun. You can find the website by visiting, <https://startstrongcc.org/>.

Objective 4: Adolescent Health

- LifeSports Summer Camp began on July 5th. There was a total of 30 youth registered. The camp runs Monday through Friday from 9am-3pm through July 29th. LifeSports combines a play-based social skills curriculum with a summer sports camp where girls and boys, ages 10-15, from vulnerable circumstances, learn and play in an environment based on teamwork and fair sports-play.
- We are working in partnership with Springfield Promise Neighborhood, Springfield City Schools, and the Mental Health and Recovery Board to put on the camp.

Safe Communities:

- Newly hired Health Planner, Maggie Reuber, is taking on the role of Safe Communities Coordinator as well as Adolescent Health Coordinator for the program above.
- Currently working on planning the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign kick-off. Final details have not been set but will be provided when available.

Tobacco:

- Tobacco grant is kicking off a new 3-year grant cycle. As of July 1st, the start of the TU23 grant year begins.
- We are working with the Clark County Partners in Prevention to provide a scavenger hunt that includes anti-tobacco messaging and promote cessation service resources at the upcoming Clark County Fair.
- We have also partnered with Partners in Prevention to display anti-vaping Public Service Announcements that play at the local movie theater prior to the film.

Creating Healthy Communities:

- Continue to actively participate in the monthly Clark County Local Foods Council (CCLFC) meetings.
- Application for the 2023 grant year is due July 25th. We will be applying for \$100,000 and have a focus on supporting local community garden infrastructure, providing

support to Second Harvest Food Bank, and organizing bike safety programing in local schools.

Lead-Safe Homes:

- City of Springfield Rental Registry Task Force – attended first rental registry task force meeting as CCCHD’s representative on June 14, 2022. Other task force members include several City of Springfield community development division staff and approximately seven local landlords.
- CCCHD and Neighborhood Housing Partnership (NHP) working to develop internal organizational structure, policies, and procedures for proposed Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes (LHCHH) pilot program. Once finalized, the LHCHH program proposal to be submitted to City of Springfield leadership for funding approval. Private funding secured and a LHCHH program proposal update scheduled for the Crabill Foundation on July 18, 2022.
- Follow up phone calls made to all 13 pediatric and family practice providers in Clark County to schedule lead related lunch and learn sessions for staff. Lunch and learn presentation developed that provides general lead education and stresses the mandated requirements and importance of lead screening all Medicaid covered children and non-Medicaid but at-risk children at ages one and two. Four lunch and learns scheduled and lead safe initiative staff will continue to follow up with the remaining 9 practices to get their lunch and learns scheduled too.

- The following is a list of events the health planning team will be attending on behalf of CCCHD during the month of June.
 - July 22nd – July 29th – Clark County Fair
 - August 2nd- National Night Out in Enon (Safe Communities)
 - August 7th- Walneck’s Motorcycle Swap Meet at the Clark County Fair Grounds (Safe Communities)

Staffing Updates:

- Two new Health Planners have joined the team over the past month. Caroline Quelette is working on the Lead- Safe Home program and Maggie Reuber is working on Safe Communities and Adolescent Health.

Submission of the continuation application constitutes acknowledgment and acceptance of ODH GAPP (OGAPP) manual rules and any other program-specific requirements as outlined in the competitive Solicitation. This Solicitation pertains to budget period: [January 1, 2023- December 31, 2023] of the total project period, [January 1, 2020-December 31, 2024.] Reference the competitive Solicitation for more information.

All budget justifications must include the following language and be signed by the agency head listed in GMIS. Please refer to the budget justification examples listed on the GMIS bulletin board.

- Subrecipient understands and agrees that it must follow the federal cost principle that applies to its type of organization (2 CFR, Part 225; 2 CFR, Part 220; or, 2 CFR, Part 230).
- Subrecipient's budgeted costs are reasonable, allowable and allocable under OGAPP and federal rules and regulations.
- The OGAPP and the rules and regulations have been read and are understood.
- Subrecipient understands and agrees that costs may be disallowed if deemed unallowable or in violation of OGAPP and federal rules and regulations.
- The appropriate programmatic and administrative personnel involved in this application are aware of agency policy in regard to subawards and are prepared to establish the necessary inter-institutional agreements consistent with those policies.
- Subrecipient agrees and understands that costs incurred in the fulfillment of the Deliverables must be allowable under OGAPP and federal rules and regulations to qualify for reimbursement.

B. Number of Grants and Funds Available: *The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant funds the CHC Program. The twenty-two (22) grants may be awarded for a total amount of \$2,430,000 for local grant awards to the currently funded CHC projects. Only those who were awarded for the 2022 grant year are eligible to apply. Each funded CHC Program may apply for up to \$105,000 for a county population of less than 200,000 or \$125,000 for a county population of more than 200,000. Funding levels for all applicants will depend on the number and scope of proposals received, recommendations from the review panel, quality of each application, justification for the amount of funding requested, and adherence to the goals and objectives outlined in this RFP. No applicant is guaranteed a certain percentage of the total funds available. ODH reserves the right to modify the amount of funding based on the applications and funds available.*

No grant award will be issued for less than \$30,000. The minimum amount is exclusive of any required matching amounts and represents only ODH funds granted. Applications submitted for less than the minimum amount will not be considered for review.
