Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health Minutes August 17, 2023

President Dala DeWitt called the August 17, 2023, Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

Board members present: Dala DeWitt, Sherry Robinette, Mike Adamson, Scott Griffith, Dana King, Bernadette deGuzman and Valerie Moore.

Board members absent: none.

Staff present: Charles Patterson, Health Commissioner; Larry Shaffer, Environmental Health Director; Christina Conover, Director of Nursing; Lori Lambert, Early Childhood Director; Emily Thomas, WIC Director; Shannon Hackathorne, Administrative Assistant to the Health Commissioner; Linda Moore, Fiscal Officer; Chris Cook, Assistant Health Commissioner and Nate Smith, Communications Coordinator.

Guests: Ms. Maynard, citizen, Christina Madison, citizen and Derrick Olwen, citizen.

Minutes: The minutes of the July 20, 2023, Board of Health meeting were approved as submitted.

Ms. DeWitt moved agenda item 8A under old business forward with approval from all board members.

Old Business

Public Health Nuisance – 1378 Titus Road: Mr. Shaffer said that the board declared the property at 1378 Titus Road a public health nuisance last December. He said that the board held off following that up with taking any further action than they would following the May board meeting giving the owner, Ms. Maynard, a 90-day extension. He said that we inspected the house at 90 days and are happy to report that the odor has improved, and the cleaning of the first floor is acceptable, however, we noticed that they stopped before the basement, leaving furniture and solid waste covering the basement. He explained that we are bringing this matter back to the board with some recommended options which include; 1) authorizing the Health Commissioner to abate the nuisance and certifying the costs and expense to the county auditor for placement of a lien on the property, 2) prosecuting the owner for refusal or neglect to obey such order to abate the solid waste nuisance, 3) granting an extension for a specified number of days to abate the solid waste nuisance or 4) to consider the matter settled and take no action. Ms. DeWitt turned the floor over to Ms. Christina Madison and Ms. Karen Maynard for comment. Ms. Madison said that they completed a lot of work on the home since the May meeting and shared photographs with the board. She said that they have eliminated the rodent problem except for a few field mice here or there that do not come from the house and the odor problem has improved. Ms. Maynard said that her stepdaughter, Roxanne, who normally attends with her was unable to attend this evening as she is at the Cleveland Clinic with her daughter who is very ill, however, she wrote a letter for the board. Ms. Madison read the letter from Roxanne to the board which stated she was sorry for not being able to attend the meeting tonight due to being at the Cleveland Clinic with her daughter. She wanted to let the board know that a lot of work had been done on Ms. Karen Maynard 's house from multiple companies that they paid to haul things away to the ladies that have been there for at least eight (8) hours every day working to get the job done. She continued by stating that the cleanup of the upstairs has been completed and all that is left to do is the basement as funds are available. She stated that they will continue this work. She stated that the water is not on at the home, but the board stated at the last meeting that if there was no one living in the home that was okay. She continued by saying that once the cleanup is complete, plumbing will be next on the list and thanked the board for their patience while they continue to work. Ms. DeWitt asked what their plan is for cleaning up the rest of the house. Ms. Maynard said that they intend to paint, however, the paint is nearly \$400.00 for a 5-gallon bucket. Mr. Shaffer advised that our only concern at this point is getting the solid waste such as the feces and furniture removed from the basement, not painting. He said as an example, we are satisfied with the cleanup that has been completed upstairs. Ms. Madison said that they reached out to Mr. Ray Castle to haul away the debris from the basement, but he advised the cost would be \$5,000.00. She said to help mitigate that cost she plans to pack up everything that she can from the basement to move it out herself and then contact Mr. Castle or another hauling company to remove the furniture. Mr. Patterson asked what they believe the timeframe is that they will need to get the basement cleaned out. Ms. Maynard said that she had experienced some bad luck with her car breaking down, which cost her almost \$1,000.00 and Roxanne was only able to give her about \$200.00 from the bar as business is struggling. She added that one of the ladies who has been helping clean out the house had to have a urostomy which resulted in a massive infection, and she ended up being admitted to OSU hospital, so it has just been her and Christina and she is little to no help. She said that after she received her next social security check, she plans to rent a dumpster and believes they might be able to finish cleaning out the basement in 60 days

Ms. DeWitt moved public comment forward in the agenda with approval from all board members. She turned the floor over to Mr. Derrick Olwen who asked to speak regarding a sewage rules variance request that is not on the agenda this evening.

Public Comment

Mr. Olwen said that he is building a home at 1380 North Hampton Road in New Carlisle. He said that this lot was split on August 9, 2006, and he has worked with two (2) different septic system designers, one who just split on them. He said they initially designed a mound system but it did not go on contour so they designed a spray field irrigation system, however, that system comes within approximately 15 feet of the property line and Ohio law says that the property line must be 50 feet from spray field. He said that he is coming to the board last minute tonight because he stuck between a rock and hard place as he applied for construction loans based on information from the designer that this information would be submitted to the board for approval in June, the loans were approved, and it has come to a point where the bank says he needs to close by next Friday. He said the spray field irrigation was submitted to the health district on August 1, 2023, and we have not received a yes or no answer yet. Mr. Shaffer said that he is somewhat

familiar with this situation. He said that Ms. Elizabeth DeWitt advised him that we may get a request for a variance due to the spray field not meeting distance requirements. Mr. Patterson said that the reason for the 50-foot perimeter requirement is to have a buffer between the neighbor's property because when you take sewage effluent you are going to spray it on the grass or in the field you are basically land applying the liquid portion of the sewage effluent. He said it has been treated and goes through an aeration unit being chlorinated and then applied on the surface so the 50 foot requirement was put in place for the neighbor because many times when we inspect an aeration unit it is not operating at the peak manufacturer's recommended level which means we know that eventually when those break it continues to spray somewhat raw liquid sewage effluent on the yard until that is fixed and 50 feet to 15 feet is a drastic reduction in the state requirement. He said that we have not had a chance to talk about this or even look at the design so it would be hard for us to give a recommendation to the board. Ms. Moore asked what the proximity is of the neighbor's yard. Mr. Shaffer said that we have not been there and have no information, so we are not able to answer that. Mr. Olwen said that one neighbor is probably about 150 to 200 feet away and the other neighbor is probably 500 to 600 feet away if not more. Mr. Shaffer explained to Mr. Olwen that the normal process when the homeowner applies for a variance from rule, the staff studies that and provides information and a diagram for the board to review. He said unfortunately we do not have that information, so the board is not able to act on a variance request. Mr. Olwen said that his problem is that the design was submitted on August 1st, but they have not heard anything back or been notified that they need to request the variance. He said that the site review plan says that they have seven (7) days to notify them what needs to be done or whether the system is approved or not and they have not had any response. Mr. Patterson explained that his designer designed a system that does not meet state standards and intentionally submitted that so that should have been explained to him. Mr. Shaffer said that Ms. Elizabeth DeWitt did speak with someone, he is not sure if that was the designer or homeowner about the need for a variance request. Mr. Olwen said that his concern is that no one is letting him know what the issue is or what is going on and no one is returning calls. Mr. Patterson said that we want to work with him but unfortunately the design does not meet state requirements and without more knowledge he cannot look at the Board of Health as the health commissioner and recommend that they approve his variance today because we just do not have the information. Mr. Olwen said that he understands that this is very impromptu but wanted to bring this to the board's attention as the plan indicates there will be a decision in seven (7) business days but there has been no communication back to them. Mr. Shaffer advised that he is not sure who Ms. DeWitt talked with but believes it was the designer as that is usually who submits the design and who we communicate with about submitting a variance. He advised that we are happy to pull the file to investigate this tomorrow. Mr. Olwen said that he has been copied on all email communication with the health district and he has not seen any communication since August 1st, which is what he wanted to bring forward tonight. Mr. Patterson said that we are happy to investigate this further tomorrow but unless the board has a special meeting we will not meet again until the middle of September and that is not going to help him with the closing of his loan and unfortunately, we cannot recommend the board approve the variance without the required documentation for review. Dr. Robinette asked Mr. Olwen if he could work with the bank to postpone the closing date if they have something showing that he is working with the health district. Mr. Olwen said that the concern is not just from the bank but also the builder is concerned about moving forward without an approved septic system. Mr. Patterson asked if there is a road ditch. Mr. Olwen confirmed that there is a road ditch. Mr. Patterson said that if the spray irrigation system could not be put in because of those distance requirements and the board could not grant a variance from that rule, they may be able to grant a variance for a discharging system on a new build, which has been granted before on the eastern edge of the county. He said this is just brainstorming some ideas, but it may help

him move forward knowing that something would be possible. He said that it may not be the spray system, but he believes that there may be other options that could be worked out. Mr. Olwen said that he is not set on a spray field, that is just what the designer brought to him. Mr. Patterson said that the board could not approve anything tonight, but he believes that there are other options for the board to consider next month if the spray field does not work. He said that this lot was split in 2006 and the new rules went into effect in 2015 which changed what could be installed and what is appropriate for the site which means the board may have to consider a variance to get them into the home, it is just not something we are prepared to look at tonight. Mr. Olwen thanked the board for the time and said that this is just something he wanted to bring to their attention.

Activity Reports

Nursing: Ms. Conover said that we are entering the busy season with immunizations, but we have a great team and will continue moving forward. She said that we are also getting ready to start school screenings and do have a job posting out to bring a few more PRN employees to help with those screenings. She said that this is a great way for the health district to support the school nurses and the education field by helping with the required screenings for vision and hearing. She said that as some may have seen there are some new recommendations on the RSV vaccination for adults 60 years of age and older so we are looking at the various purchase options and expect that we might bring back a revised purchase plan for immunizations to the board next month. She said that is one reason for the revised plan and additionally the COVID-19 vaccine is being commercialized so we will no longer receive it from the state meaning it would be up to the board to decide if we are going to purchase COVID-19 vaccines. She said that they are preparing that information as there are several things to look at including selecting either Moderna or Pfizer. She said that Pfizer still requires ultra cold freezer storage if storing longer than 10 weeks. She said that we have been borrowing space in the ultra-cold freezer from the hospital but the hospital now has another use for their ultra cold freezer so there are a couple of logistic things that we are working through. She said that we are also meeting with pharmaceutical reps to better understand what the plan is for the RSV monoclonal antibody injection for infants. She said eligible infants would possibly be given at the birthing center but the health district may also have a role in vaccination at later ages for some of those infants. She said that we were very pleased to receive the Preconception Health Grant which is in the reproductive health teams' scope and but of course targeted towards persons who would be at the preconception stage. She said that as a follow up to discussion last month about Lyme Disease she wanted to share that we have twelve (12) cases that have come across this summer with eight (8) of those being either probable or confirmed and the remaining four (4) being suspect. She said that except for one there is no travel history so we can assume that their exposure was here in Clark County, which is consistent with what Mr. Shaffer has been telling us and what Dr. King mentioned last month.

Dr. Robinette asked what the commercialization of the COVID-19 vaccine means. Ms. Conover said that this means that the COVD-19 vaccine would be like other vaccines and providers such as us and pharmacies would purchase the vaccine from the manufacturer. She said that up until now it has been purchased by the federal government and distributed as part of the strategic national stockpile. Dr. Robinette asked if it is the same medication. Ms. Conover said that as this occurs it will be the new monovalent MRNA vaccine. Dr. Robinette asked if this will be like the flu vaccine where they don't really know what variety they are formulating it for. Ms. Moore said that as she understands they will formulate it for the strain that is circulating. Ms. Conover referred to the second bullet point underneath the COVID-19 section that has some beneficial information. She said that she believes it will be like the flu vaccine where they will watch the trends and strain circulating and provide that guidance to the manufacturers

and go from there. She said that another thing that she wanted to mention is that anecdotally there has been an uptick in persons testing positive for COVID on the home test and calling for guidance. She said that the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has a nice isolation and exposure calculator where you can enter your dates and it tells you what steps you need to take such as staying isolated and wearing a mask. She said additionally on the Epi call today they did mention that hospitalizations from COVID are up 12% and with school starting that will likely increase so we are encouraging everyone to be vigilant in prevention.

<u>Environmental Health</u>: Mr. Shaffer said that the board declared the property at Beach Drive a public health nuisance last month. He said that we had a contractor out today and are awaiting the invoice before coming back to the board asking permission to assess the cost of abatement to the taxes. He said that photographs will be presented next month and asked the board to keep in mind that it still looks like there is some stuff on the property because when we abate nuisances it is not our intent to go in and wipe everything from the property as people sometimes have items that are of value to them so when looking at those pictures you can see that we removed a lot of debris but left many items that the homeowner believes are valuable and probably do hold some value.

Mr. Shaffer shared that he has been in nursing school the past three (3) years and that tomorrow will be his last day at the health district to pursue his nursing career. He said that he has been with the health district 19 years now and has enjoyed being the Director, meeting and working with the board each month. He said that as he was thinking back about his time at the health district and accomplishments, he has helped with for Clark County, one thing that came to mind is the water hydrants at the fairgrounds. He said that sometimes it is easy to overlook what we accomplish, and we miss the fact that these rules and regulations do have positive impacts. He said that we noticed that the water hydrants at the fairgrounds that feed not just the cattle but the food trailers and everybody that comes to the fair were not up to standard, so we asked the board for money to help the fairgrounds fix this issue. He said that the board approved, and the water hydrants were fixed. He said that we used to get complaints every year about the water tasting funny or people getting sick and since we repaired the water hydrants, we have not had that issue. He said that he wanted to share this as it is just one of the many positive effects the health district and board has a part of for the community. He said that Ms. Elizabeth "Zibby" DeWitt has been selected as the next Director of Environmental Health and he has full confidence that she will do a great job. Ms. Dala DeWitt thanked Mr. Shaffer for everything he has done to help make a difference over the past 19 years, congratulated him on passing his state board and wished him well in his nursing career.

Early Childhood: Ms. Lambert said that every year the Help Me Grow program does a continuous quality improvement project and last year they chose to help families increase early literacy activities with things as easy as encouraging them to read, sing songs and talk to their children all the time. She said that they encouraged parents to point out things to their children and linked them to the Dolly Parton imagination library. She said that we saw a 35% increase in families activity level, which was a good thing. She shared that we were one (1) of 24 counties that were successful in getting the Ohio Children's Trust Fund grant and received \$30,000.00 that we will use for WIC eligible families that identify a need for a safety item such as a car seat, stroller, booster seat, highchair, or safety gate. She said that the family will be educated on how to keep their home safe and how to use that item properly.

<u>WIC</u>: Ms. Thomas said that this month is breastfeeding awareness month, and we are celebrating a little differently this year. She said that instead of our annual BAM event we are providing breastfeeding

support bags to our pregnant and breastfeeding moms who visit the clinic. She said that we have education videos, a bulletin board and our breastfeeding peer helpers in our lobby providing education on the many benefits of breastfeeding as well as offering assistance and encouragement.

Ms. Thomas said that with the conclusion of the pandemic waivers they returned to in-office visits this week. She said that we do still have some completing part of the visits remotely which provides benefits for the participants and our staff as it gives them the opportunity for remote working days to help with retention and limits the time our participants must spend at the office. She said that this week has not been without challenges, so we appreciate the staff's patience with this transition, and she thanked Ms. Conover for helping schedule our Haitian interpreters there this week. She also thanked our Haitian interpreters for their help this week and said having them has been a tremendous benefit for our clients.

<u>Health Planning</u>: Mr. Cook said that we have hired a new Health Planner, Ms. Amari Bradford. He said that she came to us most recently as a medical administrative assistant from a urology specialist here in Springfield and is very anxious to start her public health career. He said that she will be working in both the lead and tobacco programs and is excited to get started.

Mr. Cook said that we had a couple of events last month and that he wanted to highlight our *Drive Sober* or Get Pulled Over kickoff event that was held downtown last Friday night. He said that it was a great event held in conjunction with the Jazz and Blues fest. He said that we love partnering with our law enforcement friends to bring that awareness to Clark County. He said that we also had the GROW event which stands for Get Recovery Options Working. He said that we visited 70 addresses here in Clark County offering treatment options and kits that included medicine disposal bags and Narcan. He said that our Life Sports Camp wrapped up last month as well and we had 28 kids attend. He said that this was a great camp for the kids to experience different sports and get physically active, which is something that we want them to do, especially in the summer. He reminded everyone that the Overdose Awareness Day is August 31, 2023, which will be culminated downtown with a Chalk the Walk event where we will have a special speaker talking about the stigma associated with drug overdoses. He said that this is always a great event, and we are looking forward to that. He said that we have a contract for a lead remediation project on a duplex on State Street. He said that we anticipate that the project will be completed next week which will put two (2) additional housing units on the market that we know are safe and affordable. He said that we are excited about that project which is being funded by the Crabill Family Foundation. He said that we appreciate the Crabill Foundation and the relationship we have with them. He said that finally he wanted to mention something that will lead to Ms. Hackathore's report as well which is the tobacco retailer compliance checks outside of the city limits. He referred to the board report which has a nice infographic provided by Ms. Leah Behler showing some statistics on our most recent tobacco retailer compliance checks. He said that we had an 85% compliance rate. He said with a 15% failure rate there are some opportunities to do additional education. He said that these compliance checks were with retailers outside of the city of Springfield and Ms. Hackathorne will talk about the compliance checks completed within the city of Springfield.

Dr. deGuzman asked if there is a medication take back component with the Drug Overdose Awareness event. Mr. Cook said that there is no medication drop off that coincides with the event to his knowledge, but we will have medication disposal bags available that people can take with them which hold up to 60 pills or eight (8) ounces of liquid to dispose.

Ms. DeWitt asked if the treatment referrals from the drug overdose prevention stay or go ahead and start a treatment program. Mr. Cook said that we partner with a couple of treatment companies, and they are

on site at the One 2 One clinic. He said that most people go directly so most of the time it is a "warm handoff" to them. He said that he does not believe that we track if they stay in the treatment programs but is happy to get some more information.

Vital Statistics: Ms. Hackathorne said that there was a slight anomaly this month with the low birth weights showing a drastic drop, which is hopeful, but we are continuing to watch that. She said that as Mr. Cook mentioned we completed tobacco retailer compliance checks within the City of Springfield recently as well. She said that our student interns visited 86 stores and 7 of those stores sold tobacco products for an 8% failure rate. She said that this was much improved from the previous compliance checks completed in December when we had a 30% failure rate. She said that the stores who failed the compliance check have been notified by letter and will be required to pay a \$500.00 fine. Mr. Patterson added that the retailer will be given a reasonable amount of time to pay the fine and if they fail to pay within a reasonable amount of time, we will come to the board for a hearing to consider whether to suspend their license until such time that they came into compliance with getting the fine paid. He said that we also have a couple other entities within the city limits that have been referred to us that appear to be selling without a license and these entities will be referred to the board as well. He said that it is not our intention to extend the board meeting so another option is that the board could consider hiring a hearing officer to hear these for you and bring back after that discussion. He said that this would likely involve bringing a local attorney to hold that hearing and then report the results of that hearing and their recommendations to the board meeting. He said that this will cost money, but we would use the funds from the noncompliance fines to put into that program. He said that this is something he would like to discuss with the executive committee. Ms. Moore asked how long we will give them to pay the fines. Mr. Patterson said that we will give them 30 days which seems to be a reasonable amount of time to pay the fine and the hearing would be for the retailers who do not pay the fine within that time frame and the retailers who fail to secure their tobacco license.

<u>Financial Report</u>: Ms. Moore said that Ms. Marcia Johnson's payout was paid from an incorrect fund in a grant that we no longer use so we are waiting on the auditor's office to complete a manual journal entry to correct that. She said that there are some funds in the negative which is due to the state being about two (2) months behind on payment. She said that this applies to our local grants and contracts, but we will get them paid in as soon as received.

<u>Legislative Update</u>: Mr. Patterson said that the legislation is still not in session, and we do not expect them to be back into any serious discussions until after the election.

<u>Vouchers:</u> Ms. Moore presented the bills. She said that with school back in session and flu season approaching there will be higher expenses out of fund 8201 for vaccines. She said that there will no longer be payments to Navia with the HRA no longer being offered as of July 1, 2023.

<u>Transfers/Advances</u>: Ms. Moore said that we are requesting approval for a budgeted transfer from the General Revenue Fund to the RHW Fund for \$54,654.09 and budgeted advances from the General Revenue Fund to the HIV Fund for \$20,000.00 and to the Head Lice Prevention Fund for \$2,000.00 which will be retroactive to July 31, 2023 and unbudgeted advances from the General Revenue Fund to the Water Pollution Control Fund for \$25,700.00 and to the MIECHV Fund for \$65,000.00.

Mr. Patterson added that we are now transferring to the Reproductive Health and Wellness fund, which is just a change, it is not costing us more money. He said that this is a change in accounting and when we ran out of money in that fund, we used to take those employees from the general fund. He said that we are trying to properly account for the entire cost of that program by having a cost center within reproductive health and although we were already spending that money before out of the health fund, we are putting it in there in a lump sum to help us properly track those expenses. He said that our hope is to provide the board with a better management tool in the future as we look at that program.

Mr. Griffith asked what the difference is between budgeted and unbudgeted. Mr. Patterson said that in our budget that the board initially approved there is an allotted amount of money for advances and in this case, we are having to advance to a fund that we did not intend to advance into. He explained that an advance is basically a loan so the money will come out of the budget as an expenditure and when we receive the anticipated money it will go back in. He said that sometime between now and the end of the year we are going to have to revise that budget to show higher expenditures by that amount and higher revenues by that amount, but it is an in and out and should not change the bottom line. He said that we have had far more transfers and advances this year to cover funds that for whatever reason were late getting paid which is why it is considered unbudgeted. He said that this was not within the initial or even the revised budget that the board approved a couple of months ago, but we will be coming back to the board asking them to approve this other number.

New Business

Water Pollution Control Loan Fund Request to OEPA: Mr. Shaffer said that we have been receiving loan funding from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) since 2017 and those funds go directly to help low-income households replace or repair septic systems. He said that we have received and dispersed roughly \$1.25 billion since 2017. He said that is a lot of money but added that back in 2017 the average septic system was about \$13,500.00 and using numbers from last year the average septic system is nearly \$19,000 now. He said that this is a lot of work for staff, but it is also worth it to help people replace or repair their septic systems.

Suicide Prevention Grant Submission: Mr. Cook referred to excerpt of the grant application included in the board packet. He said that this request for proposal was issued by the Public Health Fund of Ohio for youth suicide prevention and it made dollars available to local health departments and other nonprofits in Ohio to support efforts to reduce the youth suicide across the state. He said that we are one of the original counties out of 27 counties that met their methodology. He referred to the page in the grant application that shows how they calculated eligibility and said with us being one of those counties we would like to apply for the full amount of \$50,000.00 each year for two (2) years. He said that this application is due by September 1, 2023, so we are diligently putting the finishing touches on that. He advised that we did consult with both partners and prevention and the suicide prevention coalition here in Clark County and both supported the efforts and encouraged us to be the applicant entity but will work hand to hand with us if we are awarded this funding to accomplish some of the goals in this program. Dr. Robinette asked if there will be any faith-based component to helping people at risk for suicide. Mr. Cook said that the strategies and approaches are shown on the third page, but he does not believe there is anything specific in there, but he can say that there is a lot of discussion at our steering committee for the community health improvement plan on reengaging the faith-based community in creating some objectives and activities that they can engage in surrounding mental health including suicide prevention.

He said that we did get some good news on that project this week and had two (2) pre-bid notices from contractors that they believe will come in under \$75,000 which means we are going

to bid it without prevailing wage. He said if does come in under \$75,000 then we will not have to pay prevailing wages which will save us a lot of money on that installation but unfortunately if it comes in over \$75,000.00, we will have to rebid it at prevailing wage because that is the current government requirement for us.

Mr. Patterson thanked Mr. Shaffer for all his great work over the years. He said that they had worked closely together over the last nine (9) plus years and prior to that he remembers meeting Mr. Shaffer at the Mad River Township meeting they attended to give information to their trustees. He said that it has been a great relationship and thanked him for everything he has done for the community and the health district. He said that he is glad that Mr. Shaffer pointed out the fairground's yard hydrants because that is just one of many things that has been done to help the community. He said that many times when the board authorizes the health commissioner to abate a nuisance, Mr. Shaffer is the one cleaning it up and we certainly appreciate that and wish him the best in his new career.



Updated COVID-19 Vaccine Roll-out Includes Many Changes from Previous Vaccination Responses

- **Commercialization of COVID-19 vaccine** means that we no longer receive vaccine from the federal government; we buy the doses from the manufacturer and are expected to bill insurances and health care coverages.
- Accessible to persons who are uninsured: The "Bridge Access Program" allows CCCHD to request a limited
 amount of COVID-19 vaccines at no cost, to be used for adults who are uninsured. Additionally, the Vaccines for
 Children (VFC) program also supplies COVID-19 vaccines to be used for persons under 18 years of age who are
 Medicaid eligible, uninsured, underinsured or those who are American Indian or Alaska Native.
- **CCCHD awaiting shipment of vaccine:** As of this date, CCCHD is awaiting shipment of the first order of Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. Moderna was the product of choice because it does not require an ultra-low freezer for storage.
- Pharmacies and other providers can be a good source for vaccine as well. In fact, while insurances will cover the
 vaccine as a preventive service, some health coverage plans dictate what type of facility their members go to receive the vaccine. Additionally, CCCHD's list of insurances that can be accepted is limited when compared with
 retail pharmacies.




Tuberculosis (TB) Prevention and Control (under the direction of Dr. Bashir)

Latent TB




Snapshot of Lead Prevention and Control Caseload



WVU Nursing's Faith Community Nurse Training expands beyond state boarders

August 29, 2023



Tina LeFaive is leading efforts to improve community health in Springfield, Ohio by developing Faith Community Nursing programs in churches across the area. After starting with just five churches, the program has grown to include 15 churches with plans to develop five more.

LeFaive always knew she wanted to be a nurse. Despite growing up in a family that didn't value education, she navigated the education system and enrolled in an LPN program. After taking time off to be a mother, she began working as an

LPN and went on to receive her bachelor's and master's in nursing while working in a cancer center.

Working in the cancer center shaped how LeFaive viewed holistic care: "Behind every patient there is a family. Behind every circumstance there is a story." She loved getting to know the dynamics of her patients, and felt that there was so much more that could be done to help them. LeFaive felt a drive to provide more holistic care.

While getting her master's degree, LeFaive became an adjunct faculty at Cedarville University, where she was able to work with students and teach them about a more holistic approach. During this time, LeFaive realized she really loved working with the public.

LeFaive took a faith community nursing course and began completing hours towards her graduate practicum course while working with Good Samaritan Hospital's Health Ministry. LeFaive gained experience and was asked to help different churches organize their own faith community nursing programs in the Springfield area.

During COVID, many of the local faith community nursing training programs shut down. LeFaive came across <u>Dr. Angel Smothers</u> (https://directory.hsc.wvu.edu/Profile/33094), Associate Dean for Community Engagement for WVU's School of Nursing (https://nursing.wvu.edu/). Together, they assembled a program to fit the Springfield project's needs. There are a variety of people involved in FCN programs, including nurses, pastors and community members. The course being online made it easily available for those interested.

Smothers said she feels honored that the School of Nursing has been able to help in this effort.

"It's a beautiful example of partnering to build access to care," she said. "Tina has been perfect for this job in Ohio — she's that consistent person who's in the community with these nurses."

LeFaive said the more involved the faith community efforts become, the more doors seem to open. She especially enjoys seeing so many different denominations all working together for a common goal. One of the churches is hosting a health fair with Spanish speaking options. The church will soon have a women's health event with mammograms.

Community outreach, LeFaive believes, is about meeting people where they are.



Drug Overdose Prevention

One2One

- Second Harvest Food Bank (SHFB) Partnership: over the month of August, we gave out 45 food boxes to our clients.
- o Sheltered Inc. Partnership: over the month of August, we completed 3 housing referrals.
- Department of Job and Family Services Clark County Partnership: over the month of August, we assisted
 5 clients in completing applications for Medicaid and SNAP benefits.
- Needle Exchange stats from July 2023 (this data is always 1 month behind):

Client Visits: 217

Syringes Exchanged: 12,985

Narcan Kits Distributed: 141

Treatment Referrals: 4

Substance Abuse/DOP

- Overdose Awareness Day (OAD) was held on August 31st. OAD is the world's largest annual campaign to end overdose and remember those who have died without stigma and acknowledge the grief of the family and friends left behind. In partnership with the Clark County Substance Abuse Coalition, we hosted a "Chalk the Walk" event on August 31st from 4:00 7:30pm at National Roads Commons. The event was a great success, had good media coverage, and a larger turn out than last year.
- We held a GROW (Get Recovery Options Working) Blitz on August 25th. GROW is a
 effort where volunteers canvas high overdose areas to provide overdose prevention
 resources to the community. Resources include treatment options, support group
 information, medicine disposal bags, and Narcan.
- The results were as follows:
 - 44 Addresses were visited
 - 43 resources bags were distributed
 - 66 Narcan kits were distributed

Maternal & Child Health

We are still waiting for a decision from Ohio Department of Health on the new Adolescent Health Grant. If awarded the new grant year will start on October 1, 2023.

Safe Communities

- Over the past month we have participated in several community events to increase community awareness on the dangers of distracted driving and seat belt usage for both teens and adults.
- We assisted the State Highway Patrol in the OVI Checkpoint on September 1st. The goal of the checkpoint was to have a face-to-face interaction with Clark County Law Enforcement. Several Springfield Police and Clark County Deputies were in attendance. 463 cars went through the checkpoint and no arrests were made. Our OVI task force trailer was used.
- September 16th we will host a mature driver safety program, Carfit at the Health Dept from 10am-12pm. The Carfit program is designed to help older drivers find out how well they currently fit their personal vehicle, to highlight actions they can take to improve their fit, and to promote conversations about driver safety and community mobility. A proper fit in one's personal vehicle can greatly increase not only the driver's safety but also the safety of others. Maggie has been trained to be a Carfit Technician.
- A seatbelt check is scheduled for September 29th at Tecumseh High School before their homecoming game. Also, we will have a resource table with giveaways. The State Highway Patrol will also be in attendance for their homecoming game.
- We have received our Notice of Award for the FY24 grant. The new grant year will begin on October 1, 2023, in the amount of \$55,000.

Tobacco

- Continued to foster new partnerships throughout the community.
- Provided tobacco education and promoted the quit line in CCCHD lobby followed by a pre and post assessment of staff to assess their increase in knowledge of resources. Working on increasing Community Readiness.
- Pheld cessation resource and patient referral training for Daniel Vilmond our Haitian Creole interpreter. Tobacco program is looking to increase awareness of the dangers of tobacco use and knowledge of available cessation resources to our Haitian Creole community.
- On September 13th we attended the Youth Council Summit meeting to present youth project choices and have students deliberate and choose project/event. Will provide educational presentation on the harms of tobacco and assess knowledge with pre and post-test.
- Will partner with Safe Communities on September 29th to attend Tecumseh High School homecoming to promote Ohio Tobacco Quit Line and My Life My Quit. Will assess knowledge of issue with a pre and post assessment via a QR code to increase Community Readiness score.

Creating Healthy Communities

- The Nutrition Policy at Second Harvest Food Bank is beginning to start the board review process.
- Working with Gina Holland on getting organizations to promote the Red Bib program. Will be working with WIC to promote *redbib* to their participants. Should be up and running soon! We are working on getting a gift card voucher set up and once that is complete, we will be ready to be promoted to WIC.
- We purchased 750 bike helmets for the youth in Clark County. We will be giving these away at several different events over the summer gearing up towards walk/bike to school day in October. We have given out half of the bike helmets so far! We will continue to give these out.
- The CHC Coordinator, Ashley, will be doing a site visit on September 12th to Marion County Public Health. They will be showing us their healthy eating and active living initiatives around the county.



Lead

- Began connecting with daycares to provide them with lead information to be passed out to parents.
- Met with Neighbor Housing Partnership to discuss the partnership between CCCHD and NHP with the new contract beginning as well as go over any updates. We also discussed the clearance process on the State Street property and how responsibilities will be delegated. Letter to property owner to be sent out in the next few weeks.
- Attended the Springfield city school district health fair that was hosted for all employees. Lead literature as well as give away items were passed out. Partnerships were formed between four schools.
- Abatement work on 350/352 State Street was completed and initial clearance inspection was conducted on 8/21. Crabill foundation was informed and CCCHD/NHP plans on doing a walkthrough of the house once completed.

B. Application Name: Regional Prevention and Linkages to Care Collaborative (RL)

C. Purpose:

On average, 14 Ohioans die from an unintentional drug overdose every day, and nearly 12 of those deaths involve an opioid. 2021 was the highest year for unintentional drug overdose deaths in Ohio, with 5,174 deaths and a rate of 46.8 deaths per 100,000 population. Ohio overdose deaths have followed the national pattern with the initial rise in deaths involving prescription opioids followed by the rise in deaths involving heroin and now the rise in deaths involving synthetic opioids like fentanyl. Illicit fentanyl continues to be the driving force behind Ohio overdose deaths, contributing to 80% of unintentional drug overdose deaths in 2021. In 2019, the unintentional drug overdose death rate for Ohio's Black non-Hispanic population surpassed the rate for the white non-Hispanic population. From 2020 to 2021, the gap continued to widen as the death rate for the Black non-Hispanic population increased 16% to 64.0 deaths per 100,000 compared with a less than 1% increase among the white non-Hispanic population (46.9 deaths per 100,000). Since 2017, the unintentional drug overdose death rate among the Black non-Hispanic population and the Hispanic population increased 55% and 35%, respectively. In comparison, the overdose death rate among the white non-Hispanic population decreased 1%. To prevent further morbidity and mortality related to substance use disorders, a multi-factored approach is required. Critical strategies include increasing access and linkages to evidence-based treatment and services; and implementing harm reduction strategies to reduce the risk of overdose and other associated dangers.

The purpose of this funding is to establish a regional drug overdose prevention collaborative to support and sustain overdose prevention efforts across the state of Ohio. Five regional prevention leads will be tasked with assessing the current state of overdose prevention within their counties, developing supportive infrastructures for local health departments in their regions, and collaborating with other regions and the state to ensure the alignment of strategies and fill gaps in services for people with substance use disorders. The goal of each regional lead is to support local communities in building the foundation for long term, effective drug overdose prevention interventions guided by data-identified needs within their community. Regional Prevention Leads (RPLs) will support the local implementation of navigator-based linkages to care in clinical, harm reduction, and community settings; bolster harm reduction efforts, specifically among rural and minority populations; develop outreach programs and partnerships with public safety; and collaborate with the state to assess needs and gaps in service across the prevention continuum for PWUD and those with SUD. Additionally, this program is intended to integrate the use of data to inform implementation strategies and build in sustainability planning from the outset of the project. An optional supplemental funding opportunity is being offered to expand harm reduction services.

ODH will fund one agency in each of the designated regions to employ one regional prevention lead. The prevention lead must be one full-time (no less than 37.5 hours per week) employee of the agency who will be tasked with carrying

out the objectives of the program. There are additional staffing requirements within the optional supplemental funding opportunity, see guidance below.

The designated regions will align with the Project DAWN program, as seen below:



This program encompasses the key strategies for prevention components 4-6 of the Overdose Data to Action In States grant and has a strong emphasis on the following sectors: health care system and clinician supports (those not covered through ODH EDCC program); harm reduction programs, community-based organizations and public safety settings.

D. Qualified Applicants: All applicants must be a local public or non-profit agency, please see Appendix D for additional eligibility and priority areas. Applicant agencies must name a primary grant coordinator for the project and guarantee that 100% of their workload will be dedicated to the grant. Counties directly funded under the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Overdose Data to Action CDC-RFA-CE23-2003 are not eligible for these funds. If an NOA from CDC is directly issued to an Ohio county, any ODH NOA previously issued will be considered null and void. Applicant agencies must attend or document in writing prior attendance at Grants Management Information System (GMIS) training and must have the capacity to accept an electronic funds transfer (EFT). If an applicant agency needs GMIS training prior to the establishment of access to the application, then a GMIS training form must be submitted (Appendix B).

The following criteria must be met for grant applications to be eligible for review:

1. Applicant does not owe funds to ODH and has repaid any funds due within 45 days of the invoice date.

- 2. Applicant has not been certified to the Attorney General's (AG's) office.
- 3. Applicant has submitted application and all required attachments by 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 4, 2023.
- **E. Service Area:** ODH will fund one agency per region (see chart in section C) to designate a full-time regional prevention lead to serve every county in the region and collaborate with the state to carry out programmatic efforts.
- F. Number of Grants and Funds Available: This program is funded through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Overdose Data to Action funding, CDC-RFA-CE23-2302. 5 local health departments will be funded with up to \$1,750,000 million available with a maximum of \$350,000 available, Optional supplemental funding is being offered for the five funded applicant agencies through Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Program (COSSUP) grant with a maximum award of \$485,400 available. Supplemental funding will not be awarded if agency isn't selected for base funding.
 - No grant award will be issued for less than **\$30,000**. The minimum amount is exclusive of any required matching amounts and represents only ODH funds granted. Applications submitted for less than the minimum amount will not be considered for review.
- **G. Due Date:** All parts of the application, including any required attachments, must be completed and received by ODH electronically via GMIS by **4:00 PM on Wednesday, October 4, 2023.** Applications and required attachments received after this deadline will not be considered for review.

- **Goals:** By September 1, 2029, this program will reduce morbidity and mortality related to substance use disorders by supporting a five-region drug overdose prevention collaborative that will support and sustain overdose prevention efforts across the state of Ohio.
- J. Program Period and Budget Period: The program period will begin 1/1/2024 and end on 8/31/2028. The budget period for this application is 1/1/2024 through 8/31/2024.

Appendix C1

Name of Subgrant Program: Regional Prevention and Linkages to Care

Budget Period: 1/1/2024- 8/31/2024

X Base Funding Only

Objective 1: As of January 1, 2024, applicant agency will employ one full-time (no fewer than 37.5 hours per week) regional prevention lead to serve as the primary program coordinator.

Agencies should cross-train staff and develop a standard operating guide for succession planning in the event of turnover.

Objective 2: As of September 1, 2024, regional prevention leads will attend all meetings with ODH to coordinate statewide initiatives, discuss assessment development and implementation, and establish regional goals.

> Subgrantees are expected to attend quarterly in-person or virtual meetings with ODH staff, and may, throughout the course of the year, be expected to present on their program.

Objective 3: As of September 1, 2024, regional prevention leads will identify key leaders of and develop relationships with local drug overdose prevention, harm reduction, and community-based organizations across their region.

- Subgrantees should develop relationships with relevant personnel and leadership through technical assistance, assessment, and support to counties in their region as needed.
- Applications should include Letters of Support from at least three health departments located in the applicant's region.

Objective 4: As of September 1, 2024, the regional prevention leads will identify key leaders and programs to build relationships with local law enforcement and public safety agencies to develop and support implementation of interventions at the intersection of public health and public safety.

- Responsibilities will include identifying and facilitating connections with public safety and assessing regional capacity on jails, drug courts, EMS leave-behind, QRTs, etc. with the goal of increasing public safety involvement in drug overdose prevention efforts and increasing the provision of naloxone in public safety settings.
- > Serve as contact for Ohio Department of Public Safety "Operation BRIDGE" within region.

Objective 5: As of September 1, 2024, the regional prevention leads will conduct an assessment of drug overdose prevention efforts across Ohio centered on needs, gaps in service, opportunities for further development and navigator placement in healthcare, harm reduction, public safety, and community-based organizations.

- > Subgrantees will collaborate with ODH to develop a detailed assessment tool, operationalize it to collect data, and analyze and utilize findings to inform the implementation of strategies and programming.
- Subgrantees will collaborate with ODH to identify the feasibility of proposed performance measures and will determine plans for developing data sharing agreements with partners to facilitate data collection and reporting in year 2.

Objective 6: As of September 1, 2024, the regional prevention leads will serve as the chair for a designated subcommittee for the Ohio Overdose Prevention Network (OPN). If elected, one prevention lead may serve as OPN Chair (see guidance for responsibilities).

Objective 7: As of September 1, 2024, regional prevention leads will oversee linkage navigator placements in their region, specifically in harm reduction, clinical (FQHC's, free clinics, and other settings not included under the EDCC grant), community-based organizations (homeless shelters, food pantries, churches, etc.), and optionally public safety settings. Responsibilities will include:

- Utilizing results from needs assessment conducted as mentioned above, find gaps in referral systems for those in need of harm reduction and treatment.
- ldentify local pathways programs and health departments who express willingness to hire and place linkage navigators in agencies.
- Coordinate with ODH and other Regional Leads to develop a strategic navigator placement plan for years 2-5.

Site Visits

The Ohio Department of Health has resumed conducting in-person site visits. Subrecipients must complete one site visit per year. During the site visit, an ODH Grant Consultant will visit a program site, meet key staff members, and observe the program in action. Site visits must be scheduled with your Grant Consultant before the end of Quarter 2.

Supplemental Funding Opportunity – Harm Reduction Expansion

Base Funding: \$485,400 Per Project Year

Timeframe: Year 1 - 1/1/2024 - 8/31/2024 & Year 2 - 9/1/2024 - 8/31/2025

Objective A) By February 1, 2024, applicant agency will designate a Harm Reduction expansion project lead.

Funding can be utilized to hire a project lead to support implementation of these objectives and uptake of harm reduction strategies across the region.

Objective B) Monthly throughout the project period - designated project leads will attend all meetings with ODH and the designated evaluation contractor to develop mandatory project deliverables, implementation manuals, logic models, data collection tools, and sustainability strategies.

Applicants are expected to provide input into all required materials listed above and work collaboratively across implementation sites to share best practices and lessons learned.

Objective C) By August 31, 2024, expand evidence-based harm reduction activities to Black, Hispanic and rural populations.

- Applicant agencies are expected to identify and contract with minority-led organizations that are serving minorities within their communities to develop and implement outreach strategies.
- Innovative strategies to expand services to rural populations are encouraged.

Objective D) By August 31, 2024, improve access to medication-assisted treatment (MAT) within existing SSPs.

Applicant agencies should identify up to two counties with Board of Health approved SSPs and make connections with local providers to offer low-barrier MAT.

Objective E) By August 31, 2024, provide harm services to those leaving local or regional jails.

- Applicant agencies should identify local corrections officials and facilities with an interest in increasing access to harm reduction services.
- Automated dispensing machines for naloxone and fentanyl test strips are an allowable cost and encouraged strategy for this objective.
