Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health Meeting Minutes April 18, 2024

President Dala DeWitt called the April 18, 2024, Clark County Combined Health District Board of Health meeting to order at 6:00pm.

Board members present: Dala DeWitt, Scott Griffith, Dr. John Gulledge, Dr. Bernadette deGuzman and Dr. Sherry Robinette.

Board members absent: Valerie Moore and Mike Adamson.

Staff present: Chris Cook, Health Commissioner; Gracie Hemphill, Deputy Health Commissioner; Christina Conover, Director of Nursing; Elizabeth "Zibby" DeWitt, Environmental Health Director; Lori Lambert, Early Childhood Director; Emily Shaffer, WIC Director, Shannon Hackathorne, Administrative Assistant to the Health Commissioner/HR Specialist; Lindsey Hardacre, Fiscal Officer and Dr. Laura Thompson, Medical Director.

Guests: Jeff Frost, citizen, Scott Nelson, citizen and Dr. David Estrop, City Commission.

Dala DeWitt introduced Dr. John Gulledge, our new Board of Health member. Dr. Gulledge said that he is an assistant professor of English at Wittenberg University. He said that Wittenberg just started a health humanities initiative, and he was hired as part of that minor and certificate program for the community. He said that he moved here from Atlanta Georgia where he completed his PhD work at Emory University. Dala welcomed Dr. Gulledge and thanked Dr. King for his years of dedication to the safe health of our community. She said that we hope to have Dr. King with us next month to present him with an award for his service on the Board of Health.

Dr. deGuzman motioned to adopt the meeting agenda and Dr. Robinette seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Griffith motioned to accept the March 21, 2024, meeting minutes as submitted, and Dr. Robinette seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

<u>Sewage Nuisance - 3061 Springfield-Jamestown Road</u>: Zibby said that the board tabled the possible nuisance at 3061 Springfield Jamestown Road last month, and she is happy to report that the nuisance has been abated so there is no need for further action.

<u>Sewage Nuisance – 2371 Thor Drive</u>: Zibby said that the board also table the possible nuisance at 2371 Thor Drive last month and she is happy to report that this nuisance has been abated as well, therefore no further action is needed. Dala thanked Zibby for the update and the team for their help getting these resolved.

NEW BUSINESS

Household Sewage Treatment System Variance Request – 631 Kramer Road: Zibby said that last September the board declared the property at 631 Kramer Road a public health nuisance for many reasons with one being the sewage found in the basement. She said that the property has since been sold and the current owner is cleaning it up and replacing the septic system. She said that back in December

of 2014, just before the household sewage rules went into effect, the board considered a change in the vertical separation distance. The code says 12 inches; however, the code also allows Boards of Health to change that within certain parameters and our board at the time voted to change the vertical separation distance to 18 inches with 12 inches of native soil. She said that with this property being a seasonal water table they must stay 18 inches away by building up the septic system to a mound system or installing a pretreatment system that gives them a 12-inch depth credit. She explained that because she nor Chris were here when this resolution was passed, they are asking the board to table this variance request to give them time to look at the science behind why the board went with the 18-inch vertical separation distance. The new property owner, Jeff Frost, said that he bought this property in November and is already over \$110,000.00 as the house was in bad shape, but it looks like a brand-new home with everything replaced. He said that he is prepared to put in a new septic system, spending \$1,100.00 on drawings only to find out they cannot move forward without spending a significant amount of money for a mound system. He said that time is of the essence for him because he owes so much money on the property and needs to get the house on the market to avoid going into bankruptcy. He said that the septic system was planned based on the 12-inch rule and neither he nor his installer knew of the 18-inch rule, so he is asking for this variance in hopes of moving forward with the planned septic system. He said that this is the first property he has bought with a septic that needs replaced and is hoping to get this done to get the house on the market. Dala asked Zibby if she had any idea on a timeline. Zibby said that they will need to look into the science behind the 18 inches so it will take a little time, but the hope is that they would look at it as soon as possible. Dala explained to Mr. Frost that to do their job and due diligence more information to help them understand the difference between the 12 inch and 18-inch distances and she would suggest tabling this item per the staff recommendation. Dr. Robinette asked if the board could approve the variance if staff are able to make a determination prior to the next meeting. Chris said that the board could do so by calling a special meeting that would need to be in person and announced to the public, however, he believes caution is warranted here as we have operated under these guidelines for 10 years and this is the first time this has come up. He said that this would be a significant change and would set a precedent forever and feels we need a little more time to look at the history and science behind this. He explained that Mr. Frost has requested the variance to decrease the amount of soil that is treating the sewage before it hits the layer where treatment stops. He said that he can continue without this variance but will need a mound system which is much more expensive.

Dr. deGuzman motioned to table the variance request for 631 Kramer Road per staff recommendation. Dr. Robinette seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

<u>FCFC Shared Funding Agreement</u>: Chris said that Ohio law mandates the health department be a participant of the Family & Children First Council (FCFC) and with that comes the financial commitment. He said that for the past several years we have contributed \$8,000.00 towards their budget and we are asking to continue to honor that financial commitment at this level for another year.

Office to Clinic Room Conversion Construction Contract: Chris said that this is a proposal to convert two (2) of our current office spaces to clinic rooms, which will be rooms 6 and 7. He said that this will allow for added space for tuberculosis screenings and our refugee health testing clinic. He said that the state will pay for these renovations which includes putting in sinks and medical grade counters and cabinets. He referred to the contract proposal included in the packet and said he believes that \$18,000.00 is a reasonable price. Dr. Robinette asked if any staff will be displaced in the conversion. Chris said that we did have employees in the office, and both have already been moved.

IMS Postage Meter Contract: Chris said that our current postage meter will become outdated as technology and guidelines with the Unites States Postal Service change, so we started renewal discussions with our current vendor. He said that these are lengthy contracts at 63 months and our current vendor increased the price significantly, so Shannon called around and received better pricing from another vendor. He said that we presented the lower pricing to our current vendor and to keep us from leaving they matched the lower price and even did a little better which will save us money over the next 63-month term.

Hauck HVAC Project Invoice: Chris said that we upgraded the HVAC system at the Home Road location which was a significant cost but needed and we need to put a little more money into it. He said the original interior units ordered were the wrong units and we had to pay to send them back. He said that Hauck Brothers was kind enough to foot the bill initially to get the correct units in and send the wrong ones back so now we need to make them whole on the shipping and restocking costs to the sum of just under \$2,400.00. Dr. Robinette asked why the wrong units were ordered. Chris said that this was before Hauke Brothers was awarded the contract, so he does not have an answer unfortunately. He added that we are grateful that Hauke Brothers footed the bill and ordered the correct units to stay on target with the installation timeline.

Healthcare Contract: Chris said that we are going to stay with Anthem for another year. He said that it has been a tumultuous couple of years after we were removed from the counties health plan and had to find our own plan. He said that a lot of credit goes to Charlie and Shannon for navigating that and last year's renewal which was hard with a proposed 36% increase in premiums. He said that we were able to negotiate that down to 25%, which is still a significant increase to absorb but unfortunately, we did not get any other bids. He said that this made us nervous about this year's renewal, but we were pleasantly surprised when our agent, Colleen, reached out and said that Anthem would love to keep us and asked us to propose a no shop percentage increase. Colleen expected a double digit increase but we decided to start with a proposal of a 7% increase and Anthem accepted. He said that we will still offer the PPO plan, but this did not come without some adjustments to the plan deductibles and out of pocket maximums. He explained that the deductibles for the PPO plan last year were \$1,000.00 individual and \$2,000.00 family and those will increase to \$3,000.00 for individual and \$6,000.00 for family with the out-of-pocket maximum increasing to \$7,350.00 for individual coverage and \$14,700.00 for family coverage. He said that the prescription costs increased from \$10/\$40/\$70 to \$15/\$50/\$90. He said that IRS guidelines changed the deductibles only slightly for the High Deductible Health Plan (HDHP) with HSA from \$3,000.00 individual and \$6,000.00 family to \$3,200.00 for individual and \$6,400.00 for family with no changes to the out-of-pocket maximums for prescription costs. He said that with the significant changes over the past couple of years, especially with the PPO plan we are proposing to the board that we absorb the 7% increase this year with the understanding that we cannot do this every year. Dr. Robinette asked where the increased expense would come from. Chris said that it will be paid for by the general health fund and several grant funds. Scott Griffith asked what the approximate total impact on the budget will be to absorb the 7%. Chris said that it is about \$60,000.00.

One Ohio Foundation Grant Submission: Gracie said that the One Ohio Foundation grant is a new grant which was created based on Ohio's opioid settlement money. She said that she does not have a lot of information such as funding amounts or the cycle yet with this being a new grant opportunity, but the grant focus is around prevention harm reduction and building infrastructure to help overdose prevention. She said that we currently have the Linkages to Care Prevention grant that Jacob Clark & Josie Marshall run so this grant would be helpful in building more infrastructure and expanding our One 2 One harm reduction program. She said that they are exploring a text alert system that individuals can opt into for announcements when we have an overdose spike or bad batch and a mobile harm reduction unit that we could use to help meet people where they are. She said that we have strategically placed our One 2 One clinic in areas that show the most need, however, transportation is still a barrier for many people.

Monthly Fund Report: Lindsey said that we received our tax settlement for March which did show a slight increase from 2023 at about \$11,500.00 this year. She said that we also received our manufactured home payment which was also a very slight increase, and she believes that those will stay the same over the next 5 years. She said that all the quarterly reporting has been sent to the state and there are some funds in the negative at this time, which she has included notes for in the report.

PUBLIC HEALTH TEAM REPORTS

Environmental Health: Zibby said that they are interviewing candidates for the summer mosquito intern position and hope to have those completed and a candidate selected by the end of next week. She said that as they gear up for mosquito surveillance this summer it is a good time to remind everyone to check their homes for standing water. She said that the best way to control the mosquito population is to eliminate standing water as that is their breeding source. She said that one of the biggest sources of standing water is home gutters as leaves and other debris collect in them and then get wet, hold moisture, start to decompose, and get stinky which is what mosquitos love. She said that some other sources of standing water are kids' toys, tires, and bird baths. She said that another vector we need to remind everyone about as the weather gets nice is ticks. She said that Lyme disease is moving into our county and as the weather gets nicer the ticks will be more active so everyone should protect themselves and their pets by regularly wearing protective clothing and using approved repellents when enjoying outdoor activities. She said that Clark County Solid Waste District coordinates the Great American cleanup every yar that runs March 20th through June 20th. She said that businesses, school clubs, church groups or individuals can reach out to the Solid Waste District, and they coordinate getting supplies such as gloves and garbage disposal bags and then the individual or group goes to specific areas or neighborhoods and handles cleaning up that area. She said that they also have a city cleanup day which is this coming Saturday from 9:00am to 12:00pm where individuals and groups can meet at the YMCA downtown and the Solid Waste District organizes groups to clean up the downtown area. She said that

anyone interested in taking part in either clean up can reach out to the Solid Waste District by phone or through their website.

Nursing and Clinics: Christina thanked Britney and the reproductive health and wellness team for their work in securing added funding for that program. She said that our nursing supervisor for that program, Britney Bruce, realized towards the end of the grant year that there was some opportunity to do some outreach for more visit types which put us at the next level of funding. She thanked Britney, Tara Wagner and Kaytee Grable for doing that outreach. She said that we had the opportunity to partner with the Links and Greater Grace for hemoglobin and A1C screenings in March and both events were well attended. She said that we appreciate that opportunity and thanked our board member, Valerie Moore, who is very active in the Links for that connection and advocating those opportunities. She said that we are waiting for a few pieces to fall in place with the state and some finalization on the malpractice piece which has been such a team effort with every nursing supervisor helping with some part, but everything is coming together, and we hope to have had some visits by the time we meet again next month.

Christina referred to the communicable disease (CD) report included in the board packet and thanked Helaina LeCaptain for her work on the report. She said that there is a list in the Ohio Revised Code of diseases that are mandated to be reported to public health, mostly through labs electronically or healthcare providers. She said that there are various case definitions so a case can be a confirmed case, a probable case, or a suspect case. She said that historically we have reported the confirmed cases that are listed in the columns of the report, but the grand total includes the confirmed and probable cases. She said that this can be confusing when the math on the report does not add up, so she wanted to provide an explanation for that. She said that they do a quarterly report and an annual report which is presented to the board. She shared that the chlamydia cases have continued to trend down when compared to 2022 and 2023, but interestingly gonorrhea has not had the same decrease. She said the HIV numbers have increased which explains the importance of our contract with Public Health Dayton Montgomery County (PHDMC) which allows us to have a Disease Intervention Specialist here in Clark County rather than having those services in only Montgomery County. She said that we are grateful to have these resources locally and thankful to PHDMC for offering that opportunity. She said that syphilis is trending down in all stages as well. She referred to the second page which includes a graph showing the 2023/2024 spike in flu cases was not as high as the previous year, but interestingly was much later than the previous year which we are feeling.

Early Childhood: Lori said that the Governor put a lot of emphasis on programs to support Ohio families during his state of the state speech last week. She said that a lot of the emphasis was on prevention programs with focus towards young children, which she found exciting because several of the programs mentioned are in the early childhood report and it is always nice to hear those shout outs. She said that home visiting and early childhood intervention are thought successful for addressing a wide array of societies' most complex social and health problems. She said that they do lots of assessments for all the families enrolled in Help Me Grow to help them identify where they can link them to resources as quickly as possible. She said that their continuous quality improvement project this year is to improve their relationship assessment tool to help identify partner violence sooner. She said that they are trying to increase how quickly they are linking them to resources. She said that she added a section to the report for Ohio Children's Trust Fund that is a grant we received to buy safety items for families that are eligible. She said that they have given out 105 safety items so far.

Women, Infants & Children: Emily said that they celebrated National Nutrition Month in March by having an event for participants where they were able to try whole grains cut into fun star shapes with different fruits and vegetables, yogurt, hummus, and peanut butter. She said that the event highlighted WIC foods that participants can buy with their nutrition card and provided ideas on how to make healthy foods fun. She said that the event was successful, and that one child came back 3 separate times which his mom said that he never does and another child taking part in the activity which mom reported as not normal. She shared that our Breastfeeding Coordinator, Liz Stevens, has given her resignation to pursue another opportunity and thanked her for her hard work as an important asset on the health professional team and building our breastfeeding services.

Health Planning: Gracie said that it is prom season and our safe communities' program has been busy collaborating with our local schools and recently partnered with Springfield High School to do a prom pledge where students made a pledge not to drink and drive. She said that they had some drunk driving glasses available during the event to show students the effects of drinking and driving. She said that they finished the seat belts checks at schools as well during this time and have some more presentations coming up at Tecumseh. She said that in our lead safe home grant one of the goals is to create an increased workforce so they are excited to offer lead abatement contractor, classes, and licensing free of charge again this year for individuals who would like to attend. She said that the goal for this is to create local contractors that are licensed in lead abatement work and those classes will run May 13, 2024, through May 17, 2024, from 8:00am to 5:00pm. She said that this is a large commitment, but we desperately need local contractors. She referred to the supplemented pages of the report which is the youth risk behavior survey (YRBS) that we administer at the middle school and high school level in all districts across the county to gather data from students. She thanked Helaina LeCaptain for the hard work that goes into collecting, analyzing, and putting this data together. She encouraged the board members to look at the reports and said that Helaina will join us next month's meeting to do a presentation and deeper dive into some of the data in the reports. She also reminded everyone of the Minority Health Fair coming up on April 27, 2024, at Hayward Middle School.

Legislative Update & Health Commissioner's Comments: Chris said that he had one legislative update which is the lawsuit that the city of Columbus filed in conjunction with 13 other municipalities in the state against the Ohio Department of Health and the state which has to do with the tobacco veto override. He said that they are contesting that the state is violating home rule ability for local municipalities to make restrictions and policy that is right for their city or municipality. He said that we will be watching this closely as this will rescind all the tobacco retail licenses or any other legislation in place for cities and municipalities.

Chris said that it was great to see all the social media pictures of people with their health department solar eclipse glasses. He thanked Stephanie Johnson, our Emergency Preparedness Coordinator and everyone that she worked with in the community to distribute the glasses. He also thanked the environmental health staff for their work with all the celebrations and events going on that day. He said that the first week in April was Public Health Week and the administrative team was able to prepare and deliver custom salads to our staff for lunch. He said that the feedback was positive from staff and received great reviews in the follow-up survey. He said that we are a couple of weeks into our time and attendance system, SD InSite, which moves us from paper to an electronic system. He said that we have worked hard to adjust the system and iron out as many kinks as possible along the way. He said that we are getting great feedback from the directors, supervisors, and staff about how we can adjust or tweak the

system to help them and produce data on the backside to help us better analyze the cost of programs and track time spent on programs. He thanked Gracie for her work with the employee engagement committee which includes one staff from each division to talk about things we can do to engage the employees such as the salad spectacular and going to another Champion City Kings game. He said that the reason we have the windows open this evening is because we discovered that we have 2 dens of skunks underneath our building when we came in this morning to an almost unbearable smell. He said that we moved quickly getting prices and getting someone out to set traps. He said that we have tried to communicate often with staff on the situation and appreciate them hanging with us while we try to get the skunks removed.







RECITALS:

This Subgrant Agreement (Agreement) between the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) and Clark County Combined Health District (SUBGRANTEE) is created pursuant to the Subgrant awarded by ODJFS to SUBGRANTEE. SUBGRANTEE hereby accepts the Subgrant and agrees to comply with all the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

The information below is referred to herein in accordance with Title 2 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Section 200.332:

SUBGRANTEE's System for Award Management Unique Entity ID number is T1JHJ2HAEL77.

The Subgrant is made pursuant to the GY2024 ORR Refugee Cash and Medical Assistance Program, awarded by the United States Department of Health and Human Services on January 1, 2024, for the project period of October 1, 2023, to September 30, 2025.

The total amount of this federal award to ODJFS is \$5,313,622.00.00. The total amount of funds awarded to SUBGRANTEE is specified in ARTICLE III of this Agreement.

This Agreement is not for research and development purposes.

The federal award project description for this Agreement is summarized as follows: Refugee Health Screening. In accordance with the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), the full project description can be obtained at http://usaspending.gov, under the Federal Award Title.

DEFINITIONS

- A. For the purposes of this Agreement, the terms "auditee," "auditor," "audit finding," "CFDA number," "Federal award," "Federal awarding agency," "Federal program," "internal controls," "management decision," "non-Federal entity," "nonprofit organization," "Office of Management and Budget (OMB)," "pass-through entity," "single audit," "state," "subaward" and "subrecipient" have the same meanings as provided in 2 CFR Part 200 of the <u>Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards</u>, hereafter referred to as the "OMB Omni-Circular".
- B. For the purposes of this Agreement, the terms "equipment," "HHS awarding agency," "real property," "subaward," "subrecipient," "supplies," "suspension of award activities," and "termination" have the same meanings as provided in 45 CFR 75.
- C. For purposes of this Agreement, "eligible recipient" includes individuals with original documentation issued by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) or the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) with one of the following statuses under the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) of 1952:
 - Refugee: Admitted as a refugee under the INA section 207;
 - 2. Asylee: Granted asylum under INA section 208;
 - 3. Cuban/Haitian: Cuban and Haitian entrants in accordance with the requirements in 45 CFR 401.2;
 - 4. Parolee: Paroled as a refugee or asylee under INA section 212 (d) (5);

- 5. Lawful permanent residents provided the individuals previously held one of the statuses identified above (Note that this does not refer to Amerasians or Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants, who are admitted as lawful permanent residents);
- Certain Amerasians from Vietnam who are admitted to the United States as immigrants pursuant to Section 584 of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 1988 (as contained in section 101(e) of Public Law (Pub. L.) 100-202), as amended (8 USC 1101 note);
- 7. SIV: Special Immigrant Visa Holder from Iraq or Afghanistan per section 1244(g) of Div. A of Pub. L. 110-181, as amended (8 U.S.C. 1157 note) and section 602(b) (8) of Div. F of Pub. L. 118-8, as amended (8 USC 1101 note);
- 8. Trafficking Victims: Victims of Severe Forms of Trafficking as certified by the Office of Refugee Resettlement per the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act of 2000, Pub. L. 106-386, as amended, 22 USC 7105(b)(1)(A) and (C);
- 9. Citizens or nationals of Afghanistan paroled into the United States under section 212(d)(5) of the Immigration and Nationality Act between July 31, 2021 and September 30, 2022.
- A spouse or child of any Afghan humanitarian parolee described above, who is paroled into the United States after September 30, 2022.
- 11. A parent or legal guardian of an Afghan humanitarian parolee who is determined to be an unaccompanied child as defined by 6 U.S.C. 279(g)(2), who is paroled into the United States after September 30, 2022.
- 12. Citizens and nationals of Afghanistan for whom refugee and entrant assistance activities are authorized (e.g., Special Immigrant Visa holders, Special Immigrants with Conditional Permanent Residency, SQ/SI parolees, refugees, asylees).
- 13. Citizens or nationals of Ukraine who the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has paroled into the United States between February 24, 2022, and September 30, 2023, due to urgent humanitarian reasons or for significant public benefit, known as Ukrainian Humanitarian Parolees.
- 14. Non-Ukrainian individuals who last habitually resided in Ukraine, who DHS has paroled into the United States between February 24, 2022, and September 30, 2023, due to urgent humanitarian reasons or for significant public benefit.
- 15. A spouse or child1 of an individual described above who is paroled into the United States after September 30, 2023.
- 16. A parent, legal guardian, or primary caregiver of an unaccompanied refugee minor or an unaccompanied child described above, who is paroled into the United States after September 30, 2023.

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE; SUBGRANT ACTIVITIES

- A. Provide health screening for all eligible participants, including, but not limited to, newly arrived refugees, asylees, Cuban and Haitian Entrants, Special Immigrant Visa holders from Iraq and Afghanistan, and certified victims of human trafficking as specified in 45 CFR Part 400, including financial eligibility requirements at Sections 400.94 and 400.100 and defined in, "Core Screening Procedures for Refugees" (Attachment A) in, Clark County Ohio. Payment for patient navigation services and interpretation will be made if screening is completed within ninety (90) days of the eligible individual's arrival into the United States or status granted. Extension of this time period beyond ninety (90) days requires written approval from the Office of Refugee Resettlement and the Ohio Refugee State Coordinator's Office.
 - 1. Provide patient navigation (coordination, documentation, communication, and educational) services for up to four hundred (400) eligible refugees.

- 2. Provide health screening examination services as indicated in "Core Screening Procedures for Refugees" (Attachment A). Medical costs incurred should be billed to Medicaid or the Medicaid Managed Care Plan obtained by the refugee. Costs necessary to complete the medical screening but not covered by Medicaid should be documented and can be submitted for reimbursement.
- 3. Provide COVID-19 vaccines to refugees who are within the appropriate age groups for COVID-19 vaccination. Refugees may refuse vaccination; however, the provider should offer COVID-19 education so that the refuges vaccination decision is informed.
- 4. Provide screening for post-traumatic stress disorder, anxiety and depression for participants sixteen years old or older utilizing the Refugee Health Screener-15 (Attachment B)
- 5. Provide proof of completion electronically using the "Refugee Health Screening System" web application.
- Obtain demographic information, including but not limited to names, countries of origin, health issues, and languages that will be required for interpretation from local resettlement agencies (which are authorized by, and under contract with, the United States Department of State to receive and resettle refugees).
- 7. Submit invoice documents monthly as instructed in "Core Screening Procedures for Refugees" (Attachment A).
- 8. For each patient, maintain a record including:
 - a. Authorization for Release or Use of Protected Health Information;
 - Copy of document used to establish eligibility (I-94 form, letter granting asylum, letter certifying trafficked status, visa page documenting Special Immigrant status, etc.);
 - c. Documentation of all elements of the health screening examination; and
 - d. Utilization of interpretation services.
- 9. Perform other services as needed.
- B. The ODJFS Agreement Manager is Sandra Hollingsworth, or successor.
- C. The ODJFS Agreement Manager may periodically communicate specific requests and instructions to SUBGRANTEE concerning the performance of activities described in this Agreement. SUBGRANTEE agrees to comply with any requests or instructions to the satisfaction of ODJFS within 10 business days after SUBGRANTEE's receipt of the requests or instructions. ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE expressly understand that any requests or instructions will be strictly to ensure the successful completion of the Subgrant activities described in this Agreement and are not intended to amend or alter this Agreement in any way. If SUBGRANTEE believes that any requests or instructions would materially alter the terms and conditions of this Agreement or the compensation stated hereunder, SUBGRANTEE will immediately notify ODJFS pursuant to the Notice provision of this Agreement. SUBGRANTEE agrees to consult with the ODJFS Agreement Manager as necessary to ensure understanding of the Subgrant activities and the successful completion thereof.
- D. The SUBGRANTEE to whom this Agreement is awarded shall be deemed the subrecipient of the federal award received by ODJFS. Any provider, subcontractor, or subgrantee who receives funds from SUBGRANTEE under this Agreement is also considered a subrecipient of federal funds and must meet the requirements of OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR Part 200. SUBGRANTEE is required to conduct monitoring activities consistent with OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR Part 200 Subpart D and F for any provider, subcontractor, or subgrantee who receives funds from SUBGRANTEE under this Agreement.

ARTICLE II. EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE SUBGRANT

- A. This Agreement will be in effect upon signature of the ODJFS Director, through June 30, 2025, unless this Agreement is suspended or terminated prior to the expiration date.
- B. It is expressly understood by both ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE that this Agreement will not be valid and enforceable until the Director of the Office of Budget and Management, State of Ohio, first certifies, pursuant to Section 126.07 of the Ohio Revised Code (ORC), that there is a balance in the appropriation not already allocated to pay existing obligations. The ODJFS Agreement Manager will notify SUBGRANTEE when this certification is given.

ARTICLE III. AMOUNT OF SUBGRANT/PAYMENTS

- A. The total amount of the Subgrant is \$237,100.00. ODJFS will provide SUBGRANTEE with funds in an amount up to \$82,100.00 for State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2024 and up to \$155,000.00 for SFY 2025, expressly to perform the Subgrant activities. SUBGRANTEE understands that the terms of this Agreement do not provide for compensation in excess of the total amount listed in this section. SUBGRANTEE hereby waives the interest provisions of ORC 126.30.
- B. Compensation will be paid upon completion of Subgrant activities based upon health screening examination services and patient navigation services, and in accordance with SUBGRANTEE's accepted budget, attached as Attachment C to this Agreement.
- C. As stated in ARTICLE I, Section A, payment will be rendered if screening is completed within 90 calendar days of the eligible individual's arrival into the United States or status granted. Extension of this time period beyond the 90 calendar days requires written approval from the Office of Refugee Resettlement and the Ohio Refugee State Coordinator's Office and is contingent upon whether the individual meets eligibility requirements as specified in 45 CFR Part 400, including financial eligibility requirements at Sections 400.94 and 400.100.
- D. SUBGRANTEE will submit 1 copy of a detailed invoice on a monthly basis to the ODJFS Agreement Manager, ODJFS Refugee Services Section, P.O. Box 183204, Columbus, Ohio 43218-3204. SUBGRANTEE agrees to use an invoice instrument to be prescribed by ODJFS and will include in each invoice:
 - SUBGRANTEE's name, complete address, and federal tax identification number;
 - Agreement number and dates;
 - Purchase order number;
 - 4. Amount and purpose of the invoice during the billing period, including such detail as required per the compensation section of this Agreement, Subgrant activities completed, description of services rendered, hourly rates and number of hours (if applicable), amount of monthly fee (if applicable), and itemized travel and other expenses if permitted by this Agreement;
 - Receipt or other proof of cost;
 - 6. If applicable, the total program costs, verification of the non-federal match, program relationship to the federal grant and administrative costs; and
 - 7. Other documentation requested by the ODJFS Agreement Manager.
- E. As a subrecipient of federal funds, SUBGRANTEE hereby specifically acknowledges its obligations relative to the funds provided under this Agreement pursuant to 45 CFR Part 75 as well as the OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR Part 200, including but not limited to the following federal rules:
 - 1. Financial Management and Standards for Financial Management Systems. SUBGRANTEE and its subgrantee(s) shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR 75.302, including, but not limited to:

- a. Fiscal and accounting procedures;
- b. Accounting records;
- c. Effective internal control over cash, real and personal property, and other assets;
- d. Budgetary control to compare actual expenditures or outlays to budgeted amounts;
- e. Source documentation and cash management;
- f. Written procedures to implement the requirements of 45 CFR 75.305; and
- g. Written procedures for determining the allowability of costs in accordance with 45 CFR 75 Subpart E and the terms and conditions of the Federal award.
- 2. **Period of Performance and Availability of Funds.** Pursuant to 45 CFR 75.309, SUBGRANTEE and its subgrantee(s) may charge to the award only allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during this Agreement period. All obligations incurred under the award must be liquidated no later than 90 calendar days after the end of the funding period unless otherwise specified herein.
- 3. **Cost Sharing or Matching.** Matching or cost sharing requirements applicable to the federal program must be satisfied by allowable costs incurred or third-party in-kind contributions, as provided in 45 CFR 75.306, and subject to the qualifications, exceptions, and requirements of that section.
- 4. **Program Income.** Program income, as defined in 45 CFR 75.307, must be used as specified in this section.
- 5. **Real Property.** If SUBGRANTEE is authorized to use Subgrant funds for the acquisition of real property, title, use, and disposition of the real property shall be governed by the provisions of 45 CFR 75.318.
- 6. **Equipment.** Title, use, management (including record keeping, internal control, and maintenance), and disposition of equipment acquired by SUBGRANTEE or its subgrantee(s) with Subgrant funds, shall be governed by the provisions of 45 CFR 75.320.
- 7. **Supplies.** Title and disposition of supplies acquired by SUBGRANTEE or its subgrantee(s) with Subgrant funds shall be governed by the provisions of 45 CFR 75.321.
- F. SUBGRANTEE expressly understands that ODJFS will not compensate SUBGRANTEE for any work performed prior to SUBGRANTEE's receipt of notice from the ODJFS Agreement Manager that the provisions of ORC 126.07 have been met as set forth in ARTICLE II, nor for work performed after the ending date of this Agreement.
- G. SUBGRANTEE expressly understands that ODJFS does not have the ability to compensate SUBGRANTEE for invoices submitted after the State of Ohio purchase order has been closed. State of Ohio purchase orders are issued per SFY. SUBGRANTEE must submit final invoices for payment for each SFY no later than 90 calendar days after the end date of each SFY, or if earlier, the end date of this Agreement. Failure to do so will be deemed a forfeiture of the remaining compensation due hereunder.
- H. SUBGRANTEE understands that availability of funds is contingent on appropriations made by the Ohio General Assembly or by funding sources external to the State of Ohio, such as federal funding. If the Ohio General Assembly or the external funding source fails at any time to continue funding ODJFS for the payments due under this Agreement, this Agreement will be terminated as of the date funding expires without further obligation of ODJFS or the State of Ohio.

ARTICLE IV. AUDITS OF SUBGRANTEE

- A. Subject to the threshold requirements of 45 CFR 75.501 and OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR 200.501, SUBGRANTEE must have an entity-wide single audit. SUBGRANTEE must send 1 copy of every audit report to the ODJFS Office of Fiscal and Monitoring Services, Audit Resolution Section at 30 East Broad Street, 37th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215, within 2 weeks of the SUBGRANTEE's receipt of any such audit report.
- B. SUBGRANTEE has additional responsibilities as an auditee under OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR 200.508 that include, but are not limited to:
 - Proper identification of federal awards received;
 - 2. Maintenance of required internal controls;
 - 3. Compliance with all state and federal laws, and regulations, and with all provisions of contracts, grant agreements, or subgrant agreements that pertain to each of its federal programs;
 - 4. Procure or otherwise arrange for the audit required in accordance with 2 CFR 200.509, and ensure proper performance and timely submission of the audit in accordance with 2 CFR 200.512;
 - 5. Preparation of appropriate financial statements, including the schedule of federal award expenditures in accordance with 2 CFR 200.510;
 - 6. Promptly follow up and take corrective action on audit findings, including the preparation of a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a corrective action plan, in accordance with 2 CFR 200.511; and
 - 7. Provide the auditor with access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed for the auditor to perform the audit required by this ARTICLE.

ARTICLE V. SUSPENSION AND TERMINATION, BREACH AND DEFAULT

- A. This Agreement shall automatically terminate upon expiration of the time period in ARTICLE II, or upon completion of performance, or once all of the compensation has been paid.
- B. Upon a 30-calendar day written notice to the other party, either party may terminate this Agreement. Upon written notice to SUBGRANTEE, at the sole discretion of ODJFS, this Agreement may be suspended.
- C. Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections A or B, above, ODJFS may suspend or terminate this Agreement immediately upon delivery of a written notice to SUBGRANTEE if:
 - 1. ODJFS loses funding as described in ARTICLE III;
 - 2. ODJFS discovers any illegal conduct by SUBGRANTEE; or
 - SUBGRANTEE has violated any provision of ARTICLE IX.

Suspension or termination under this provision shall not entitle SUBGRANTEE to any rights or remedies described in Section E of this ARTICLE.

- D. SUBGRANTEE, upon receiving notice of suspension or termination, will:
 - Cease performance of the suspended or terminated Subgrant activities;
 - Take all necessary steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs including, but not limited to, suspending or terminating all contracts and subgrants related to suspended or terminated Subgrant activities and refusing any additional orders;

- Prepare and furnish a report to ODJFS that describes the status and percentage of completion of all Subgrant activities and includes the results accomplished and the conclusions reached through Subgrant activities;
- 4. Deliver all records in their native format relating to cost, work performed, supporting documentation for invoices submitted to ODJFS, and deliver any and all materials or work produced under or pertaining to this Agreement whether completed or not; and
- 5. Perform any other tasks ODJFS requires.
- E. In the event of suspension or termination under this ARTICLE, ODJFS will, upon receipt of a proper invoice from SUBGRANTEE, determine the amount of any unpaid Subgrant funds due to SUBGRANTEE for Subgrant activities performed before SUBGRANTEE received notice of termination or suspension. In order to determine the amount due to SUBGRANTEE, ODJFS will base its calculations on the payment method described in ARTICLE III and any funds previously paid by or on behalf of ODJFS. ODJFS will not be liable for any further invoice claims submitted by SUBGRANTEE.
- F. Upon SUBGRANTEE's breach or default of provisions, obligations, or duties embodied in this Agreement or any term of an award, a federal statute or regulation, an assurance, a State plan or application, a notice of award, or other applicable rule, ODJFS reserves the right to exercise any administrative, contractual, equitable, or legal remedy available without limitation. Any waiver by ODJFS of an occurrence of breach or default is not a waiver of subsequent occurrences. If ODJFS or SUBGRANTEE fails to perform any obligation under this Agreement and the other party subsequently waives the failure, the waiver will be limited to that particular occurrence of a failure and will not be deemed to waive other failures that may occur. Waiver by ODJFS will not be effective unless it is in writing signed by the ODJFS Director.

ARTICLE VI. NOTICES

- A. ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE agree that communication regarding Subgrant activities, scope of work, invoice or billing questions, or other routine instructions will be between SUBGRANTEE and the identified ODJFS Agreement Manager.
- B. Notices to ODJFS from SUBGRANTEE that concern changes to SUBGRANTEE's principal place of operation, billing address, legal name, federal tax identification number, mergers or acquisitions, corporate form, excusable delay, termination, bankruptcy, assignment, any notice pursuant to ARTICLE IX, and/or any other formal notice regarding this Agreement will be sent to the ODJFS Deputy Director of Contracts and Acquisitions at 30 East Broad Street, 31st Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215.
- C. Notices to SUBGRANTEE from ODJFS concerning termination, suspension, option to renew, breach, default, or other formal notices regarding this Agreement will be sent to SUBGRANTEE's representative at the address appearing on the signature page of this Agreement.
- D. All notices will be in writing and will be deemed given when received. All notices must be sent using a delivery method that documents actual delivery to the appropriate address herein indicated (e.g., certified mail).

ARTICLE VII. RECORDS, DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

SUBGRANTEE agrees that all records, documents, writings, and other information, created or used pursuant to this Agreement will be treated according to the following terms, and that the terms will be included in any agreements executed for the performance of Subgrant activities relative to this Agreement:

A. SUBGRANTEE agrees that any media produced pursuant to this Agreement or acquired with Subgrant funds will become the property of ODJFS. This includes all documents, reports, data, photographs (including negatives), and electronic reports and records. ODJFS will maintain the unrestricted right to reproduce, distribute, modify, maintain, and use the media in any way ODJFS deems appropriate. SUBGRANTEE further agrees not to seek or obtain copyright, patent or other proprietary protection for any materials or items produced under this Agreement. SUBGRANTEE understands that all materials and items produced under this Agreement will be made freely available to the public unless ODJFS determines that certain materials are confidential under federal or state law.

- B. All ODJFS information that is classified as public or private under Ohio law and ODJFS rules will be treated as such by SUBGRANTEE. Should the nature of any information be in question, ODJFS will determine whether the information is public or private. SUBGRANTEE will restrict the use of any information, systems, or records ODJFS provides to the specific Subgrant activities of this Agreement. SUBGRANTEE and its employees agree to be bound by the same standards and rules of confidentiality that apply to employees of ODJFS and the State of Ohio. SUBGRANTEE agrees that the terms of this Section B will be included in any contract or subgrant executed by SUBGRANTEE for work under this Agreement.
- C. SUBGRANTEE information that is proprietary and has been specifically identified by SUBGRANTEE as proprietary will be held as confidential by ODJFS. Proprietary information is information that would put SUBGRANTEE at a competitive disadvantage in SUBGRANTEE's marketplace and trade if it were made public. ODJFS reserves the right to require reasonable evidence of SUBGRANTEE's assertion of the proprietary nature of any information. The provisions of this ARTICLE are not self-executing. SUBGRANTEE must demonstrate that any information claimed as proprietary meets the definition of "trade secret" found at ORC 1333.61 and shall defend such a claim.
- D. For Audit Purposes Only: All records relating to cost, work performed, supporting documentation for invoices submitted to ODJFS, and copies of all materials produced under or pertaining to this Agreement will be retained by SUBGRANTEE and will be made available for audit by state and federal government entities that include, but not limited to, ODJFS, the Ohio Auditor of State, the Ohio Inspector General and all duly authorized law enforcement officials. The records and materials will be retained and made available for a minimum of 3 years after SUBGRANTEE receives the last payment pursuant to this Agreement. If an audit, or similar action is initiated during this time period, SUBGRANTEE will retain the records until the action is concluded and all issues are resolved, or until the end of the 3-year period if the action is resolved prior to the end of the 3-year period, unless otherwise directed below in Section E of this ARTICLE. If applicable, SUBGRANTEE must meet the requirements of the OMB Omni-Circular, 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart D and F. SUBGRANTEE acknowledges, in accordance with ORC 149.43, that financial records related to the performance of services under this Agreement are presumptively deemed public records.
- E. All records relating to cost, work performed, supporting documentation for invoices submitted to ODJFS, and copies of all materials produced under or pertaining to this Agreement will be retained by SUBGRANTEE in accordance to the appropriate records retention schedule. The appropriate records retention schedule for this Agreement is 3 years. If any records are destroyed prior to the date as determined by the appropriate records retention schedule, SUBGRANTEE agrees to pay all costs associated with any cause, action or litigation arising from such destruction.
- F. SUBGRANTEE agrees to retain all records in accordance to any litigation holds that are provided to them by ODJFS, and actively participate in the discovery process if required to do so, at no additional charge. Litigation holds may require SUBGRANTEE to keep the records longer than the approved records retention schedule. SUBGRANTEE will be notified by ODJFS when the litigation hold ends, and retention can resume based on the approved records retention schedule. If SUBGRANTEE fails to retain the pertinent records after receiving a litigation hold from ODJFS, SUBGRANTEE agrees to pay all costs associated with any cause, action or litigation arising from such destruction.
- G. If applicable, SUBGRANTEE hereby agrees to current and ongoing compliance with Title 42, Section 1320d through 1320d-8 of the United States Code (42 USC 1320d-1320d-8) and the implementing regulations found at 45 CFR 164.502(e) and 164.504(e) regarding disclosure of Protected Health Information under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA). If applicable, SUBGRANTEE further agrees to include the terms of this Section G in any subgrant agreements that may be executed pursuant to this Agreement.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENT, ASSIGNMENT, AND SUBAWARD

A. Amendment. This writing constitutes the entire agreement between ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE with respect to all matters herein. Only a writing signed by both parties may amend this Agreement. However, ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE agree that any amendments to any laws or regulations cited herein will result in the correlative modification of this Agreement without the necessity for executing written amendments. It is agreed that line-item budget modifications may be made, in writing, upon approval by the ODJFS

Agreement Manager without a written amendment pursuant to ARTICLE III. Any written amendment to this Agreement will be prospective in nature.

B. Assignment of Interests. SUBGRANTEE agrees not to assign any interest in this Agreement nor transfer any interest in the Subgrant without the prior written approval of ODJFS. SUBGRANTEE will submit any requests for approval of assignments and transfers to the ODJFS Agreement Manager at least 10 days prior to the desired effective date. SUBGRANTEE understands that any assignments and transfers will be subject to any conditions ODJFS deems necessary and that no approval by ODJFS will be deemed to provide for any ODJFS obligation that exceeds the Subgrant amount specified in ARTICLE III of this Agreement.

C. Subawards.

- 1. **Subgrants.** Any subgrants by SUBGRANTEE will be made in accordance with 45 CFR 75.352.
- Suspension and Debarment. As provided in 45 CFR 75.213, SUBGRANTEE and its subgrantees
 must not make any award or permit any award at any time to any party that is debarred or
 suspended or is otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance
 programs.
- 3. **Procurement.** While SUBGRANTEE and its subgrantees may use their own procurement procedures, the procedures must conform to all applicable federal laws, including 45 CFR 75.327 through 45 CFR 75.335. In the event of conflict between federal, state, and local requirements, the most restrictive must be used.
- 4. **Monitoring and Reporting Program Performance.** SUBGRANTEE must manage and monitor the routine operations of Subgrant supported activities, including each project, program, subaward, and function supported by the Subgrant, to ensure compliance with all applicable federal requirements, including 45 CFR 75.342.
- D. **Duties as Pass-through Entity.** In the event that SUBGRANTEE subgrants federal funds received under this Agreement to a subrecipient, SUBGRANTEE, as a pass-through entity, must follow the procedures and requirements specified in 2 CFR 200.332 and must perform duties, including but not limited to:
 - Inform each subrecipient of the proper identification of the federal awards received pursuant to 2 CFR 200.332(a)(1). When some of this information is not available, the SUBGRANTEE will provide the best information available to describe the federal award;
 - Advise subrecipients of requirements imposed on them by federal laws, regulations, and the
 provisions of contracts or subgrant agreements as well as any supplemental requirements imposed
 by ODJFS and any subsequent pass-through entity;
 - Monitor the activities of subrecipients as necessary to ensure that federal awards are used for authorized purposes in compliance with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations, and the provisions of contracts or subgrant agreements and that all performance goals are achieved;
 - 4. Ensure that subrecipients expending \$750,000.00 or more in federal awards during the subrecipient's fiscal year have met the audit requirements of this Agreement for that fiscal year. One copy of every audit report must be sent to the ODJFS Office of Fiscal and Monitoring Services, Audit Resolution Section at 30 East Broad Street, 37th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215, within 2 weeks of the subrecipient's receipt of any such audit report;
 - 5. Determine whether its subrecipients spent federal assistance funds provided in accordance with applicable laws and regulations;
 - 6. Issue a management decision on audit findings within 6 months after receipt of the subrecipient's audit report and ensure that the subrecipient takes appropriate and timely corrective action;

- Consider whether subrecipient audits necessitate adjustment of the pass-through entity's own records;
- 8. Require each subrecipient to permit ODJFS, any other state or government entity, and federal and state auditors to have access to the records and financial statements as necessary for the pass-through entity to comply with this section; and
- 9. Ensure that any subgrant agreement includes the approved indirect cost rate negotiated between the subrecipient and the federal government, or other indirect cost rate information as required.

ARTICLE IX. SUBGRANTEE CERTIFICATION OF COMPLIANCE WITH SPECIAL CONDITIONS

By accepting this Subgrant and by executing this Agreement, SUBGRANTEE hereby affirms current and continued compliance with each condition listed in this ARTICLE. SUBGRANTEE's certification of compliance with each of these conditions is considered a material representation of fact upon which ODJFS relied in entering into this Agreement:

- A. If at any time, SUBGRANTEE is not in compliance with the conditions affirmed in this Section A, ODJFS will consider this Agreement to be void ab initio and will deliver written notice to SUBGRANTEE. Any funds the State of Ohio paid SUBGRANTEE for work performed before SUBGRANTEE received notice that the Agreement is void ab initio will be immediately repaid or the State of Ohio may commence an action for recovery against SUBGRANTEE.
 - Federal Debarment Requirements. SUBGRANTEE affirms that neither SUBGRANTEE nor any of
 its principals, subgrantees, or subcontractors, is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for
 debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in transactions by any
 federal agency. SUBGRANTEE also affirms that within 3 years preceding this agreement neither
 SUBGRANTEE nor any of its principals:
 - a. Have been convicted of, or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or other criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a federal, state, or local public transaction or contract under a public transaction; for violation of federal or state antitrust statutes; for commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements; or for receiving stolen property; or
 - b. Are presently indicted or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (Federal, State, or local) for the commission of any of the offenses listed in this paragraph and have not had any federal, state, or local, public transactions terminated for cause or default.
 - Qualifications to Conduct Business. SUBGRANTEE affirms that it has all of the approvals, licenses, or other qualifications needed to conduct business in Ohio and all are current. If at any time during the Agreement period SUBGRANTEE, for any reason, becomes disqualified from conducting business in the State of Ohio, SUBGRANTEE will immediately notify ODJFS in writing and will immediately cease performance of all Subgrant activities.
 - Unfair Labor Practices. SUBGRANTEE affirms that neither SUBGRANTEE nor its principals are
 on the most recent list established by the Ohio Secretary of State, pursuant to ORC 121.23, which
 would identify SUBGRANTEE as having more than one unfair labor practice contempt of court
 finding.
 - 4. **Finding for Recovery.** SUBGRANTEE affirms that neither SUBGRANTEE nor its principals, subgrantees, or subcontractors, is subject to a finding for recovery under ORC 9.24, or it has taken the appropriate remedial steps required, or otherwise qualifies under ORC 9.24 to contract with the State of Ohio.
- B. If at any time SUBGRANTEE is not in compliance with the conditions affirmed in this Section B, ODJFS may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement and will deliver written notice to SUBGRANTEE. SUBGRANTEE will be entitled to compensation, upon submission of a proper invoice per ARTICLE III, only for work performed during the time SUBGRANTEE was in compliance with the provisions of this Section.

Any funds paid by the State of Ohio for work performed during a period when SUBGRANTEE was not in compliance with this Section will be immediately repaid or the State of Ohio may commence an action for recovery against SUBGRANTEE.

1. **Americans with Disabilities.** SUBGRANTEE, its officers, employees, members, and subcontractors hereby affirm current and ongoing compliance with all statutes and regulations pertaining to The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

2. Fair Labor Standards and Employment Practices.

- a. SUBGRANTEE certifies that it is in compliance with all applicable federal and state laws, rules, and regulations governing fair labor and employment practices.
- b. In carrying out this Agreement, SUBGRANTEE shall comply with Executive Order 11246, entitled Equal Employment Opportunity, as amended by Executive Order 11375, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulation 45 CFR part 60.
- c. SUBGRANTEE agrees to post notices affirming compliance with all applicable federal and state non-discrimination laws in conspicuous places accessible to all employees and applicants for employment.
- d. SUBGRANTEE will incorporate the foregoing requirements of this Paragraph in all of its subgrants or subcontracts for any of the work prescribed herein.

3. Ethics and Conflicts of Interest Laws.

- a. SUBGRANTEE certifies that by executing this Agreement, it has reviewed, knows and understands the State of Ohio's ethics and conflict of interest laws, which includes the Governor's Executive Order 2019-11D pertaining to ethics. SUBGRANTEE further agrees that it will not engage in any action(s) inconsistent with Ohio ethics laws or any Executive Orders.
- b. SUBGRANTEE certifies, by executing this Agreement, that no party who holds a position listed or described in ORC 3517.13 (I) or (J), has made, while in his/her current position, one or more personal monetary contributions in excess of \$1,000.00 to the current Governor or to the Governor's campaign committee when he was a candidate for office within the previous 2 calendar years. ORC 3517.13 does not apply to professional associations organized under ORC Chapter 1785.
- c. SUBGRANTEE agrees to refrain from promising or giving to any ODJFS employee anything of value that could be construed as having a substantial and improper influence upon the employee with respect to the employee's duties. SUBGRANTEE further agrees that it will not solicit any ODJFS employee to violate ORC 102.03, 2921.42, or 2921.43.
- d. SUBGRANTEE agrees that SUBGRANTEE, its officers, employees, and members have not nor will they acquire any interest, whether personal, business, direct or indirect, that is incompatible, in conflict with, or would compromise the discharge and fulfillment of SUBGRANTEE's functions and responsibilities under this Agreement. If SUBGRANTEE, its officers, employees, or members acquire any incompatible, conflicting, or compromising interest, SUBGRANTEE agrees it will immediately disclose the interest in writing to the ODJFS Chief Legal Counsel at 30 East Broad Street, 31st Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215. SUBGRANTEE further agrees that the person with the conflicting interest will not participate in any Subgrant activities until ODJFS determines that participation would not be contrary to public interest.

4. Lobbying Restrictions.

 SUBGRANTEE affirms that no federal funds paid to SUBGRANTEE by ODJFS through this Agreement or any other agreement have been or will be used to lobby Congress or any federal agency in connection with a particular contract, grant, cooperative agreement or loan. SUBGRANTEE further affirms compliance with all federal lobbying restrictions, including 31 USC 1352. If this Subgrant exceeds \$100,000.00, SUBGRANTEE affirms that it has executed and filed the Disclosure of Lobbying Activities standard form LLL, if required by federal regulations.

- b. SUBGRANTEE certifies compliance with the Ohio executive agency lobbying restrictions contained in ORC 121.60 through 121.69.
- 5. Child Support Enforcement. SUBGRANTEE agrees to cooperate with ODJFS and any child support enforcement agency in ensuring that SUBGRANTEE and its employees meet child support obligations established by state and federal law including present and future compliance with any court or valid administrative order for the withholding of support issued pursuant to the applicable Sections of ORC Chapters 3119, 3121, 3123, and 3125.
- 6. Pro-Child Act. If any Subgrant activities call for services to minors, SUBGRANTEE agrees to comply with the Pro-Children Act of 1994; Public Law 103-277, Part C Environment Tobacco Smoke that requires smoking to be banned in any portion of any indoor facility owned, leased, or contracted by an entity that will routinely or regularly use the facility for the provision of health care services, day care, library services, or education to children under the age of 18.
- 7. Drug-Free Workplace. SUBGRANTEE, its officers, employees, members, any subgrantees and/or any independent contractors (including all field staff) associated with this Agreement agree to comply with all applicable state and federal laws, including, but not limited to, 41 USC Chapter 10, regarding a drug-free workplace. SUBGRANTEE will make a good faith effort to ensure that none of SUBGRANTEE's officers, employees, members, or subgrantees will purchase, transfer, use, or possess illegal drugs or alcohol or abuse prescription drugs in any way while working or while on public property.
- 8. **Work Programs.** SUBGRANTEE agrees not to discriminate against individuals who have or are participating in any work program administered by any county department of Job and Family Services under ORC Chapter 5101 or 5107.
- 9. MBE/EDGE. Pursuant to the Governor's Executive Order 2008-13S, SUBGRANTEE agrees to purchase goods and services under this Agreement from certified Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) and Encouraging Diversity, Growth, and Equity (EDGE) vendors whenever possible. SUBGRANTEE agrees to encourage any of its subgrantees or subcontractors to purchase goods and services from certified MBE and EDGE vendors. In accordance with 2 CFR 200.321, SUBGRANTEE agrees to take affirmative steps to assure that minority businesses, women's business enterprises and labor surplus area firms are used when possible.
- Expenditure of Public Funds for Offshore Services—Executive Order Requirements.
 - a. SUBGRANTEE certifies that by executing this Agreement, it has reviewed, understands, and will abide by the Governor's Executive Order 2019-12D and 2022-02D and shall abide by those requirements in the performance of this Agreement, and shall perform no services required under this Agreement outside of the United States. SUBGRANTEE further affirms that that no services from or investments in Russian institutions or companies will be purchased under this Agreement.
 - b. Prior to performing any services, and when there is a change in the location of any services provided under this Agreement, SUBGRANTEE must disclose:
 - (1) The location(s) where all services will be performed by SUBGRANTEE or any subcontractor;
 - (2) The location(s) where any state data associated with any of the services through this Agreement will be accessed, tested, maintained, backed-up, or stored; and
 - (3) The principal location of business for SUBGRANTEE and all subcontractors.

- c. SUBGRANTEE also affirms, understands, and agrees to immediately notify ODJFS of any change or shift in the location(s) of services performed by SUBGRANTEE or its subcontractors under this Agreement, and no services shall be changed or shifted to a location outside of the United States.
- d. Termination, Sanction, Damages: ODJFS is not obligated and shall not pay for any services provided under this Agreement that SUBGRANTEE or any of its subcontractors performed outside of the United States. If services are performed outside of the United States, this will be treated as a material breach of the Agreement, and SUBGRANTEE shall immediately return to ODJFS all funds paid for those services.

In addition, if SUBGRANTEE or any of its subcontractors perform any such services outside of the United States, ODJFS may, at any time after the breach, terminate this Agreement for such breach, upon written notice to SUBGRANTEE. If ODJFS terminates the Agreement, ODJFS may buy substitute services from a third party, and may recover the additional costs associated with acquiring the substitute services.

- 11. **Combating Trafficking in Persons.** Pursuant to 22 USC 7104(g), of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA) of 2000, as amended (22 USC 7104), see 2 CFR Part 175, this Agreement may be terminated without penalty if SUBGRANTEE or any subcontractor or subgrantee paid with Subgrant funds:
 - a. Engages in severe forms of trafficking in persons or has procured a commercial sex act during the period of time this Agreement or any subcontracts or subgrants are in effect; or
 - b. Uses forced labor in the performance of activities under this Agreement or under any subcontracts or subgrants.
 - c. SUBGRANTEE agrees that it shall notify and require all of its subgrantees or subcontractors to notify, its employees of the prohibited activities.
 - d. ODJFS has the right to immediately and unilaterally terminate this Agreement if any provision in this section is violated and ODJFS may implement Section 106(g) of the TVPA.
- 12. Civil Rights Assurance. The SUBGRANTEE hereby agrees that it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq.) and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. § 6101 et seq.).
- 13. Clean Air Act and Federal Water Pollution Control Act. SUBGRANTEE agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and ODJFS.
- 14. **Rights to Inventions.** If applicable, if any products or services provided under this Agreement meet the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR 401.2(a), and SUBGRANTEE enters into a contract or subgrant with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the SUBGRANTEE must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, and any implementing regulations issued by the federal awarding agency.
- 15. **Certification of Compliance.** SUBGRANTEE certifies that it is in compliance with all other applicable federal and state laws, regulations, and rules and will require the same certification from its subgrantees or subcontractors.

ARTICLE X. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

A. Independent Contractor. SUBGRANTEE agrees that no agency, employment, joint venture, or partnership has been or will be created between ODJFS and SUBGRANTEE. SUBGRANTEE further agrees that as an independent contractor, it assumes all responsibility for any federal, state, municipal or other tax liabilities along with workers compensation, unemployment compensation and insurance premiums that may accrue as a result of funds received pursuant to this Agreement. SUBGRANTEE agrees that it is an independent contractor for all purposes including, but not limited to, the application of the Fair Labor Standards Act, the Social Security Act, the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, the Federal Insurance Contribution Act, provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, Ohio tax law, Workers Compensation law, and Unemployment Insurance law.

- B. Limitation of Liability. Each party agrees to be responsible for any of its own negligent acts or omissions or those of its agent, employees, or subcontractors. Each party further agrees to be responsible for its own defense and any judgments and costs that may arise from such negligent acts or omissions. Nothing in this Agreement will impute or transfer any such liability or responsibility from one party to the other. To the maximum extent permitted by law, the parties' liability for damages, whether in contract or in tort, may not exceed the total amount of compensation payable to SUBGRANTEE under ARTICLE III or the actual amount of direct damages incurred by any party whichever is less. SUBGRANTEE's sole and exclusive remedy for ODJFS's failure to perform under this Agreement is an action in the Ohio Court of Claims, pursuant to ORC Chapter 2743, and subject to the limitations set forth in this ARTICLE. In no event will either party be liable for any indirect or consequential damages, including loss of profits, even if a party knew or should have known of the possibility of such damages.
- C. Infringement of Patent or Copyright. To the extent permitted by law, if any of the materials, reports, or studies provided by SUBGRANTEE are found to be infringing items of patent or copyright and the use or publication thereof is enjoined, SUGBGRANTEE agrees to, at its own expense and at its option, either procure the right to publish or continue use of such infringing materials, reports, or studies; replace them with non-infringing items of equivalent value; or modify them so that they are no longer infringing. The obligations of SUBGRANTEE under this section survive the termination of this Agreement, without limitation.
- C. Infringement of Patent or Copyright. To the extent allowable by law and subject to ORC 109.02, SUBGRANTEE agrees to defend any suit or proceeding brought against ODJFS, any official or employee of ODJFS acting in his or her official capacity, or the State of Ohio due to any alleged infringement of patent or copyright arising out of the performance of this Agreement, including all work, services, materials, reports, studies, and computer programs provided by SUBGRANTEE. ODJFS will provide prompt notification in writing of such suit or proceeding; full right, authorization, and opportunity to conduct the defense thereof; and full disclosure of information along with all reasonable cooperation for the defense of the suit. ODJFS may participate in the defense of any such action. SUBGRANTEE agrees to pay all damages and costs awarded against ODJFS, any official or employee of ODJFS in his or her official capacity, or the State of Ohio as a result of any suit or proceeding referred to in this section. If any information and/or assistance are furnished by ODJFS at SUBGRANTEE's written request, it is at SUBGRANTEE's expense. If any of the materials, reports, or studies provided by SUBGRANTEE are found to be infringing items and the use or publication thereof is enjoined, SUBGRANTEE agrees to, at its own expense and at its option, either procure the right to publish or continue use of such infringing materials, reports, or studies; replace them with non-infringing items of equivalent value; or modify them so that they are no longer infringing. The obligations of SUBGRANTEE under this section survive the termination of this Agreement, without limitation.
- D. Liens. SUBGRANTEE will not permit any lien or claim to be filed or prosecuted against ODJFS or the State of Ohio because of any labor, services, or materials furnished. If SUBGRANTEE fails, neglects, or refuses to make prompt payment of any claims for labor, services, or materials furnished to SUBGRANTEE in connection with this Agreement, ODJFS or the State of Ohio may, but is not obligated to, pay those claims and charge the amount of payment against the funds due or to become due to SUBGRANTEE under this Agreement.
- E. Delay. Neither party will be liable for any delay in its performance that arises from causes beyond its control and without its negligence or fault. The delaying party will notify the other promptly of any material delay in performance and will specify in writing the proposed revised performance date as soon as practicable after notice of delay. The delaying party must also describe the cause of the delay and its proposal to remove or mitigate the delay. Notices will be sent pursuant to ARTICLE VI. In the event of excusable delay, the date of performance or delivery of products may be extended by amendment, if applicable, for a time period equal to that lost due to the excusable delay. Reliance on a claim of excusable delay may only be asserted if the delaying party has taken commercially reasonable steps to mitigate or

avoid the delay. Items that are controllable by SUBGRANTEE's subcontractor(s) will be considered controllable by SUBGRANTEE, except for third-party manufacturers supplying commercial items and over whom SUBGRANTEE has no legal control. The final determination of whether an instance of delay is excusable lies with ODJFS in its discretion.

- F. Risk Assessment. In accordance with 2 CFR 200.332 and 2 CFR 200.207, ODJFS as a pass-through entity evaluates SUBGRANTEE's risk of noncompliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of the subaward. If deemed required, SUBGRANTEE agrees to comply with specific conditions and monitoring requirements posed by ODJFS to ensure proper accountability and compliance with program requirements and achievement of performance goals.
- G. Counterpart. This Agreement may be executed in one, or more than one counterpart and each executed counterpart shall be considered an original, provided that such counterpart is delivered to the other party by facsimile, mail courier or electronic mail, all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

ARTICLE XI. CONSTRUCTION

This Agreement will be governed, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio. Should any portion of this Agreement be found unenforceable by operation of statute or by administrative or judicial decision, the remaining portions of this Agreement will not be affected as long as the absence of the illegal or unenforceable provision does not render the performance of the remainder of the Agreement impossible.

Section 9.18 DRESS STANDARDS

- A. The Health District reserves the right to set reasonable, professional, and appropriate dress and grooming standards for its employees while they are working. In general, each employee is expected to come into work clean, free of odors generally perceived as offensive, and using accepted sensible personal hygiene standards.
- B. Hair is to be clean, combed, conservatively styled, and neatly trimmed or arranged. Sideburns, moustaches, and beards are to be neatly trimmed.
- C. Clothing is expected to be in good taste and present a favorable public image. Clothing shall be appropriate to the job and conducive to the effective and safe performance of required job duties and assignments and in good repair, absent <u>significant or revealing</u> holes/tears, tears, and stains. Certain employees may be required to meet special dress standards or wear employer-approved uniforms.
- D. Employees are prohibited from wearing clothing that have a suggestive nature or that reveal an inappropriate amount of skin especially in areas such as cleavage or the stomach. Clothes that display undesirable language or symbols, halter tops, miniskirts, unreasonably short shorts, tube tops, spaghetti straps, athletic shorts, tattered/holey clothing, sheer clothing, backless/strapless tops, hoodies, sweat suits, athletic pants, joggers, and other inappropriate attire are not permitted.
- E. Generally speaking, Health District leadership expects staff to "dress for their day" but always in accordance with this policy. This means that staff should recognize their activities and who they are interacting with for the day, and dress appropriately and professionally based on those activities and interactions. Days with more formal interactions should warrant more formal clothing choices. Days with less formal interactions may warrant less formal clothing choices. Staff should always be prepared for unscheduled changes in anticipated activities and interactions.
- D. Employees are prohibited from wearing clothes that have a suggestive nature or that reveal cleavage, bellybutton, or midriff areas. Clothes that display undesirable language and insignia, halter tops, miniskirts, tube tops, spaghetti straps, tattered/holey clothing, sheer clothing, backless/strapless tops, and other inappropriate attire will not be permitted.
- F. Employees may wear Health District-provided logo uniforms. Generally, uniforms are regarded as business clothing items with a Health District logo or Health District program logo. Health District uniforms shall be the property of the Health District and shall be returned to the Health Commissioner upon separation of employment. Due to the legal role of some public health staff in the county, uniforms may only be worn during working hours; uniforms are not appropriate to be worn during non-work hours to ensure there is no confusion with the public as to when public health staff are operating in an official legal capacity. Depending on their job duties, employees may be asked to meet different dress standards or wear employer-approved uniforms or outer-garments as directed by the Health Commissioner (for example, clinical staff may wear scrubs).

- G. Jeans may be worn any day of the week if a Health District logo uniform is worn and is visible with consideration for the activities and interactions for the day.
- H. Dress shorts, jean shorts, or khaki-type shorts of sensible length may only be worn if a Health District logo uniform is worn and is visible and when at least one of the following circumstances is met:
 - a. An employee is working on the weekend or after his regular hours.
 - b. An employee is working at least half of his workday in an environment where the temperature will exceed and remain above 80 degrees Fahrenheit.
- I. Sensible footwear appropriate for a workplace must be worn at all times. Reasonable sandals and athletic shoes may be worn provided they do not jeopardize the effective and safe performance of required job duties. Flip-flops are not permitted to be worn.
- E.J. If an employee reports for work in violation of this policy, the employee may be instructed by his supervisor or the Health Commissioner to return home to change clothes or otherwise comply with dress and hygiene standards. Flagrant one-time or repeated violations of this policy may subject the employee to disciplinary action.
- F. The director of each division may set and enforce specific requirements for the employees under his supervision.
- G.K. Employees may participate in "dress down" days when sponsored by the Health District.

 Appropriate dress may include clean, hole-free jeans and appropriate shirts. The Management team reserves the right to determine the appropriateness of an employee's dress.

Section 9.19 TATTOOS & BODY PIERCINGS

- A. The Health District recognizes the personal right of an employee to wear body piercing jewelry, and/or to exhibit body tattoos during the employee's non-working hours. However, during an employee's working hours, the Health District reserves the right to prescribe reasonable and appropriate standards to preserve the Health District's image and reputation in the community.
- B. Employees are permitted to wear modest body piercing jewelry but are prohibited from wearing extreme piercings on any visible body part. All facial and tongue piercings are prohibited, except for a single nose piercing that meets one of the following criteria: a stud that is 3MM or smaller, or, a tight-fitting single ring. All septum (bull ring) piercings are prohibited. aAll ear gauging is prohibited. ; and aAll other visible subdermal cosmetic body modifications (implants) are prohibited.
- C. Employees are permitted to have modest tattoos. Notwithstanding, employees are prohibited from displaying tattoos that are offensive or expound any type of sexual, racial, or other offensive images against any person or group, or that are otherwise contrary to the Health District's mission and values or negatively impact upon the Health District's reputation.
- D. The Health District will make reasonable efforts to accommodate when this policy conflicts with an employee's observance of bona-fide religious practice, as far as such accommodation does not create an undue hardship on the Health District or interfere with the rights of other employees or clients.

Drug Overdose Prevention

One2One

- Second Harvest Food Bank (SHFB) Partnership: over the month of April, we provided food to 67 clients.
- o Sheltered Inc. Partnership: over the month of April, we completed 1 housing referral.
- o Department of Job and Family Services Clark County Partnership: over the month of April, we assisted 2 clients in completing applications for Medicaid and SNAP benefits.
- o Harm Reduction Program stats from February 2024 (this data is always 1 month behind):
 - Client Visits: 224
 - Syringes Exchanged: 10,781
- Narcan Kits Distributed: 91
- Treatment Referrals: 3

Substance Abuse/DOP

- o The coordination of the new Regional Prevention and Linkage to Care Collaborative grant program has successfully continued this month.
 - The overdose prevention team is currently working with the other counties in our region to complete a regional assessment to identify gaps in services. Results from the assessment will be used to inform strategies and funding in years 2-5 of the grant.
 - A GROW (Get Recovery Options Working) Blitz was held on April 19th.
 - 41 addresses were visited.
 - 37 resource bags were provided.
 - 15 Narcan kits were distributed.
 - Hygiene products were also provided by a community partner.
 - The next GROW Blitz is scheduled for May 24th.
 - The overdose prevention team participated in a community event on May 9th at Snyder Park in collaboration with CleanSlate and Brightview.
 - The goal of the event was to provide education and awareness of available services in Clark County.

Adolescent Health

• The program has continued to develop relationships with youth serving organizations and other community stakeholders to serve on the grant's advisory committee.



Health Planning Team Update

May 2024

- Continuation application was submitted on May 6th.
- Program staff will attend trauma informed care training in July.
- Registration for LifeSports Camp is now open.
 - LifeSports is a free, 4-week sports camp that is open to any Clark County youth that are currently in 5th-8th grade. Camp will be held during the month of July at Lincoln Elementary. CCCHD partners with Springfield Promise Neighborhood and the Mental Health and Recovery Board of Clark, Green, and Madison Counties to put on the camp.
- Program staff continues to participate in the Youth Empowerment Taskforce. The taskforce is a subcommittee of Partners in Prevention and focuses on coordination and collaboration of local youth serving organizations.



Safe Communities

- Over the past month program staff have participated in several community events to increase community awareness on the dangers of distracted driving and seat belt usage for both teens and adults.
- An Arrive Alive presentation was held at Tecumseh High School on April 26th.
 - Arrive Alive is a driving simulator/presentation that illustrates the effects of impaired and distracted driving.
 - There was strong media coverage at the event by both channel 7 and channel 2.
 - The event was well received by students and school district administrators.
- This year's seatbelt challene with local high schools took place April 10-19th. The winning school was Greeon withh 100%. Greenon will receive \$250 for safe driving inatitives. The award for the challenge was sponsored by AAA.
- The Click it or Ticket it Kick Off event will be held on May 16th at CCCHD.
 - Event will include a brife press conference and a SADD Quick Click Challenge.
- Program coordinator will attend the Ohio Traffic Safety Summit at the end of May.

 - o 2 Basic Rider classes were held in April.
 - 6 classes are scheduled for May.

Tobacco

- Continued to foster new partnerships throughout the community.
- Currently working with Catholic Central Schools on an Environmental Youth Project to capture vaping waste.
- Continue with Health Equity work by reaching out to faith-based leaders to offer "Ask, Advise, Refer" training & tobacco education sustainability plan. We plan to establish partnership with Pregnancy Resource Center and promote tobacco cessation services to tobacco using pregnant women who reside in Clark County via social media.
- In partnership with the Clark County Heath Equity Committee, program staff will hold a Minority Community Connection Virtual Workshop in June.
 - The workshop will feature 3 presenters from Mercy Health, Sunrise Treatment Center & Mercy Health Reach to discuss the harms of tobacco use, tobacco addiction 101 and social and environmental factors that contribute to tobacco use among the African American community.
- The tobacco program has developed a free Tobacco Cessation Care Package.
 The package includes nicotine gum, patches, and information on local cessation resources such as Mercy Reach and the Ohio Tobacco Quitline.



Creating Healthy Communities

- CHC continues to be an active member of several local coalitions and taskforces, such as the Clark County Local Foods Council and the Chronic Disease Taskforce.
- CHC is in the process of working with Second Harvest Food Bank to establish a mini grant program for SHFB affiliated food pantries. Mini grant funds will be utilized to support infrastructure and policy updates of local pantries.
- CHC is working with CCCHD leadership to develop a workplace wellness policy for CCCHD employees. As part of the initiative an employee garden will be created on the side of the building.
- CHC grant application was submitted on May 6th.

- Continued partnership with Clark County Community and Economic Development on lead abatement work in the county.
- Program staff have begun working on a media campaign that will run for six months. It will feature both digital and print ads in the Springfield News and Sun.
- CCCHD will offer a free lead abatement contractor/worker class May 13-17th and a Free Renovation, Repair, and Painting Class on May 18th.

 The event was a huge success with over 50 vendors and free health screenings.



Introduction

The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is a survey that monitors health risk behaviors that contribute to the leading causes of death and disability among 7th-8th grade students. Topics include behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence, sexual behaviors, alcohol and drug use, tobacco use, dietary behaviors, physical activity, and the prevalence of obesity.

This report describes county-wide results of the Middle School YRBS that was administered in September 2023 by the Clark County Combined Health District in collaboration with each individual school district and school.

Methods

A census was conducted on youth risk behavior with 2,233 students across 13 middle schools in Clark County:

The survey was split into categories, including driving habits, violence and weapon carrying, sexual violence, bullying, depression and suicide, tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, drugs, sexual behavior, body weight, dietary behavior, physical activity, and miscellaneous topics.

The data collection method was a census of all classrooms in each participating school. Use caution when comparing these survey results to results from 2019 and earlier due to difference in survey and analysis methodology.

All incomplete or invalid responses were removed. Survey answers that were logically inconsistent with one another were also removed.

Demographic variables, including age, sex, race, ethnicity, grade, and sexual orientation, were reported. The percent (%) and 95% confidence interval were also reported for each question. Additionally, each response was analyzed by sex and race.

The overall response rate for the county-wide middle schools was 75.96%. The cutoff for a representative response rate was 60%, therefore this is considered a representative portion of the population.

Key Findings:

Safety

• 66.0% of students rarely or never wore a helmet while riding a bicycle.

Violence

- 47.0% of students have been involved in a physical fight.
 - o 64.5% of those students were male.

Bullying

- 46.0% of students have been bullied on school property.
- 33.0% of students have been electronically bullied.
 - o 64.0% of those students were female.

Suicide

- 21.0% of students have seriously considered suicide.
 - o 65.9% of those students were female.

Tobacco

- 7.6% of students have tried smoking cigarettes.
- 16.0% of students have tried an electronic vapor product.

Alcohol

• 19.0% of students have had at least one drink of alcohol.

Marijuana

• 8.6% of students have used marijuana at least once in their life.

Drugs

• 8.4% of students have taken non-prescribed pain medication or misused it at least once in their life.

Sexual Behavior

• 5.6% of students have had sexual intercourse.

Body Weight

• 28.0% self-described as slightly or very overweight.

Dietary Behavior

• 21.0% of students did not eat breakfast on at least 1 day in the past 7 days.

Physical Activity

• 19.0% of students got a concussion from playing a sport or being active in the past 12 months.

Other Topics

- 20.0% of students reported that their mental health was not good at least most of the time in the past 30 days.
 - o 70.4% of those students were female.
- 19.0% of students have gambled in the past 12 months.
 - o 65.5% of those students were male.
- 24.0% of students could get a loaded gun without a parent of other guardian's permission and be ready to fire within 10 minutes.
 - o 67.2% of those students were male.

Introduction

The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is a survey that monitors health risk behaviors that contribute to the leading causes of death and disability among 9th-12th grade students. Topics include behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence, sexual behaviors, alcohol and drug use, tobacco use, dietary behaviors, physical activity, and the prevalence of obesity and asthma.

This report describes county-wide results of the High School YRBS that was administered in September 2023 by the Clark County Combined Health District in collaboration with each individual school district and school.

Methods

A census was conducted on youth risk behavior with 3,824 students across 13 high schools in Clark County:

The survey was split into categories, including driving habits, violence and weapon carrying, sexual violence, bullying, depression and suicide, tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, drugs, sexual behavior, body weight, dietary behavior, physical activity, and miscellaneous topics.

The data collection method in this survey was a census of all the schools listed in the Participating Schools list. Use caution when comparing results of this report to results of 2019 and earlier survey results because of differences in survey and analysis methodology.

All incomplete or invalid responses were removed. The body mass index (BMI) for each student was calculated and values that were biologically implausible, as recommended by the CDC, were removed. Survey answers that were logically inconsistent with one another were also removed.

Demographic variables, including age, sex, race, ethnicity, grade, sexual orientation and gender identity, were reported. The percent (%) and 95% confidence interval were also reported for each question. Additionally, each response was analyzed by sex and race.

The overall response rate for the county-wide high schools was 64.27%. The cutoff for a representative response rate was 60%, therefore this is considered a representative portion of the population.

Key Findings:

Body Mass Index (BMI)

40.1% of students were overweight or obese.

Behavioral Data

Driving Habits:

14.0% of students rode in a car driven by someone who had been drinking alcohol in the past 30 days.

Violence and Weapon Carrying:

- 19.0% of students were involved in a physical fight during the past 12 months.
 - 63.6% of those students were male.
- 25.0% of students would be able to able to get a loaded gun without a parent or other adult's permission and be ready to fire within 10 minutes.
 - o 66.7% of those students were male.

Bullying:

- 21.0% of students were bullied on school property during the past 12 months.
- 25.0% of students have felt treated unfairly in school because of their race or ethnicity.

Depression, Suicide and Mental Health:

- 18.0% of students have seriously considered attempting suicide in the past 12 months.
 - o 62.2% of those students were female.
- 27.0% of students reported that their mental health was not good at least most of the time during the past 30
- 36.0% of students felt sad or hopeless for two weeks in a row or more during the past 12 months.
- 42.0% of students have rarely or never had a caring adult to go to about their feelings.

Tobacco:

- 16.0% of students have tried smoking a cigarette.
- 28.0% of students have tried an electronic vapor product.
- 13.0% of students have smoked an electronic vapor product in the past 30 days.

Alcohol:

- 39.0% of students have had at least one drink of alcohol 1 day or more in their life.
- 15.0% of students have had a drink of alcohol before the age of 13.

Marijuana:

- 24.0% of students have used marijuana at least once in their life.
- 13.0% of students have used marijuana in the past 30 days.

Drugs:

10.0% of students have taken non-prescribed pain medication or misused in at least once in their life.

Sexual Behavior:

- 28.0% of students have had sexual intercourse.
- 16.0% of students used a condom when they last had sex.

Body Weight:

• 35.0% of students self-describe as slightly or very overweight.

Physical Activity:

15.0% of students have had a concussion at least once in the past 12 months from playing a sport or being physically active.
